Reunion weekend planned for reunited military spouses

No one is more deserving of a special evening together than the Desert Storm servicemembers and their spouses.

The Chaplains' Family Support Group "Reunion Weekend" is set for June 7 at the Radisson Suites Hotel at Martin Road and Memorial Parkway. For advance reservations and a \$20 donation, deployed servicemembers and their spouses can enjoy dining, dancing and an overnight stay.

"I'm sure people have been reading the newspapers and are aware of some of the problems soldiers have been having in readjusting along with their families, and we've read of some of the events at Fort Stewart (Ga.) and Fort Bragg (N.C.)," said Chaplain (Maj.) David McLean, who has been working with the family support group. "Redstone and Huntsville are not immune to these same problems; and so we feel that it's very important that soldiers and their spouses take time to re-establish and strengthen the family relationship. Some of this is being done by soldiers being given admin time, liberal leave policies, reunion briefings being conducted by ACS (Army Community Service) and CMH (Community Mental Health). And the intent of the reunion weekend is to give spouses and servicemembers a romantic evening with candlelight dinner, dancing and a honeymoon atmosphere.

"We all know that both the family members and the servicemembers have been through some traumatic events over the last 10 months, nine months," McLean added.

Fifty rooms must be reserved in advance, and at least 20 of these have already been reserved as a result of previous publicity. This leaves 30 rooms available on a first-come, first-serve basis for servicemembers who were deployed for Operation Desert Shield/Storm and their spouses. "That's all branches (of the service), active and reserve," McLean added. Interested servicemembers and spouses should call the Post Chapel 876-5751 and talk to McLean, Chaplain (Capt.) Gary Bragg or Ellie Lee. The reservation deadline is June 3 or until all available rooms are filled.

On Friday, June 7 at the Radisson, registration and check-in starts at 2 p.m. with a program consisting of a social at 6:30, candlelight dinner at 7 and then dancing from 9 until midnight. The scheduled band is Four on the Floor.

The \$20 donation will include all costs for dinner, for the suite and for a buffet breakfast. "The Radisson Suites will be giving a special rate for couples desiring to stay Saturday night and their family members," McLean said. "Friday night is for couples only."

Reunion weekend is a joint effort of Redstone's Directorate of Community and Family Activities, the Chaplains' Office, and Radisson Suites.

"We are planning a similar kind of event for single soldiers in the latter part of August. And this'll be coordinated by Chaplain Bragg," McLean said.

Redstone worker recalls long, stressful hours in desert

Autrie Perry walks outside into the warm early afternoon Alabama sun, and jokes that this seems cold compared to the desert cauldron he experienced.

Perry spent six months in Saudi Arabia as a quality assurance specialist ammunition surveillance (QASAS). He arrived there Dec. 4 and, along with many other American civilians and servicemembers, played a role in the success of the Persian Gulf War. He witnessed Scud missiles being intercepted by Patriots, heard the troops praise the performance of the Army munitions and systems, and saw the devastating effects inflicted on the Iraqi military vehicles by that U.S. hardware.

"It was very stressful and I was tired as a result of

working seven days, 12 hours per day for the whole period of time that I was there," said Perry, who returned to Huntsville May 11. After five days of administrative leave, May 13-17, he was back at work May 20 in the Ammunition Surveillance Office of Redstone Arsenal Support Activity.

Perry volunteered last August to go to Saudi Arabia after the QASAS career management office in Savanna, Ill., sent out a request for volunteers from the various ammunition surveillance offices. He was among several volunteers from the Redstone office, but was the only one selected at that time. The 15-member office, led by Sharon Brassine, includes 12 quality assurance specialists. "I felt that I had experience in the area that would be needed for this type of crisis," Perry said.

He was among as many as 23 quality assurance specialists ammunition surveillance, all Army civilians, over there. His task was to help provide ammunition support needed by the ground troops. "My expertise lies in conventional ammo and I was tasked to support the MICOM officials there working missile items: TOW, Stinger, MLRS, Hellfire and various other missile items," Perry said.

For the first five days, he was assigned in Dhahran working conventional type munitions. Later he was assigned in Jubail, which is a port city, working with the ammunition ships. After working in Jubail about three weeks, he was assigned to King Khalid Military City where he worked at two theater storage areas and a corps storage area. He spent about five weeks there, from late December to early February. Then he returned to Jubail Port where he worked from Feb. 10 through May 10.

"Talking with the troops during down-load, the 120mm Sabot rounds (fired by the M1A1 tank) were super," Perry said, describing performance of Army munitions. "According to most of the Bradley tank personnel, they stated that most of the TOW missiles were super — very little problem, if any, with the TOW missiles. MLRSs were outstanding. Due to the fact that we had total air supremacy, your ground troops carrying Redeye and Stinger missiles had little opportunity to use them; consequently, we had a large

number of those rounds turned back into the storage areas.

"We all know that the Patriot worked well," Perry added. He knows firsthand just how well the Patriot air defense system did its job. He was working on a special project in Dhahran during the initial air raids and saw about five Scud missiles being intercepted in that period, from about Feb. 17-25. He recalls being alerted by siren, running to put on his protective gear and looking up into the night sky to see the "mushroom" where a Patriot had intercepted a Scud.

Typically the warning sirens would wail after 9 p.m. and it would be from one and a half to two hours until the all-clear sign was given, so he learned to sleep in his protective gear.

"I was more afraid of traveling the public highways there and being killed on the highways than I was during the time the Scud attacks were going on. The Saudis have one speed over there and that was fast, and there were many days I had to run off of the road to avoid a head-on collision," said Perry, who also got lost several times while driving in the desert.

Perry, 37, is a native of Trenton, N.C. He was a 1976 Air Force ROTC graduate, with a degree in business management, from Fayetteville State University. (See Perry, cont'd on page 3)




BACK AT WORK — Perry is back at his desk in building 8785 after six months in Saudi Arabia.

Balance of nature

Every day we are faced with decisions about life and death. All of our choices are not rational. Because we are confronted with decisions that give us only a second to choose, what we believe and what we stand for usually determines what we decide.

On the other hand there are those who do not care if a species becomes extinct. I would like to relate to you a story which, as brief as its contents, has made an impact on my thinking and decision making when it comes to a choice of life and death.

I turned off on Neal Road from Patton on my way to work at building 5250. It was about 7:30. It was a clear, cool morning and the road was free from obstructions. The speed limit is 45 mph and it is always advisable not to tailgate even when the person in front of you is not in as much a hurry as you are.

A lesson to learn about driving is we must drive not only for ourselves but for the other person. A vehicle on a Sunday afternoon can become a tool of pleasure and on a Monday morning during a frantic rush to get to work on time can become a "Lethal Weapon."

This particular morning I noticed a skunk come out the tall grass beyond the fence which is about 10 feet

from the road. I was westbound and it was on the eastbound side. I also noticed ahead that a pickup truck and a car tailgating it was coming on the eastbound side; and with the speed of the skunk, the truck and myself, we would almost meet at the same point on the road.

This is when driving for the other person is important. As the skunk reached the road, the driver of the pickup truck turned his vehicle in my lane with the car tailgating him right behind him. I found myself having to drive my car off the road to avoid a head-on collision.

It is good that people have compassion for these little stinkers, but in that short time human life had almost been lost and at least three vehicles. I looked in my rear view mirror and saw the skunk dead on the side of the road. As I drove on into work, I thought about what happened and drew the conclusion that it could have been me dead on the side of the road if I had not been paying attention.

It is not a pretty sight to see an animal dead on the road but sometimes that is the cost of the balance of nature. We must remember when we are driving if we cross the line beyond our driving lane what can happen; and if a little stinker or even a deer should come into our driving lane, human life is more important.



Ground Based Interceptor team wins recognition


The Strategic Defense Command's Ground Based Interceptor Project Office has won a 1991 American Defense Preparedness Association strategic defense technical achievement award.

This award is shared with the prime contractor for the GBI project, Lockheed Missiles and Space Company.

The Technical Achievement Award is given annually to the government program office and/or industry partner for an outstanding achievement in strategic defense. It was awarded to the GBI Project Office for the successful intercept by the Exoatmospheric Reentry-vehicle Interceptor Subsystem (ERIS) functional technology validation test at the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll in the Central Pacific. The target, a Minuteman I missile launched from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., carried a simulated nuclear warhead surrounded by decoys, thus validating the abilities of the interceptor's optical guidance system.

The first such flight experiment completed virtually all test objectives scheduled for flights 1 and 2. The ERIS program builds on the Homing Overlay Experiment which received the Technical Achievement Award in 1986 for its intercept of a dummy warhead in space.

GBI Project Office is developing the technology for a low cost, lightweight and ground-launched interceptor which would operate above the atmosphere during the midcourse phase of ballistic missile reentry vehicles. The office is headed by James Katechis, a member of the Senior Executive Service. A Montgomery native, he graduated from Auburn University. Katechis is a member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, the Army Aviation Association of America, and a professional Engineer.


sity in Fayetteville, N.C. After attending graduate school at North Carolina A&T University, he went on active duty as an Air Force second lieutenant. He was stationed at Barksdale Air Force Base in Bossier City, La., from 1977-81 before leaving the military to seek civilian employment. In 1982 he was hired by the government and enrolled in the QASAS intern program with 16 months of schooling at the Army Defense Ammunition Center and School in Savanna, Ill. Eighteen months of internship at Pine Bluff, Ark., was followed by a year at the Military Ocean Terminal Sunnypoint in Sunnypoint, N.C., and nearly four years as a quality assurance ammo inspector in Korea. He came to Redstone in February 1990.

"There were approximately 541,000 U.S. military and civilian personnel that were there; and of that number, there were in excess of 25,000 civilians. Touring displays give public chance to see Patriot

Shortly after the end of the Persian Gulf War, calls started coming in from people who wanted to see the "hero" of the war.

Communities, civic groups and military installations around the country wanted a close look. Could they get the "star" for their parade? How much would it cost them? Send information, but most importantly, send them the hero!

What they wanted was the Patriot missile.

People wanted to see what it looked like, to have it roll in parades, to see what anti-tactical missiles were all about.

At about the same time, the Army Materiel Command directed subordinate commands to support victory parades around the country. AMC funds would be made available for such projects.

Because the project office wanted to share the Patriot success story with everyone who wanted to see it — the taxpayers who paid for it — plans were made to take the Patriot on the road.

Raytheon Company, prime contractor for the Patriot system, built four hollow-wood missile replicas for touring which look like missiles fired from the launcher. They weigh 500 pounds vs. the 2,000 pound weight of the real thing, according to Tom Shellogg, chief of Patriot's Logistics Development Division.

Shellogg is coordinator for the requests that are coming into the project office, MICOM's Public Affairs Office and Raytheon.

"We're not spending any money for this. The missiles are provided by Raytheon and the transportation costs, equipment and people expenses are being paid for in many cases by the requester," Shellogg said.

The requesters who absolutely have no money with which to pay the costs are not turned down, however, because the AMC funds are drawn upon to pay, Shellogg said.

"This is good not just for Patriot and MICOM but also for the Army and the entire military/industrial complex," he said.

Fort McClellan brought a truck up to pick up a Patriot and returned it after their parade, Shellogg said.

But because of safety and security, in most instances at least two people are needed to accompany the Patriot, as is the case when the missile is transported by plane. And if the ground support equipment — the launcher, engagement control station and radar — goes, two people must go.

An added benefit of putting Patriot on the road is the "swaps" worked out between military installations. For instance, the first Patriot trip, to Eaker Air Force Base in Arkansas, resulted in an agreement from the people there to do fly-overs with Air Force planes for the Celebration of Patriots parade in downtown Huntsville June 11.

In addition to himself, Shellogg is relying on others to accompany the Patriot to display locations. His secretary, Michele Hagler, went to Eaker and to the Army Communications Electronics Command in Fort Monmouth, N.J.

SSgt. Jack Siebert and SSgt. Gallie Lismore, both Patriot trained, are also traveling with the displays. Both are assigned to Redstone Arsenal Support Activity and work at the Software Engineering Directorate, RDEC. During the Persian Gulf War the directorate was involved with software feedback to keep the Patriot systems going in Saudi, Siebert said.

Lismore was in Saudi Arabia four months attached to a unit responsible for delivering missile reloads to Patriot batteries.

Three missiles were touring the weekend of May

18-19. One was at the Presidio in San Francisco, another at Fort McClellan and the third at Fort Monmouth.

Siebert was at the Presidio show, which drew about 25,000 people, he said. He was interviewed by a television station and a radio station about the Patriot. He stayed with family members who lived in the area, which further reduced costs to the government.


"From the time we set up there's always a constant flow of people. Lots of GIs congratulate us and tell us that because of Patriot, they felt safe. Family members thank us. People always have lots of questions about how it works. One of the most common questions is, 'How do they get the missiles in the canister?' Of course, they come from the factory already loaded," Siebert said.

Something that surprises a great many people, Siebert said, is that the missile is smaller than they thought it would be. "Most people are really surprised at the size of the Patriot. They apparently think it's going to be very, very large. I tell them that actually, the Patriot is larger than most of the Army's missiles."

All three days of the CECOM event were jam-packed with people, Hagler said. Publicity about the event focused on the fact that the Patriot missile would be there, she said.

"I'm really enjoying this duty. It's different from the average secretarial stuff. I've learned so much

Security command's top NCO works at Redstone

The noncommissioned officer of the year for Special Security Command, under Army Materiel Command, is an administrative specialist here.

SSgt. Yolanda "Yoyo" Tisdale works in the Special Security Office at Redstone as contracts NCO-in-charge. A member of Special Security Detachment-Redstone, she was recognized May 10 at headquarters Special Security Command in Alexandria, Va., as the command's NCO of the Year.

"I'm honored. I guess I attribute everything to my past assignments and past NCOICs; their teachings from when I was a private helped me become the NCO I am today and motivated me to become NCO of the Year for '91. Also the input from my two soldiers — Sgt. Sarah Callands and Sgt. John Hoosier — to SFC Felder. The input from them, I know, helped me win this award," Tisdale said.

Selection was based on her nomination package which included biographical data, career aspirations, personal history plus a recommendation from SFC Daniel Felder, the detachment sergeant. Felder wrote, in part, "Describing SSgt. Tisdale in one word is impossible, however, if I had to, the word would be SOLDIER (Sophisticated, Observant, Leadership, Dedication, Integrity, Excellence, and Ready to Serve)."

The selection was made by MSgt. Dale Coffey, detachment sergeant for Special Security Command-AMC, who said he was impressed by Tisdale's remarks in her nomination package. "I will never forget the noncommissioned officers and soldiers that have touched my career over the past nine years," Tisdale wrote. "When performing my job, the lessons learned from these NCOs are evident in my performance. They taught me to strive from within, and that motivation and dedication are paramount characteristics of a soldier. During the award ceremony, Tisdale received the Army Achievement Medal and a plaque from Maj. Millard Hall, commander of Special Security Command-AMC. She also was reenlisted by Hall for six years.

Tisdale, who became 28 on April 22, is from Nashville. She is the youngest of Anneice Tisdale's four children — three girls and a boy. After graduating in 1981 from Maplewood High School in Nashville, she joined the Army that September when she saw a recruiting commercial on television. Tisdale had basic training and advanced individual training at Fort Jackson, S.C. After that she was a legal clerk in the staff judge advocate office at Fort Knox, Ky.; a

files clerk in the 3rd Infantry Division at Wurzburg, Germany; the orderly room NCO for the 16th Adjutant General Postal Detachment in Presidio of San

Francisco; and an NCO-in-charge of registered, international, certified and insured mail with 228th Postal Company in Frankfurt, Germany. She arrived at Redstone on Dec. 27, 1988.

"It was a big change from postal to security work," said Tisdale, who liked Germany but doesn't miss working with all the mail over there.

In an eight-soldier office commanded by Maj. Clement Halupka, she serves as the Army adviser for the Special Security Office to 21 contractors. Seventeen of these companies are locally based and the rest are in Florida, she said, which means she must travel to make her annual inspections. She returned to Redstone last week after a busy early May in which she had official trips to a conference at AMC, to Florida, and to Atlanta. A single parent, she was happy to return here to her 12-year-old son, Jerome, a fifth grader at Williams Elementary.

Tisdale received an associate degree in liberal arts from the Columbia College extension here last July and is pursuing a bachelor's degree in criminal justice. Her hobbies include softball; she pitches for the Kist team in Huntsville on weekdays. She wants to attend the drill sergeants school; and her ultimate goal is to become commandant of an NCO academy.

"People look at 71 Limas (administrative specialists) really as not being *soldiers*. But if you don't have your papers straight, you'll be in trouble; because paperwork is one of the most important parts of the Army. So the next time you look at a 71 Lima and say 'paper pusher,' say it with a smile because we're soldiers, too," Tisdale said. There are plenty of soldiers who'll vouch for that.

Help wanted for annual Bible school for children

Volunteer helpers are urgently needed for an annual weeklong Bible school for youngsters of the Redstone community.

Vacation Bible School for age 3 through grade six will be held 9-11:30 a.m. June 17 through June 21 at the Bicentennial Chapel. This is an ecumenical activity for youngsters of active-duty or retired military. "The theme this year is 'Share God's Blessings,' and the emphasis is on stories of Jesus," said Patty Wilson, the director of religious education.

Each class includes stories, games, crafts, refreshments and recreation. "It's not a stereotypical sit-down class," Wilson added. The youngsters can range from age 3 — all should be toilet trained — up to those who have just finished the sixth grade.

"All the work is done by volunteers, and we're seeking more volunteers from the military community to be teachers, recreation leaders and people to prepare refreshments. It's increasingly difficult in our busy lives to recruit more volunteers. It's getting more difficult because often both parents work," Wilson said. "It's a short-term commitment, a way in which they can help the chapels without giving up a whole year.

"We will need 32 teachers, at least seven leaders of recreation and at least five persons to work with refreshments. And we would like for people to volunteer very soon so they could have adequate preparation time," she said.

Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Fred Maddox is the chaplain in charge of Vacation Bible School. This will be one of his final official functions before he retires from the Army June 19 after 24 years service. Maddox, 58, from Cordele, Ga., plans to return to his native state as associate pastor of the First United Methodist

Church in Statesboro, Ga., near Savannah. "The purpose of Vacation Bible School of course is to acquaint the children with the Bible — instruction, content and history — and to facilitate their relating the Bible to life; the teachings and content of the Bible to life itself," Maddox said. "It's an opportunity of service to the community for our children as volunteers. We certainly desperately need people willing to give their time and efforts to the community as service to our children."

Wilson, referring to her fellow coordinator, said the chaplain will be missed when he retires: "As director of religious education, I regret Chaplain Maddox is leaving because he has always been so tremendously

supportive of religious education and activities."

Volunteers are mainly being sought from the active and retired military community, but Redstone Arsenal civilian workers are welcome to participate as well. Interested persons can visit Wilson in room 15 of the Bicentennial Chapel, or call her at 876-6874. Registration for youngsters will begin June 2 at room 15 each morning except Saturday. Children from the Child Development Center will have the opportunity to attend with their parents' permission; registration for CDC children will take place at the center.

"We had about 160 children and 40 volunteers (last year)," Wilson said. "It was a fun-filled time."





Strategic defense technologies reach for the stars

Hit-to-kill interceptors, directed-energy lasers and neutral particle beams, high tech sensors, and state-of-the-art data processing, were among the topics at an intensive two-day briefing for the news media sponsored by the Strategic Defense Command.

More than 25 journalists — representing national and trade publications such as Time, Business Week, Newsweek, the Associated Press, Aviation Week, Aerospace Daily, and Defense News as well as local television stations and newspapers — were on hand to listen to SDC's top managers discuss the status of their research and development work for both the Strategic Defense Initiative Organization and the Joint Theater Missile Defense Program.

In an informal working lunch interview, Lt. Gen. Robert Hammond, SDC commanding general, told reporters: "I believe we need some kind of theater defense to protect the United States' interests and our allies around the world; but I also believe that, in what I perceive to be dangerous times, we need some kind of strategic defense system to protect us here at home."

Hammond went on to explain that the need for both strategic and theater defenses remains great: Although the Soviets' intent to use their ballistic missile assets may have decreased, their capability to use these weapons has not. He also pointed out that it is only "prudent" to enhance the U.S.'s defense capabilities in the face of the proliferation of ballistic missile capability throughout the world.


The reporters seemed most interested in the increased congressional emphasis on Theater Missile Defense and a projected doubling of the TMD research and development funding in fiscal 1992.

Brig. Gen. J. Morgan Jellett, program manager for Joint Theater Missile Defense, told reporters: "It's Congress' intent to accelerate the (TMD) program as soon as it is technically and fiscally feasible... In FY

'92 we anticipate funding totaling \$850 million for the TMD program requirements, up from approximately \$400 million in FY '91.

"The Strategic Defense Initiative Organization has been tapped to manage the program, and SDC has



Champus deductible increases for most service families

The annual Champus deductible for outpatient care increased for many Champus-eligible families on April 1.

The outpatient deductible for each fiscal year increased to \$150 for an individual, and a total of \$300 for the entire family. The previous amounts were \$50 and \$100, respectively. The original law that increased the annual deductibles provided that the amounts for the family members of active duty E-4s and below would not increase, but would remain at \$50 and \$100.

Recent congressional action directed that the deductible increase be delayed until Oct. 1 for family members of active duty sponsors who served in the Persian Gulf War. Therefore, the lower deductible rates will continue to apply to care received by these beneficiaries through Sept. 30. Implementing this change, which could take several weeks, will require identifying dependents of active duty members who served or are serving in the Persian Gulf.

If Champus claims processors should happen to apply the new deductible (\$150 and \$300) incorrectly to claims for beneficiaries who qualify for a delay in the increase until Oct. 1, a copy of the explanation of benefits should be marked "Desert Storm" and returned with a copy of the sponsor's leave and earnings statement (LES) showing "Danger," "Imminent Danger," or "Hostile Fire" pay, or with evidence that the military sponsor is entitled to a *combat zone tax exclusion*, to the claims processor.

If a copy of the LES is not available, the beneficiary or sponsor should contact the sponsor's military pay office for a copy.

After Sept. 30, only care for families of active duty members in grades E-4 and below will be exempt from the higher deductible regardless of service in the Persian Gulf.

The increase in the deductible for care received on or after April 1 will apply to all persons who are eligible for Champus benefits except the family members of E-4s and below or family members of those who served in the Persian Gulf.

HERE'S HOW the increased deductible will be applied:

Since the federal government's fiscal year begins anew each Oct. 1, all Champus-eligible persons have had to meet the old deductible amounts (\$50 or \$100) for outpatient care received between Oct. 1, 1990, and March 31. Once a patient has met the required deductible, Champus begins normal cost-sharing of outpatient care for the rest of the fiscal year.

But the deductible increased on April 1. So, for any outpatient care received on or after that date, patients will have to pay the additional amount to reach the total of the new deductible (\$150 or \$300) before Champus will continue its normal cost-sharing of outpatient care. The amount paid toward the outpatient deductible before April 1 will be counted toward

satisfaction of the increased deductible that is no effect for most service families.

Champus claims processors will make the adjustment for the new deductible amounts on claims which indicate that the outpatient services were received on or after April 1. (News release from Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services)



Alabama says buckle-up to avoid summertime blues

MONTGOMERY — State officials have endorsed the goals of a national two-year program to increase safety belt use in the United States to 70 percent by 1992.

The program's title — "70% x '92" — reflects President Bush's directive to the Department of Transportation to increase the safety belt use rate from the current 49 percent to 70 percent by 1992.

"The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has begun activities on several fronts, including a new 'Buckle Up — Avoid the Summertime Blues' media campaign," said NHTSA official Chester Jourdan.

"The motoring public will see some immediate results of the initiative this summer as local officials join forces with NHTSA and other law enforcement agencies across the country to promote safety belt use through public information and enforcement of seat belt and child restraint laws," Jourdan said.

Alabama does not have a mandatory safety belt law, but the passage of such a law has already been presented during this legislative session.

"Even without a seat belt law, our state will participate in this national campaign by emphasizing the Alabama Child Restraint Law as well as promoting voluntary usage of safety belts," said Trooper William



"There are numerous police departments across the state which will be participating in the campaign," said Viki Brant, coordinator of the Alabama Occupant Restraint Program. "The local police departments' involvement will include a variety of activities, ranging from conducting observational seat belt surveys to putting up road blocks for handing out seat belt literature and 'buckle-up' incentives."

During the summer there will be three waves of media promotion coinciding with the three major holidays — Memorial, Independence and Labor Day. Memorial Day May 27 marked the beginning of sum-

meritime travel, a time when more people take to the roads and highways.

"With the increased traffic on the road, there is also an increase in the number of crashes resulting in more deaths and injuries," noted Trooper Rogers. (News release from Alabama Department of Public Health)

been tasked to be the lead Army agency consolidating the TMD efforts that were ongoing within the Missile Command and the Strategic Defense Command. The Army is structured now to do the TMD mission," he said, "and we are prepared to carry out DoD's directions."

Briefings by representatives of the Joint TMD Program Office outlined long-range plans to enhance the country's TMD posture, by pursuing a two-tier theater missile defense capability: a theater high altitude area defense (THAAD) system to provide an extended area defense capable of protecting large areas or population centers as well as an enhanced lower-tier asset or point defense system, such as an upgraded version of the Patriot missile system which was so successful in Operation Desert Storm.

Jellett described ongoing upgrades of the Patriot system being achieved through the Patriot Pre-Planned Product Improvement program, including one that "shows we can significantly expand the Patriot footprint over what it is today."

He also indicated that follow-on TMD efforts would include efforts to achieve a TMD kill probability rate of over 90 percent by focusing on hit-to-kill technologies, "a significant improvement over most of the weapons in the air defense arena," he said. "Hit-to-kill rather than fragmentation warheads also make possible increased lethality against chemical, biological and nuclear threats as well as conventional warheads."

Interceptor technologies being pursued under the TMD umbrella would allow direct-impact target kills:

ERINT (Extended Range Intercept Technology) — a program that may result in a fire-and-forget homing missile one third the size of Patriot that has potential for integration with the upgraded Patriot system to augment Patriot's TMD firepower. In one concept, 16 of the smaller ERINT missiles could be fitted on a launcher that can now hold only four Patriots. Flight tests against tactical missile targets, some with simulated payloads, are to begin in fiscal '92.

The THAAD interceptor system is in the concept design stage. An accelerated program will lead to a demonstration/validation system by 1995.

In regard to the Army-funded, joint service Anti-Satellite Program, Hammond insists: "It's still an important program; it's still supported... For a brief heartbeat in FY '91 it was gone... I received a call at my quarters one Saturday evening about midnight telling me to 'quick, apply CPR and bring ASAT back at the misery level.' I was tasked to keep the ASAT team together and make sure the contractor stayed involved. We barely managed to comply with that guidance. The funding this year is on the order of \$70 million. We've gone to the Army Acquisition Executive with a new recommended baseline for ASAT that would require the Army to plus-up the funding in FY '92 and '93 and beyond so that we can have a meaningful program and not just stay in research. I'm optimistic that it will be approved."

In the strategic arena James Katechis, Ground Based Interceptor project manager, described the spectacular success of the first Exoatmospheric Reentry-vehicle Interceptor Subsystem flight test in January. Launched from Kwajalein Atoll in the Pacific, ERIS not only intercepted the simulated enemy warhead more than 100 miles above the earth and within inches of its best possible impact point, but also achieved all the objectives originally planned for a second test. In a follow-up flight test earlier this month, anomalies in acquiring the target from Global Positioning System satellites delayed a second shot at an intercept until later this year.

A second flight experiment in the High Endoatmospheric Defense Interceptor Project slated for this summer to verify on-board seeker performance was described by Project Manager Alan Sherer. He also outlined the concept of a follow-on Endoatmospheric/Exoatmospheric Interceptor capable of target commit

either above or within the atmosphere for an endo-intercept.

Hammond, the SDC commander, concluded his remarks with a tribute to the Huntsville work force: "Huntsville is a dynamic, vibrant community. With the technical expertise at Army Missile Command and the NASA Marshall Space Flight Center here as well as the Army Strategic Defense Command and the hotbed of activity at the supporting aerospace contractors, we really have a center of excellence here. In my mind Huntsville represents a valuable national resource."

Unit takes to the field for sharpening soldier skills

Basic combat skills... patrolling, reacting to an ambush, setting up a perimeter defense, range cards, communication, etc... skills critical for survival and victory in battle.

These and many other soldier skills are part of a series of field training exercises being conducted by HHC, 832nd Ordnance Battalion.

"We take about 50 soldiers on a six-mile tactical road march," said Capt. Vanessa Engquist, commander of HHC. "They carry a 45-pound rucksack, weapon, etc.; and along the way they are ambushed 12 or 13 times by a group of 10 aggressors before they reach their final objective."

Once there, the soldiers set up a perimeter and prepare for a long night of infiltrations and night assaults.

"The first sergeant and I go with the soldiers," Engquist said, "but we don't run the show, the soldiers are the ones responsible for taking care of what needs to be done."

And that list of things to do includes preparing and camouflaging positions, assigning sectors of fire and preparing range cards, patrolling and security.

"Many soldiers assigned to Redstone Arsenal have never had the opportunity to live and work in a field environment," said HHC 1st Sgt. Frank Morales. "By conducting these exercises and giving those soldiers this opportunity, they will be able to maintain their basic soldier skills and be better soldiers."

Morales realizes that soldiering skills tend to diminish as time goes on and the soldier doesn't use them.

"When a soldier PCS's from this unit, I don't want

them to feel lost if they're assigned to a unit that goes to field often," he said. "Hopefully this training will help them maintain their basic skills."

To that end, many of HHC's training programs are geared for tougher training than most. The unit conducts road marches regularly and an intense physical training program three days a week.



about Patriot. Normally I push paper all day, but when I go to a show I can listen to people talk and answer their questions. It's great," Hagler said.

"To us (here at MICOM), missiles are no big deal; we see them all the time. But to people who are used to seeing planes or other equipment, missiles are a big deal. It's incredible seeing how many people are interested in missiles and how they work, especially since the war," she said.

If the organization requesting a Patriot is 300 miles or less in distance from Redstone, the team transports it on a 5-ton truck, unless the requester can come and get it themselves.

In fact, having a 5-ton truck driver's license is what initially got Hagler into the touring business. She already had the truck license because of a job previously held at McMorrow Laboratories.

"I wanted her to be an alternate for this duty. When we first started out I didn't realize how much time it would take. I still need her in the office for administrative support so I try to limit her time on the road to Mondays and Fridays," Shellogg said.

The Patriot is scheduled throughout the summer and the requests are still coming in, Shellogg said.
