Doing business with small business

Army missile programs set aside millions for small businesses annually

Small business is *big* business at the Missile Command and the program executive offices here where an average of about \$300 million a year in contracts is spent on firms that have a limited number of employees.

These companies represent various classifications, according to the Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization Office here. When making a recommendation for a contract, the first category SADBUC considers is "8a." This is a Small Business Administration certification for firms that are at least 51 percent minority-owned, socially disadvantaged, and economically disadvantaged.

The second classification is small disadvantaged businesses, and the third target area is small businesses in general. Under certain standard industrial codes, small businesses can have as many as a thousand employees but usually small business sizes average between 200 and 300 employees. Of the \$300 million a year in small business contracts, from \$80 million to \$100 million is usually awarded to small disadvantaged businesses and 8a firms. Contract dollars can be "set aside" or earmarked specifically for particular type companies.

"A set-aside means we are restricting the players to those contractors that have the classification which it is set aside to," explained Dr. Rex Connors, associate director at SADBUC. A public law in 1958 established the Small Business Administration in addition to SAD-

Small disadvantaged businesses grow with contracts

There are many success stories involving small disadvantaged businesses or 8a certified firms.

Often they have started as just one person's idea and have grown to multimillion-dollar operations within a few years. Founders/presidents of these companies can trace their prosperity to hard work, persistence, and high-tech contracts they have received.

Here are just a few examples of the American Dream in action.

SciTek

SciTek is a small disadvantaged business which has graduated from the 8a category.

"We are a research and engineering company," said Jerry Crutcher, president of SciTek. The firm has about 210 employees.

SciTek was started in April 1976 by Crutcher and other partners: Buford Crutcher, his brother, and Robert Richardson.

About 1984 the company received the Learning Resource Center contract here and is working its last option. Around the same time frame, SciTek received a contract with the Automatic Engineering Documentation Preparation System (AEDPS) at System Engineering and Production Directorate. That contract ended about 1989.

SciTek also has a contract with the Army Corps of Engineers with the 1391 processor: "We did both the computer work design and training for that," Crutcher added. The company is working the final option for this contract.

"There's two things," Crutcher said, when asked how the Army contracts have impacted SciTek. "It helped me to build expertise and to gain some personnel for competing. But also, there's two sides to every

story. One as you build expertise, when the options run out those contracts usually go someplace else and it's kind of tough for an SDB (small disadvantaged business) now in this area. And that's been a problem for most SDBs here in Huntsville."

Summa Technology

Summa Technology is an 8a company which began as a one-man operation in 1987. Pony Lee, the president, started the company in the middle of '87. "We really didn't open our doors (for business) till '88," he said.

"We're an engineering firm. We're engineering services — hardware and software design and development — mainly for military defense electronics or defense systems," Lee said. It has about 80 employees.

Summa Technology has three ongoing Army contracts awarded in late 1989 with the Hawk Project Office, the Missile Logistics Center and the Strategic Defense Command (in the area of survivability and systems analysis); an Air Force contract with Patrick Air Force Base, Fla.; and several contracts with large corporations. "By the end of the calendar year, our sales will be I would guess between \$9 million and \$10 million (for this year alone)," Lee said. The contract values of course are much larger, spread over say five years.

"It certainly has got us into a very highly technical engineering arena that we aspired to get into," Lee said, referring to how his company has benefited from the Army contracts. "It was a good vehicle that allowed us to get into a hardware and software design and development arena."

TEC-MASTERS Inc.

TEC-MASTERS Inc. is an 8a company which was

started in 1988 by Dr. Marvin Carroll, its president and chief executive officer. The firm now has 18 employees.

"We do system engineering and technical assistance (SETA) support; we do command, control, communications, computers (C4)/intelligence; and we also do research and engineering," Carroll said. On July 22 the Training and Doctrine Command awarded the company a five-year SETA support contract for the Combat Development Directorate at Fort Sill, Okla.

TEC-MASTERS held a contract with Hydra 70 project from July to November 1989. It won a small business innovative research contract with Communications Electronics Command in September 1990 for a six-month phase which ended about last June. This phase 1 effort was for \$50,000. "We have submitted a proposal for phase 2 which is worth a half million dollars for a period of two years, and we are anticipating an award for that phase 2 effort," Carroll added.

From the very beginning, he has found it beneficial to go to prime contractors to find subcontracting work. TEC-MASTERS has done subcontracting work for Hughes Aircraft Company, Olin Ordnance Inc., Nichols Research, Uwohali Inc. (an 8a company), Codar Inc., Martin Marietta, and EER Inc.

"The Army has really served as an excellent source of business," Carroll said. "One thing is that you have got to get out there and market yourself. You have got to sell yourself because there are other companies that can do the same thing TEC-MASTERS can."

"One thing I've found, first and foremost you've got to have quality people and be able to work well with your customers. And the success of the business is driven by your willingness to go the extra mile. And I

Air defense system proving reliable

WASHINGTON — An Army review panel recommended Aug. 1 that the Line of Sight Forward-Heavy mobile air defense missile system proceed to the next phase of reliability testing.

The action came after Col. James Patterson, project manager, reported that the system had achieved an officially-scored 66.4 hours mean time between hardware mission failure (MTBHM) in the first phase of reliability testing that began June 3. The Army had set 30 hours MTBHM as the standard to be achieved in the Exit Point A tests.

Two fire units operated by soldiers compiled 1128.67 mission hours of testing at Orlando, Fla., with a total of 17 hardware mission failures as of July 26 when Army scorers met to assess the results. The fire

units continued the test cycle until July 31, compiling more than 150 additional mission hours without further failures.

Exit Point B tests will begin next month at White Sands Missile Range, N.M.

The LOSF-H met or exceeded every Army performance requirement during operational testing last summer, but the system's reliability and availability did not meet Army standards.

The Army decided then not to seek approval to begin production of the weapon and instead told Martin Marietta Missile Systems, the prime contractor, to bring the system up to Army reliability standards. The special series of tests now underway by the Army are to verify the system's reliability growth.

Small firm requests help in resolving reject rate

The Missile Command's ombudsman, John Finafrock, serves as a sounding board for industry and as a troubleshooter for improving the acquisition process. He provided the following account of one of the 40 cases he has addressed during his first nine months in this position. The issue deals with Quality Verification Sample (QVS) inspections/rejection rate.

"A small Alabama-based electronics firm representative has requested assistance toward resolving their current (high) QVS reject rate. The ombudsman ar-

ranged for a technical session between senior personnel of MICOM and the contractor to discuss this problem.

"This issue has not been resolved but the contractor and MICOM personnel are looking at his soldering process," stated Finafrock's account. Industry representatives can visit him at the command headquarters building in room A-147 (where he moved Monday from room B-200) or call 876-6659/7145.

BU offices, and mandated that small companies have the opportunity to do business for the government.

Historically black colleges and universities represent the newest target area for small business contracting. A public law in 1988 tasked government agencies to direct 5 percent of their educationally-targeted contract dollars toward Historically Black Colleges and Universities/Minority Institutions. Progress here in this particular category has been slow. Only about \$100,000 total for several training contracts has been spent with historically black colleges so far this fiscal year. "We're hoping to double that by the end of the fiscal year," Conners said.

SADBU's "vitalization program" for boosting the number of contracts with Historically Black Colleges and Universities/Minority Institutions include the following initiatives:

- Quarterly briefings to the Command Group and the Research Development and Engineering Center director.
 - Emulate Strategic Defense Command's successful HBCU/MI program.
 - Focus on known quality engineering universities, including Tennessee State, Tuskegee University and Alabama A&M University.
 - Broaden the HBCU/MI focus to include more than just training contracts; expand to other contracting areas such as research and development, missile logistics and some of the support activities.
 - Include HBCU/MI subcontracting requirements on all institutional acquisitions, and others where applicable.
 - Conduct an HBCU/MI conference in November.
- The latter initiative, the conference, is scheduled for Nov. 19 at the Von Braun Civic Center. This procurement fair will enable representatives of historically black colleges and universities to meet with Army representatives. "We're going to marry up their scientists with our scientists to see if we can generate ideas that are mutually beneficial," Conners said.

Two people in his nine-member office visit potential 8a contractors throughout the U.S. and Puerto Rico, and will be making stops at historically black colleges and universities during early fiscal 1992. George

Rosenbloom and David Merta qualify as SADBU's frequent flyers. Through the 8a firms' marketing efforts and the Small Business Administration, they visit potential contractors that fit the needs of the Army missile team. "We pick out ones that meet our requirements," Merta said.

Conners and other members of his office — Bertie Lipscomb, Lee Ford and Dwight Kimbrell — often attend conferences to tell small businesses how they might become government contractors. "We assist them in any way we can to do business with the government," Lipscomb said.

The satisfaction from a small-contracting success story is shared by both the government and the company. The government can expand its industrial base and get a responsive contractor at usually a cheaper price. The company can increase its revenue and grow.

"We get to see the American Dream in action," Conners said. "We get to see small businesses evolve."

cannot overemphasize the fact that you must surround yourself with quality people," he said. "And after having those quality people, you must listen to them. This total exercise represented some unexplored roads but fortunately there are some people that traveled these roads before, and it's the pulling together that expertise that produced team success."

He pointed out that while his background is in hardware, the company also has software capability. The vice president, Jan Smith, is a woman whose "background is very strong on the software side," Carroll said.

Carroll added that he mainly attributes the company's success to God. "I couldn't make it without my spiritual life," he said.

The Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization Office at the Missile Command has provided helpful assistance. "The MICOM SADBU, Dr. (Rex) Conners, has been an excellent source of information and advice. He has indeed," Carroll said. He added that Conners' counterpart at Strategic Defense Command, Virginia Wright, has been just as helpful.

Hospital commander eyes wider gateway to care

The new commander of Fox Army Community Hospital hopes to expand services available through the hospital, especially for family members and retirees.

Col. Percy Dunagin has assumed command during a time in which a number of changes are on the horizon for Army hospitals under the Health Services Command. These are changes in the area of management, particularly financial management. Hospital commanders and their staffs will be given more authority to make decisions on the types of services they will provide and the resources they will use.

"One of my objectives is to implement this program of more localized financial management. It's called Gateway to Care," Dunagin said. "We think for us it's going to begin next summer, no later than next summer; but in the meantime, we prepare for it of course. One of the features of this program is that it's going to give the patients more choice on where they receive their care."

Gateway to Care will target current users of the direct care system and Champus for voluntary enrollment in a specific benefit plan. As participants enroll, they will be assigned to primary or multispecialty care clinics with the military treatment facility. Arrangements will be made with civilian medical care networks to augment the direct care system by providing referral treatment at reduced rates.

This new approach to management may mean referring more services outside, as the hospital currently does with obstetrics, or providing additional services in-house. "It's going to depend on the ability to provide quality service in a cost-effective manner," Dunagin said.

Dunagin became Fox Hospital's commander July 18 after commanding the medical element at Joint Task Force- Bravo in central Honduras from November 1990 through June. "We provided in a smaller way

essentially the same services," he said, referring to coming from a 12-bed hospital in a field environment to the 40-bed facility here. "My job as a manager is essentially the same."

A 56-year-old native of Spartanburg, S.C., Dunagin has 17 years of military service. He joined the Army in 1954 and reached the rank of specialist before leaving in 1957 to go to school. Twenty years later, he returned to the Army and has been in ever since. Dunagin received a bachelor's degree in chemistry in 1960 from Southern Missionary College in Collegedale, Tenn.; a doctorate in biochemistry from the University of Florida in 1964; a medical degree from Loma Linda (Calif.) University in 1968; and a master's of business

administration from Webster University in St. Louis in 1990. His medical specialty is nuclear medicine which he explained as basically "diagnosis and treatment of disease through use of radioisotopes."

He and his wife, Betty, have four sons: Daniel, 28, Charles, 26, Michael, 22, and Percy "Pat" III, 20. The youngest son is in his final year at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point where he is majoring in computer science.

Dunagin's sports hobbies include sailing, snow skiing, shooting and golf — "I'm a beginning golfer," he said. His other hobbies include auto mechanics and photography.

"I think the hospital is physically well-laid out and equipped. It has a well-organized, efficient and highly motivated staff," Dunagin said.

"We would like to expand the services that will be available through this hospital, especially to the dependents and the retirees. That's one of my hopes."

Lt. Gen. Franks nominated to command TRADOC

FORT MONROE, Va. — Lt. Gen. Frederick M. Franks Jr., commander of the Army's VII Corps in Germany, has been nominated by President George Bush to be the next commander of Training and Doctrine Command.

Franks will take over from Gen. John W. Foss, who has led TRADOC since August 1989. Foss is retiring after 30 years active duty.

A change of command ceremony has been scheduled Aug. 23 at Fort Monroe.

Franks commanded the VII Corps in action in Saudi Arabia during Operation Desert Storm.

Born Nov. 1, 1936, at West Lawn, Pa., he is a 1959 West Point graduate.

He served at TRADOC headquarters from June 1978 to January 1982 in the office of the deputy chief of staff for combat developments, and then as the executive officer to the TRADOC commander.

Commissioned an armor officer, Franks saw combat in Vietnam from 1969 to 1970, where he was wounded.

Then followed a succession of command and staff assignments in Europe, Texas, Virginia, Kansas and Washington, D.C.

Franks has been awarded the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Distinguished Service Medal, Silver

Star, two Legions of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star with "V" device, Purple Heart and Meritorious Service Medal.

He holds two master's degrees from Columbia University in English and philosophy. (TRADOC News Service)

Under the program the Army projects sending up to 10 active duty commissioned officers to law school at government expense if funding permits. Selected officers will attend law school beginning in the fall of 1992. Officers selected remain on active duty while attending law school.

Interested officers should review chapter 14, Army Regulation 27-1 (the Judge Advocate General's Funded Legal Education Program) to determine their eligibility. The program is open to officers in the ranks of second lieutenant through captain with at least two but not more than six years of total active duty service (officer and enlisted) at the time legal training begins.

Eligible officers interested in applying should immediately register for the fall offering of the Law

School Admission Test. The original application must be sent through command channels, to include the officer's branch manager at the Total Army Personnel Office, and be received in the Office of the Judge Advocate General (Attn: DAJA-PT), Washington, D.C. 20310-2206, by Nov. 1, 1991. Submission of the application well in advance of the deadline date is advised.



Worker takes crack at growing tomatoes in concrete

So much for all you tomato growers who carefully choose a garden spot, prepare the soil, and nurture your plants to maturity.

Meet a man who drops tomato seeds in concrete cracks and grows 3-foot-tall tomato plants.

Fred Payne, Commissary lead meat cutter, is in his 12th year of growing tomatoes under the rear loading deck at the Commissary. Tomatoes came up by themselves in 1980, and Payne has been planting seeds every year since.

"I take a knife to loosen down in the crack, and then I push the seed down with a broom handle," Payne said.

He planted the seeds this year on March 5. He waters them as needed. The plants get morning sun and he stakes them to keep them upright, he said.

He recalls that in 1989, when the first frost of the year killed the plants, he counted 187 small tomatoes still on the plant.

Although the foliage is lush and the fruit succulent looking, Payne said he would be afraid to eat them.

"We use strong chemicals to clean out here," he said, pointing to the area where all the meat coming into the Commissary gets unloaded.

"All those chemicals and cleaning solutions wash

down onto the ground and seep into where the tomatoes grow. I wouldn't think it would be a good idea to eat them," he said.

A couple of years ago however, a man decided to pick a basket of the tomatoes for eating. Payne warned him of the possible risk of eating tomatoes whose roots may have absorbed chemicals, bleach and battery acid.

"Quite frankly, I didn't know if I'd ever see him alive again after he took those tomatoes home. But he's still alive and well," Payne said, laughing.

He grows the plants simply for the novelty of it. He said it's pretty amazing to see the plants rising out of the concrete pavement.


Each year at the end of the growing season, when he pulls the plants out of the crack, gravel and sand are attached to a 2-foot root system.

"I guess there's enough dirt somewhere under there to nourish the plant. But directly under the concrete there's a bed of sand and gravel," Payne said.

He started out this year with 14 plants but a few got destroyed in the loading/unloading process at the dock, Payne said.

Payne has 35 years of government service and has been with the Redstone Arsenal Commissary since 1959. He said he will be retiring in a few years and

hopes to spend more time growing tomatoes — ones he can eat.




PAVEMENT PLANTS — Payne shows the tomato plants sprouting from the rear loading deck at the Commissary.





Defense Department continues anti-terrorism struggle

Terrorist attacks aimed at the United States and its allies continue, with many Third World nations unable to effectively combat the problem.

A local terrorist is just as "dedicated and dangerous as his international counterpart," said James R. Locher III, assistant secretary of defense for special operations and low-intensity conflict. "He is on familiar ground with many places to hide until he is ready to strike. Most Third World countries where these terrorists are active have yet to create an internal security apparatus capable of controlling the terrorist environment."

He said adequate security is available for U.S. installations, but called public places a "no-man's land" where everyone is vulnerable as a target. Addressing about 150 anti-terrorist experts at a DoD worldwide conference in June in Colorado Springs, Colo., Locher said more than 75 deaths in April and May can be attributed to local terrorist bombings.

Indiscriminate bombings that kill innocent people, many of whom are women and children, are becoming less of a worry to terrorists, he asserts. At the same time, established international terrorist organizations still threaten U.S. interests worldwide.

"They have many scores to settle as a result of their setbacks during Operation Desert Storm," Locher said. "We must assume they are as well prepared as they have ever been to launch terrorist operations."

That incidents weren't widely publicized during the gulf war doesn't mean terrorists took a holiday. On the contrary, he said, local terrorist groups caused much damage "as prospects for funding and fame became more achievable."

Incidents during the active combat phase of Operation Desert Storm and for several weeks following the cease-fire indicate an ever-increasing cause for worry, he said. The number of terrorist incidents in the first 10 weeks of 1991 almost equals the total for all of 1990, he remarked. Attacks against the United States and its coalition partners, Locher noted, included more than 340 explosive and incendiary incidents, eight assassinations, 26 armed attacks, nine episodes of mob violence and numerous cases of vandalism of U.S. official and privately owned vehicles.

A few months before Saddam Hussein invaded Kuwait, Locher said, Iraq was not on the U.S. government's formal list of state sponsors of terrorism, nor was it believed to be a source of possible chemical and biological warfare.

"The events of Aug. 2, 1990, and the specter of terrorism on a global scale may not have appeared in our crystal ball and may have totally surprised some of us," he said. But, he added, thanks to previous efforts, the United States established an anti-terrorism program capable of thwarting a substantial terrorist challenge. That the program worked is evident by terrorists' failure to stop the movement of half a million U.S. troops and shiploads of weapons and supplies.

"Their lack of success is reflective of the excellent (anti-terrorism) planning completed before we moved combat forces into the theater of operations and is a credit to the effective adjustments that were made once we had troops on the ground," said the assistant secretary.

Locher said today's world is a world of disputes and disorders. "Our immediate terrorist adversaries come from diverse societies and harbor fervent anti-U.S. sentiments." Many of these groups have weapons and equipment capable of producing mass destruction, death and injury. Reports of terrorists seeking bigger and better weapons, particularly rocket-propelled munitions, are frequent, he said.

"Success in...combating terrorism is hard to measure," Locher told the audience, asking them to remain relentless in the quest for better ways and means to combat terrorism in a radically altered global security environment.

Polygraph results banned from courts-martial

WASHINGTON — Polygraph test results can no longer be presented as evidence in courts-martial.

The exclusion of so-called "lie-detector" test results from military trials is part of a package of changes to the Manual for Courts-Martial signed June 27 by President George Bush. The MCM, established by executive order, establishes rules and procedures for the mechanisms of military justice — non-judicial punishments, investigations and courts-martial.

All the changes resulted from annual reviews of the manual conducted in 1988 and 1989.

According to Maj. Eugene Milhizer of the Office of the Judge Advocate General's criminal law division, the prohibition on polygraph evidence doesn't prevent the use of polygraph tests during military investigations. Instead, it only prevents the results of those tests from being introduced as evidence at courts-martial.

"There's a danger that polygraph results have an aura of infallibility about them," Milhizer said. "That could be misleading during a trial."

Indeed, a change to the Analysis Accompanying the Manual for Courts-Martial, an enclosure to the manual, says that "to the extent that the (court) members accept polygraph evidence as unimpeachable or conclusive...the members' traditional responsibility to collectively ascertain the facts and adjudge guilt or innocence is pre-empted."

"The reliability of polygraph evidence places a burden on the administration of justice that outweighs the probative value of the evidence," it added.

Milhizer said that under the earlier version of the manual, polygraph evidence could be presented at the presiding military judge's discretion.

The revisions also include an amendment that says starting the engine of a motor vehicle is considered to be "operating" the vehicle in drunk driving cases.

Another change allows the prosecution to initiate negotiations on pre-trial agreements. Previously, only the defense could propose pre-trial agreements, which allow accused soldiers to enter a guilty plea in exchange for a reduced sentence. Both the accused and the courts-martial convening authority must sign the pre-trial agreement.

"Pre-trial agreements often benefit everyone," Milhizer said. "They remove the need for the prosecution to prove its case, saving time and money. They can also spare victims the trauma of a trial, in some offenses."

To determine if a soldier voluntarily entered into a pre-trial agreement, military judges are required to conduct extensive "providence" inquiry into guilty pleas. For their part, accused soldiers who plead guilty must provide sworn confessions.

Two maximum sentences under the manual were increased. Attempted murder now carries a maximum punishment of life imprisonment, while escape from confinement can be punished by up to five years imprisonment. (Arnews)





RADS tied the game with five runs in the fourth and


added four more in the sixth to down the Scud Patrol 9 to 5.

Minority school develops computer program

FORT MONROE, Va. — The first prototype computer software program developed by a historically black university for the Army has been presented to the Training and Doctrine Command's deputy chief of staff for resource management (DCSRM).

Morris Brown University in Atlanta devised the decision support system under a program sponsored by the Army's Information Systems Command.


"The computer code developed by Morris Brown University gives DCSRМ the capability to gather information from several different data bases and present it in a usable format," said Lt. Col. Frank Labrecque, a decision support systems officer in Training and Doctrine Command's integrated systems office.

"This decision support system is the first of its kind to be developed for the Army by a minority college or university."

The benefit to the Army, according to Labrecque, is that it increases the number of institutions capable of developing computer science technology for the Army. He pointed out that industry has routinely sponsored similar programs with schools around the country.

"It provides the opportunity for graduate and undergraduate students, as well as professors, to use their tremendous skills, knowledge and capabilities," he said. (TRADOC News Service)



Total-quality leaders have a fun day of training

A day of sharing and fun was held Friday for Redstone Arsenal's Total Quality Management cadre members who have completed the four-week training.

Hosted by the Information Systems Command at its facility which opened in May, ISC director Bob Payne and his staff made the day possible. Joan McWilliams, Personnel and Training Directorate's TQM training coordinator, was also responsible for planning the day's events. The ISC Facility is located on Metro Circle, just off Leeman Ferry Road.

Each Missile Command organizational element was represented at the training day, with some 100 attending, according to Tammy Terry, one of five ISC facilitators.

More than 175 MICOM employees have completed the four-week TQM training, Terry said. That person then goes back to his organization and shares with co-workers what he has learned. He may also be called upon to conduct TQM training sessions in other organizational elements.

Various cadre members shared with the group what is being done in his organization about TQM, how far along the organization is and what future plans are.

TQM means better understanding current processes and streamlining those processes.

"The whole purpose of TQM is to make everyone more aware and give them tools to improve their work environment and equipment. The key word is building teams," Terry said.

"TQM looks to change the culture of the workplace. Teamwork, quality, continuous improvement and customer/supplier relations — these are the things TQM is all about," added Romy Rowe, another TQM facilitator at the ISC facility.

Mel Waters, MICOM's TQM executive officer, told the group that after participating in a Department of the Army video-conference a couple of weeks ago and hearing the questions other DA people were asking about TQM, he realized how far MICOM has come in development of its TQM initiative.

"They were asking the same questions we were asking two years ago (about TQM)," Waters said.

In TQM, government is leading industry, Waters said, quoting Dr. W. Edwards Deming, one of the leading proponents of quality management in American industry.

Pets may prefer to wait while owners pound pavement

I'm a runner. It's a love-hate relationship I admit, but I continue to pound the pavement for the health of it. Many people share my compulsion for running. This increased interest in running and physical fitness in general has, not surprisingly, also resulted in a significant rise in sports related injuries. As a veterinarian, I see injuries in pets that are caused by overexercise when they become partners in their owner's quest for fitness. Additionally, people ask me for guidance as to how much exercise a dog needs, or can tolerate, without producing injury.

The ability to tolerate exercise is based on a person's age, physical health, and their existing level of fitness. You don't expect a 7-year-old child to run a 10 kilometer race as well as the 35-year-old who is running from middle age. Dogs are no different, but because dogs come in many shapes and sizes the situation is somewhat confused. Variation in size means that different breeds of dogs mature at different ages. Variation in shape is a reminder that people developed different breeds of dogs for different purposes. The short, tubular Dachshund was bred to hunt in burrows. And while they mature by 1 year of age, they are still not able to accompany their owner in a 10K training run because of their conformation. The long and lean Afghan, on the other hand, is a sight hound bred to hunt game by running it to the ground. Now this is a dog to train for marathons with. Because they are a larger breed, however, they mature at an older age. The 1-year-old Afghan dog is no more ready to run a marathon than a 7-year-old child is.

If you do take your dog out for runs, or even long walks, be aware of the signs that indicate that your pet might be having a problem. Limping is an obvious sign of musculoskeletal pain. Unfortunately it is not very

If your pet fails to share your enthusiasm for the ecstasies of agonal respiration remember that "No pain, no gain" is definitely not in a dog's vocabulary.

specific, and may be a sign of a sprained ligament, a strained muscle, or skeletal abnormalities such as hip dysplasia or stifle (knee) problems. Pain, weakness, stiffness, swollen joints or an unusual gait are more subtle signs that your pet might be having trouble.
