Smoke detector saves lives in apartment fire

Fire Prevention Week theme: 'Fire won't wait... Plan your escape'

It was a peaceful Saturday afternoon; and a man and his 2-year-old daughter were asleep on the couch in their living room on Redstone Arsenal. Little did they suspect the life-threatening developments in one of the bedrooms.

The man's 5-year-old son was sitting on the floor in front of the closet in the boy's bedroom, and playing with a lighter. The flame ignited some clothing at the base of the closet. The boy's mother wasn't home; and his father and sister were still asleep in the other room.


Fortunately, the smoke detector sounded and woke up the man. He went to the bedroom and saw the boy sitting on the floor watching the fire. The family was able to escape, exit the front door, run next door and call authorities. Military police were notified first, then the MPs called the fire department.

"If it hadn't been for that smoke detector, there's no telling what would've happened to that family," said fire inspector Hal Meadows. "And that goes hand in hand with the slogan for (Fire Prevention Week) this year."

The slogan for Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 6-12, is "Fire Won't Wait... Plan Your Escape!" Fortunately, the family members were not asleep in the rear bedroom because the fire moved quickly down the hallway and they would have had to use a different means of escape. They would have had to exit by a window rather than the front door.

This fire, reported at 12:45 p.m. May 25, caused \$58,000 in damage including about \$13,000 worth of contents belonging to the family. The blaze occurred in one of the two upstairs apartments in a six-plex building; there was some water damage to the four apartments downstairs. There were no injuries or deaths. "But it could've been if it hadn't been for the smoke detector," Meadows added.

Twenty-two reportable fires — any fire resulting in dollar loss — occurred on post from Jan. 1 through Sept. 24. Fourteen were structural fires, seven involved vehicles, and one was a grass fire. The total loss was \$442,688, including \$53,813 in Army losses. The

faithful residential fire in May resulted in the most Army losses. A Thiokol explosion Aug. 24, involving 1,500 pounds of rocket fuel, damaged a test stand; this resulted in the most contractor losses, \$350,000. "It was a test being done for the Army by Thiokol people," said fire inspector Robert Clarke. "They had overpressurization which caused it to explode."

A similar total, 21 reportable fires, had occurred by this time last year. The difference so far is there has been no equivalent to the Feb. 26, 1990 fire which caused \$6 million in damage at the

Millimeter/Microwave Simulation Facility construction site at building 5400.

That major construction site fire resulted in a new addition this year to Redstone fire department's fleet: a 100-foot-ladder truck. The department's 85-foot-ladder truck could not reach the upper floors of the high bay area at building 5400, according to fire inspector Jim Hughes. In order to rescue two construction workers, scaffolds had to be placed on the south side of the building; and a hole was cut in the wall between the fourth and fifth floor. The new 100-foot-ladder truck was purchased this summer for \$247,000 in Army Materiel Command funds. It can pump 1,000 gallons of water per minute. Pierce Company, the manufacturer, sent a representative here to conduct weeklong training for operators of the truck.

A tanker, an all-terrain vehicle which can carry 1,200 gallons of water, is the fire department's other new addition. Its main job is to carry water to a fire scene where water supply may be inadequate. The tanker can pump 250 gallons per minute to fight fires in isolated land areas.

To report a fire on post, dial 117 if calling from a government phone or 876-2117 if calling from a non-government phone such as in the housing areas.

Redstone Fire Department is authorized 55 people. They include chief Bill Cross; assistant chiefs Willie Pope and Tom Stephens; fire inspectors Meadows, Clarke, Hughes and Art Murtha; secretary Barbara Ransom; eight captains, 12 drivers and 27 firefighters. The department's first female firefighters, Toni Mialki and Sandy Boyd, arrived this year. Sandy is a driver at station 2 while her husband, Joey, is a firefighter at station 1.

The four fire stations include: No. 1 at Rideout Road; No. 2 at Vincent and Redeye Roads; No. 3 at Patton and Redstone Roads; and No. 4 at the airfield. "We'd like to emphasize that people or vehicle drivers should stop in front of the stations when vehicles are pulling out or backing into the station," Hughes said.

Clerical job reclassifications reflect automation duties

A decision by the Office of Personnel Management to create a new occupational series to cover office automation work will soon affect some 2,000 jobs serviced by the Civilian Personnel Office here.

In a move that finally considers the use of word processing to be different from straight typing duties, all federal activities have been given 18 months to look at clerical positions and apply this new occupational guidance, according to Lori Reynolds, chief of the Position Management and Classification Branch.

Those employees who use office automation software in the performance of general office support work will be placed in the new Office Automation Clerical and Assistance Series, GS-326, Reynolds said.

GS-4 positions will carry the title Office Automation Clerk and GS-5 and above positions will be titled Office Automation Assistant, according to OPM's position classification standards.

Clerk typists

One of the primary clerical job series being affected here is the GS-322 clerk typist series. While the GS-322 series has not been eliminated by OPM, it's not likely that very many local positions will remain in that category, Reynolds said.

"Only a small percentage of the jobs classified as

GS-322 clerk-typist will remain in that series, because these days it's very hard to find any clerk typist who doesn't at least use a memory typewriter," she explained.

Formerly, the clerk-typist series covered employees who used manual or electric typewriters, as well as employees who operated electronic (memory) typewriters, word processors or computer terminals to produce documents, as long as the skill of a qualified typist was the primary prerequisite and purpose of the job.

Now, those typists who use electronic test storage and retrieval methods will be excluded from the GS-322 series, and covered by the new GS-326 office automation occupational field.

Positions to be reclassified into the new GS-326 series, like those now in the clerk-typist series, also require fully qualified typists to produce textual documents, either solely or in combination with general office clerical work.

But unlike clerk-typist positions, positions changed to the GS-326 series will be those that require a knowledge of office automation hardware and software systems.

GS-318s retitled

GS-318 secretarial positions which serve as the prin-

cipal office clerical or administrative support and use office automation technology to accomplish their work would not be reclassified as a result of this new guidance.

Most, however, would have the "office automation" statement added on to the present position title. For example, a present GS-318 Secretary (Typing) would be changed to GS-318 Secretary (Office Automation). The abbreviation OA may be used.

A present GS-318 Secretary (Stenography) would be changed to Secretary (Stenography/OA) when both stenographic and office automation skills are necessary to perform the assigned work.

Impact on other jobs

Many positions with specialized clerical duties, such as procurement clerks, personnel clerks, civilian pay clerks, editorial assistants, and supply technicians, for example, also require office automation skills to perform assigned duties. But these positions are excluded from the GS-326 series because a knowledge of the specialized subject matter is the primary job requirement. However, like the secretary positions, these jobs will have a change in title, e.g., Personnel Clerk (Office Automation), where appropriate.

TDY for training

Editor:

Seven secretaries (GS-5/6s) in our directorate submitted training requests in June to go TDY to attend a residential workshop entitled, "Residential Workshop for the Professional Secretary." There were two courses being offered: one in December 1991 and the other in April 1992. The courses are sponsored by Office of Personnel Management, Atlanta Region. Secretaries and other administrative support staff at grades GS-5 and above were the targeted audience for this training. The training requests were signed and approved by management in our directorate and forwarded to Civilian Personnel Office for processing. Mr. Jimmy Temple, chief of training management section, Training and Career Management, CPO, sent a memorandum dated Aug. 29 to our directorate returning our training requests without action. Mr. Temple's memorandum stated in part that, "It is the policy of the command to train lower and mid-level clerical/secretarial personnel locally rather than sending them TDY for training courses." He went on to say that they were concerned about the development of clerical/secretarial employees, but another concern is their responsibility to assure training is obtained at the best possible price. I contacted Mr. Temple by telephone and questioned this policy. He informed me that this command does indeed have this "internal" "unwritten" policy in effect. Why is this command so concerned about the best possible price when secretarial/clerical personnel are requesting to go TDY to attend training? But this command will pay the cost for a secretary to go TDY to accompany her boss or technical personnel to take notes. Why would this command have a policy that would deny "lower/mid-level" secretarial/clerical personnel the same opportunity for training that technical or higher level employees have? How will the lower level employees ever become mid/higher level if they are not afforded the same training opportunities as other employees?

Gen. Tuttle signed a memo dated July 24 that emphasized the importance of not diminishing training expenditures even when constraints required difficult budget decisions. He also urged commanders to ensure that there were sufficient funds to meet the training needs of their work force and therefore ensure a work force trained and able to meet mission requirements of the Army. There was an endorsement signed by Gen. Chen along with Gen. Tuttle's memo stating that during fiscal 1990 MICOM's civilian training expenditures were .96 percent of payroll. This reflects a tendency on the part of managers to shortchange needed training in favor of other mission and fiscal priorities. Gen. Chen's endorsement also stated that, "If training

spaces are being canceled because of funding and workload considerations and employees are not receiving needed training, I urge you to rethink your priorities. Training should not be the first victim of the budgetary bottom line." The denial of our training requests due to this command's policy and in order to eliminate travel expenses seems to be in direct conflict to what Gen. Tuttle and Gen. Chen are stressing in their correspondence. To say that secretarial/clerical employees not be granted the same training opportunities as other employees is a clear case of discrimination. This type policy is only "one" of many barriers that exists within this command that inhibits the secretarial/clerical employees their rights to pride in their profession. This policy should be eliminated and all employees should be given the same training opportunities — both locally and TDY. Come on, MICOM, let's stop preaching Total Quality Management and start practicing it! Give us a chance to be all that we can be!

(Editor's note: Jimmy Temple, chief of training management section at Civilian Personnel Office, provided the following response. "As we have stated before, every member of the office team has a role which is critical to the success of the whole team, and the development of the clerical/secretarial member is equal in importance to that of any other member. It is also important (as well as being the policy of the government) to get the most possible out of every dollar spent on training. The Redstone Arsenal commuting area is blessed with a wealth of training resources which cover most training needs of junior and mid-level clerical and secretarial personnel. Therefore, it is not usually necessary to send these employees on TDY to other locations to obtain training for their skill and career development.

"In response to the writer's specific questions:

"a. 'Why is this command so concerned about the best possible price when secretarial/clerical personnel are requesting to go TDY to attend training? But this command will pay the cost for a secretary to go TDY to accompany her boss or technical personnel to take notes.'

"We are concerned about obtaining the best possible price for all employee training, not only for secretarial/clerical personnel. The purpose of TDY in the two situations cited is entirely different. We are not suggesting that clerical/secretarial employees are never to go TDY, only that TDY for training is usually not necessary for them since there is local training available. The need for secretarial assistance at a location other than the normal duty station is a decision to be made by the individual manager in order to accomplish the mission and is unrelated to the question of TDY for training.

"b. 'Why would this command have a policy that would deny 'lower/mid-level' secretarial/clerical personnel the same opportunity for training that technical or higher level employees have?'

"It is important for all employees to have the training necessary to do their respective jobs. Often the 'technical or higher level' employees referred to by the writer must go elsewhere for the required courses since the training is not available locally.

"c. 'How will the lower level employees ever become mid/higher level if they are not afforded the same training opportunities as other employees?'

"Employees need different training at different junctures of their careers based on many factors including their experience, previous training, position in the organization, grade, performance on the job, and career field guidance, among others. There are many courses available for development of entry and mid-level clerical and secretarial employees, both on a continuous basis and throughout the year.

"The writer is assured that we are as concerned about the development of clerical/secretarial employees as with other employees but in time of downsizing and diminishing resources, another concern is obtaining the best possible training for the best possible price for all employees. We feel that the training policy is consistent with these command statements although we sincerely regret the perception on the part of any group of employees that the policy impacts them adversely."

CFC pins

Editor:

The Combined Federal Campaign or CFC helps thousands of needy individuals and families through the generosity of civilian and military employees worldwide and here in the Redstone Military Community. The Redstone Military Community has always given their fair share and then some. This year's campaign will be no exception. I have had the privilege of serving as a CFC coordinator.

After receiving a CFC pin last year, I was told by my supervisor that it is against MICOM regulations to pin or affix anything on badges. Well, I looked up the regulation and, sure enough, there it was in black and white. MICOM Regulation 190-1, Appendix D, paragraph 3, subparagraph "e" states: "No buttons, pins, or other items will be affixed to or cover the badge." However, many MICOM employees including high-level civilian (SES) and military (general officer) leaders can be seen with CFC and other buttons and decorations on their badges.

My questions are:

1. If we are to ignore this regulation, which other regulations should we ignore?
2. What should I do with my CFC pin this year, other than put it in my desk drawer?
3. Would it not make sense for someone to reword or change the regulation and omit "will be affixed to or" so that information on the badge won't be covered?

I would really appreciate it if someone could give me a straight answer on this. I've tried already without any success. Of course if command policy is to selectively ignore or violate certain regulations, could you please provide me with a complete list? I'd like to be an informed member of this command.

This gave them the flexibility to carry out the missions described in the order to form the Provost Corps, and they had performed this function in the European armies for sometime. It is from this origin that the Military Police derive their insignia of crossed flintlock pistols.

As a side note, the enthusiasm of the dragoons in rounding up these stragglers and deserters, and as "recruiters" led to the verb "to dragoon" becoming a synonym for "to coerce" or "to shanghai."

Loaned executives play important role in charity drive

The Loaned Executive program is fairly new to the Huntsville Area Combined Federal Campaign. This year the program has been expanded to include one full-time and eight part-time loaned executives.

The Loaned Executive (LE) concept has been used by the United Way and several of the larger government campaigns for a number of years. The main duty of the LEs is presenting informational campaign rallies throughout the 32 government agencies and the 50 or so Missile Command organizations. These rallies are not intended to sound like a used car sales pitch. There is no hard sell. The loaned executives also assist the

Local Federal Coordinating Committee chairman with any other coordinating duties as required. Public speaking experience is not necessarily a requirement, but each LE will have plenty of opportunities to talk to all levels and sizes of groups as they meet with the more than 21,000 government workers in this area. The overall experience is well worth it for anyone fortunate enough to be involved.

All LEs take a one-week training course sponsored through the local United Way. This covers group motivation, self-motivation, and limited "crowd" control. It also gives the loaned executive enough background to answer questions intelligently.

One important purpose of the LE program is to train next year's Local Federal Coordinating Committee chairman. The full-time LE will begin work when

the formal training starts sometime in early August and will normally work several weeks after the campaign until the final tally is computed, thank you letters have been given out, and the final report ceremony is completed. The part-time LEs will attend the initial training, but do very minimal work until the campaign actually starts. Then, they would hit the campaign trail (part time) to help all of the financial chairs give their rallies.

We are very fortunate to have such a talented group of loaned executives to help with this year's campaign. They come from a variety of backgrounds and agencies: Byron Butler from Marshall Space Flight Center; George Gunter from the Missile Logistics Center; Chuck Jones from Security Assistance Management Directorate; Larry Jones from Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) Browns Ferry; Bertha Porter from Procurement Directorate; Nancy Rostollan from Research, Development and Engineering Center; Gwendolyn Sadler from Redstone Arsenal Support Activity; Glenda Winston from Test Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment Activity; and Ronald Young from TVA Browns Ferry.

The LE experience and training should really benefit anyone looking for a challenge. Managers should look forward to having their employees participate in the program. The practical experience gained by the loaned executive will carry over to the job site long after the campaign has ended.

Office automation

Office automation refers to the use of electronic systems to provide general clerical office support. Electronic systems used in an office environment include hardware and software components. When used together, these components are capable of storing, retrieving, manipulating, transferring, computing and printing information.

Hardware components include, but are not limited to, electronic typewriters, word processors, personal computers, work stations (keyboards and visual displays) linked to a computer, and associated equipment such as printers, optical scanners and modems, according to the Office of Personnel Management guide.

Typical types of software used in office automation work include word processing, electronic mail, calendar, project management, database management, desk-top publishing, graphics and spreadsheet.

The Civilian Personnel Office has already started working with supervisors to review clerical jobs for all the organizations it serves.

In those activities participating in Managing Civilians to Budget, where supervisors have been delegated authority to classify positions, CPO will advise and assist supervisors in identifying what positions are affected and what changes need to be made.

In those activities not covered by MCB, the CPO position classification specialists will make the final determination to effect the new guidance from Office

of Personnel Management. They have devised a questionnaire in which supervisors and clerical employees answer questions about the type of software and/or hardware used.

In many cases the CPO classification specialists can determine if the job should or should not be reclassified or retitled based on this preliminary information in the questionnaire.

But in some cases a job audit may be required, Reynolds said.

Positive change

"This is a radical change by OPM," Reynolds said. "It's not very often we get a redirection that affects so many positions. This is a change we were happy to see, however. Many employees doing office automation work feel that OPM's recognition of office automation as a separate and distinct occupational series is long overdue."

During the next six months, CPO expects to complete one-third of the evaluations and another third in a year in order to have the last third finished in the 18 months the command has been given to complete the reviews.

Many supervisors have already begun working with CPO to review their clerical positions and some job changes have been completed. Supervisors who have questions concerning this new occupational guidance should contact their assigned position classification specialist.

the stations. The fire inspectors plan a visit to the Youth Center from 9:30-10:30 a.m. Oct. 9 and to the Child Development Center 9:30-10:30 the following morning. Accompanied by Sparky and Pluggie, they plan to teach fire safety to the youngsters. Also, fire prevention displays will be held during the week in the mall area of the Post Exchange.

"We encourage all building fire wardens to contact fire prevention bureau (phone 842-2583/2586) for fire safety training such as fire drills and fire extinguisher demos," Hughes said. "When we do fire drills in facilities here on post we're asking people to close all doors and windows to the room, keep stairwells closed at all times; and by keeping doors closed to the stairwells, this will help prevent the spread of smoke, hot gases, and fire." People should close these doors as they leave the building during a fire drill, he said.



Master's degree recipients told to pursue opportunities

Continuing education opens doors to career advancement, a top NASA official told 46 new recipients of master's degrees here Friday.

J. R. Thompson, deputy administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, was keynote speaker at the commencement luncheon for Florida Institute of Technology graduate center on post. "Continuing education is really the heartbeat and the fuel that drives America," he told the graduates.

Thompson spoke from personal experience. Thirty years ago, he pursued an advanced degree in West Palm Beach, Fla., while working for Pratt and Whitney Aircraft. He enrolled in what was then called the Florida Institute for Continuing University Studies, an extension of the University of Florida, in 1961 and graduated in early 1963. "I can honestly tell you it opened new doors, it gave me new opportunities," he said.

"Continuing education alone won't assure success. But I'll tell you what it will do: It will provide you the solid foundation on which you'll be able to build the career which will follow," Thompson said. "Where you'll go from here will depend on you."

He gave the graduates five points of advice:

- Continuing education is the key. "You can't get enough of it," he said.
- Honesty and integrity are vital. "I believe it should become the anchor in your career as you grow professionally."
- Hard work pays off, but don't look for a quick return. "It's a long term investment."
- Allow for compromise. "You compromise on the tactics, not on the principles."
- Don't be afraid to fail, and aim high. "Setbacks you should view as an opportunity. Learn from them," he said. "Press on."

1989 after 33 months as head of the Marshall Space Flight Center here. He plans to retire in early November and return to Huntsville.

"You have tremendous opportunities and I can only

tell you to take advantage of them," he told the graduates. "Keep the wind at your back and your sails full as you take off on your careers."

Florida Institute of Technology here has its graduations twice a year. There are about 450 students enrolled with FIT on Redstone Arsenal, according to Jack Macris, the resident administrator. Redstone's graduate center of FIT was founded in 1976 by Dr. Leonard Winter who retired from the Army as a colonel in September 1975.

The graduates include military members, Defense Department civilians and Marshall Space Flight Center workers. One of the graduates, Kaye Donovan, received two degrees. Recipients of the master's degrees at the FIT commencement program held Friday at the Officers Club include the following:

AMC librarian impressed by Redstone technical library

The Redstone Scientific Information Center could serve as a role model for other technical libraries, according to the deputy command librarian at higher headquarters.

Jewel Armstrong Player, deputy command librarian at the Army Materiel Command in Alexandria, Va., visited Redstone for the first time Sept. 23-25. She has been in her present position for six months so she was making an orientation visit here. There are 38 libraries throughout AMC.

"This is our largest and probably our most progressive (library). This is the library that gets the ultimate amount of support from local management," Player said, referring to the massive technical library here. "This is obviously a community that recognizes the importance of information in all formats.

"When we think about the world of information management, people fail to realize that librarians have been managing information for years. That's our job: all aspects of information. We house it and we find it; we store it; and most important of all, we disseminate it in a format that users can relate to. And we only disseminate what's important to them," she said. "You can relate a library to a gas station; we're a full service station."

Like many non-governmental libraries, Army libraries are going through a time of diminishing resources: both financial and people. Army libraries must continue to market the value of the added services they provide, according to Player. "The libraries are not a luxury, but they are a must — certainly in any research and development environment," she said.

One of her main functions is to serve as a consultant to the libraries in the field when they have automation needs. The scientific technical integrated library automation system, for example, basically enables a library to combine all of its operations on one computer.

"Most libraries today are going toward automated systems with the ultimate aim of being truly an electronic library," Player said.

At 41 she has been a librarian for 19 years, including 11 years with the government. Player, a native of Miami, Fla., began her Army civilian career in 1979 as a technical services librarian at Fort McPherson, Ga. She subsequently spent three and a half years in Heidelberg, Germany; two years in Seoul, Korea; six months at AMC headquarters; two and a half years at the Pentagon; and returned to AMC last January in her present position. She is deputy to Mary Ann Nowell, the command librarian for Army Materiel Command.

Player has a bachelor's degree in business administration and library science from Prairie View A&M University in Texas, and a master's degree in library science from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. She and her husband, DeWitt, a program analyst in the procurement directorate at AMC headquarters, have two sons: Malcolm, 9, and Marcus, 8.

"It's obviously a very progressive installation that puts a high premium on intellectual development and intellectual activities," Player said, referring to

Redstone Arsenal. "What goes on at Redstone allows the Army to do its job and do it well."

Data package problem resolved for company

He provided the following account of one of the 40 cases he addressed during his first nine months in this position. The issue deals with Mylar Drawing Problems.

"The contracts manager of a small business firm in Tulsa, Okla., called for clarification of a data problem which had not been resolved after several letter exchanges over the past six months.

"A conference call was coordinated between MICOM Weapon Systems Engineering and Contract Data Package Managers with the contractor's Lead Engineer and subcontractor engineering personnel to discuss this problem. The outcome was that the data was correct and the contractor engineering personnel were not familiar with these specific styles of mylar drawing techniques," stated Finafrock's account. Personnel managers put focus on quality awareness

The Personnel and Training Directorate held a Total Quality Management awareness day Friday to familiarize its employees with TQM.

"We want to give our employees an overview on what TQM is all about and explain the basic concepts," Ron Slaughter, TQM coordinator for the directorate, said.

He introduced Maj. Gen. William Chen, commander of the Missile Command, as the "father of TQM at MICOM." Chen defined the mission of MICOM and explained how TQM can be used in a white-collar environment.

"We don't manufacture a product. We process information, whether it's a technical data proposal, an engineering change proposal or paperwork that results in someone getting hired. We have customers and while most think of our customer as the soldier in the field, not many of us ever talk to them."

Chen explained that our customers include contractors, who receive information about government contracts from us in the form of a request for proposal, for example. But we're also our own customer, especially in the case of the Personnel and Training Directorate.

"We need to examine our efficiency, production and streamline our process to satisfy customers,"

Chen said. And one way to measure this is in how long it takes us to complete a task.

The decentralized approach to Total Quality Management is what Chen said we strive for at MICOM; that is, each directorate implements its own process based on what each does and how the directorate sees fit to gear its program.

"It takes time. Education and training is the key. We must resist going too fast. The white-collar process is not as easy to quantify as manufacturing. But one way to measure our success is the time it takes to perform a task," Chen said.



Army civilians encouraged to use new wellness center

The program executive officer for air defense toured the new Civilian Wellness Center on Friday and challenged the Army civilian community to start using this free service.

"Do you have any idea what it would cost you to join a facility like this downtown?" Brig. Gen. Robert Drolet said. "That's like a \$500 or \$600 benefit to them per year. That's being offered to them right here on the Arsenal."

Out of an eligible Army civil service population of more than 11,000, some 1,250 have signed up for the wellness center. Of these, 380 have completed wellness screening and received their user card. Males and females are evenly represented.

"The challenge to the civilian community at Redstone is to get off their duff and get in shape," Drolet said.

The 3,500-square-foot facility is the first of its kind on Redstone Arsenal offering Army civilian workers state-of-the-art equipment, including Life Cycles, Stair Masters, Life Rowers, weight lifting machines, and more.

"We aren't just a fitness facility. We're a wellness program," said Elisa Mullins, director of the Civilian Wellness Center. "We're more interested in the whole person. So in that respect, we will do lots of health education classes and awareness lectures."

Mullins is a wellness fitness program coordinator with the U.S. Public Health Service. She and the other four members of her staff are all exercise physiologists.

The center here is the first in the Atlanta region being operated by the Public Health Service, according to Linda Light, the regional wellness fitness coordinator for PHS who was visiting last week from Kansas City, Mo. Fort Rucker operates its own wellness program.

"Redstone is on the cutting edge of leading wellness in the federal civilian sector," Light said. PHS operates wellness centers at federal installations throughout the United States.

This center, which opened Aug. 26, cost about \$150,000. It was partly funded out of the post restaurant system and the civilian recreation fund.

"As entry into the wellness program, you will do a wellness screening," Light said. "Depending on the screening, you may be required to get medical clearance from your physician."

A service for Department of Army civilians, the center at building 4460 on Digney Road is open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. For more information, call 955-6844.





Hispanics have made vital contribution to military

The fact that 37 Medals of Honor have been awarded to Hispanic Americans reflects their contribution to this nation's defense, according to the adjutant general of the New Mexico National Guard.

Maj. Gen. Edward Baca was guest speaker at the National Hispanic Month luncheon held Thursday at the Challenger NCO Club.

"I'm proud to be an American and a citizen of the greatest country in the world. That's where my pride comes from; that's the way I was raised," Baca said.

He said his Hispanic grandfather, although uneducated, was smart enough to teach him that education is the key to becoming part of the mainstream.

"Hispanic Americans have made contributions in many parts of American society — music, the arts, agriculture, industry of all kinds — but no place more than in the military. Hispanic Americans have been awarded 37 Medals of Honor.

"We're not a large percentage of the military, but I think that number indicates we have a high level of bravery," Baca said.

The Medal of Honor is the nation's highest military award given for actions that are above and beyond the

call of duty in combat against an armed enemy. The medal was first awarded by the Army and Navy in 1863. Only 3,417 Medals of Honor have been given.

The New Mexico National Guard, which is predominantly Hispanic, Baca said, has been called on and answered the country's call in every crisis.

Jim Flinn, director of the Missile Logistics Center, was master of ceremonies at the luncheon. Maj. Gen. William Chen, commander of the Missile Command and Redstone Arsenal, gave the welcoming address.

Entertainment for the event was provided by Olivia Martin, who performed a traditional Spanish dance, and guitarists Ronald Thomas and Bill Brinda.





Fort Benning soldiers test fire TOWs, Dragons

Twelve soldiers from the 29th Infantry Division at Fort Benning, Ga., were at Redstone Arsenal last week to test fire TOW and Dragon missiles.

It was part of the Product Assurance Directorate's regular testing of the smaller antitank missile systems to ensure their reliability, according to Phil McGregor of the Redstone Technical Test Center.

Through the stockpile reliability program, missiles stored in desert, arctic and tropic environments are brought in and test fired, McGregor said.

"They're typical samples of the overall (missile) population brought in from the three sites.

"We've had good results with past tests. The missiles show very little degradation after storage," McGregor added.

The TOWs contained live warheads while the Dragons tested had inert warheads.

The soldiers, all TOW and Dragon qualified gunners, were offered the opportunity to come here to participate in the firings, which were conducted at Test Area 6.

Most of the 12 soldiers are cross-trained on both TOW and Dragon. For several, it was the first time to fire the TOW from a Bradley.

"This is a good chance to get training. We do lots of maintenance but this is my first live firing," said Spec. Jeffrey Bingham.

Some 30 TOWs and Dragons, 10 each from the three environments, were tested. Also at Test Area 1

last week, Shillelagh missiles were test fired by civilians here at Redstone, McGregor said. An invitation was extended to the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg, N.C. to perform those tests, but they were unable to come, he said.

Testing had to be halted on Wednesday because of the rain, so the test firings continued through Friday.

The Redstone Technical Test Center, part of the Test and Evaluation Command, was looking at test results last week to see how the missiles performed.

"All the missiles hit the target," McGregor said. Jimmy Webster, lead engineer at Test Area 6, was in charge of the TOW and Dragon tests.

The significance of the 15-year celebration goes back to when the Constitution was originally drafted. Fifteen years passed until the document was ratified.







Computer contract officially ended

The Army has decided not to appeal a ruling by a district court in Washington, D.C., to terminate a contract awarded for a new computer at the Missile and Space Intelligence Center.

The contract awarded in April to Technology Applications Inc. of Alexandria, Va., was terminated for convenience Sept. 12. TAI had received an eight-year contract, with a maximum amount of \$25.6 million, from the local contracting office April 19.

Grumman Data Systems of Bethpage, N.Y., filed a protest April 29 with the General Services Administration board of contract appeals. A judge in Washington ruled that the Army had given information to IBM which was not given to the other offerers.

"A decision was made not to appeal," said Mike Thomason, the contracting officer. "Our plans at this time are to look at re-solicitation." If the Army follows through on re-solicitation, the request package

will probably be ready for release by the end of October.





Helicopter system adds realism to air defense testing

A new system enables helicopters to be flown by remote control as targets for live fire testing.

Native American Services (NAS) Inc. of Huntsville is demonstrating an Advanced Helicopter Control System developed for the Missile Command. This system provides the capabilities to remotely pilot helicopters used as targets for live fire testing of the new Army air defense missile systems.

"The design provides new capabilities for rotary wing targets... to hover over an arbitrary point and to replicate maneuvers performed by threat aircraft. This will give a more realistic test of the performance of the new missile systems," said Jan Robbins, NAS president.

Officers wives' group takes a botanical tour


The Officers Wives Club's Garden Club held its September meeting at a site that was right up its alley: the Huntsville/Madison County Botanical Gardens.

The work is being performed under the technical direction of Dr. John Prater and Richard Eppes of the Research, Development and Engineering Center at the Missile Command.

Key elements of the new system include a Remote Presence System, a Data Communication Subsystem and a digital autopilot. The Remote Presence System, a form of "virtual reality" system presents to the ground-based operator a stereo color video display and stereo audio sensed from the normal pilot head position in the cockpit. This enables the operator to detect and avoid obstacles while flying a few feet above the ground. The Data Communication Subsystem transmits video, audio and aircraft status data from the aircraft to the ground, as well as commands from the ground station to the aircraft. The autopilot, adaptable to various helicopters, allows the aircraft to be flown by technicians/engineers on the ground rather than requiring skilled helicopter pilots. 




