Computer gives visitors directions at their fingertips

Modern technology has arrived at the Visitor Reception Center in the form of an Army Communities of Excellence project.

Redstone visitors can get a printout of the directions to where they want to go at the simple touch of a computerized video screen. The TIPS (Touch for Information Processing) machine is near the information desk in the reception center, building 5105 at Gate 1.

"It gives you a map to go by," explained Jerry Lucas, a programmer in the Information Center for Information Systems Command-MICOM. When a visitor touches the screen for directions to a given organization, the menu-driven system prints out the diagram map that appears on the screen; and the visitor can take the map with him. Directions to most Army buildings on post, as well as the nearby Space and Rocket Center, are available.

The \$19,000 machine, purchased with appropriated funds, was installed in May by the Compudyne company out of Austin, Texas. The Information Center at ISC-MICOM has people to keep the machine maintained and updated when organizations change locations.

"I think it's just an excellent way of providing visitors directions to all the facilities without having to wait in line to ask somebody," said Bob Payne, director of Information Systems Command-MICOM.

"Based on the positive feedback, we'd like to get one more installed," Payne said, referring to the possibility of a machine being installed in the Military Personnel Office for the convenience of soldiers who are inprocessing.

The information machine, in finished wood, is

about 4 feet by 4 feet. It has a "regular IBM-compatible PC" computer inside, Lucas said. "It has a thin film that's mounted over top of the screen that's pressure sensitive."

Use has been moderate so far but should pick up as more people become aware of the machine, according to Sandra Wargo, a security assistant at the Visitor Reception Center which is under the Intelligence and Security Directorate. "We try to encourage use," she said. She and the others behind the desk at the center write down organizations that need to be added. The Space and Rocket Center, for example, was added to the machine because many visitors mistakenly believed this tourist attraction was on post.

In order to use the machine, visitors need to know what directorate or command or project office they want to find. A visitor can then touch the designated part of the screen for directions to that organization. Plans are to modify the system for those visitors who only know a building number. "They're trying to cross-reference it to buildings," said Retha Tallent, a security assistant at the reception center. "So that rather than touch a pad (for a particular organization), you can program in a building number."

About 100 visitors a day walk through the doors of the reception center. The center registers all official visitors to the Missile Command, issues visitor badges and car passes, maintains a contractor facility clearance data base, supports conferences, and reviews/approves contractor security guidance.

Among those who stopped by the center Thursday to view the new machine were Sandra Chen, wife of the MICOM commander; Leah Amato, wife of the chief of staff at Missile Command; Payne, the director of ISC-MICOM; Lucas, programmer, and Randall Knight, chief, of the Information Center for ISC-MICOM; and Jean Keahey, the Missile Command's ACOE (Army Communities of Excellence) program coordinator.

"I think it's really great," Keahey said. "The old way they did it was basically just with a stubby pencil; they drew out the map. Now the visitors are privy to modern technology, in and out. They're planning to put another one in building 3710 (Military Personnel Office) in the near future.

"It's just a marvelous ACOE project that Mr. Payne and his people really did well," she added.

Redstone Arsenal fire department cited as best in AMC

Redstone Fire Department has been named the best in the Army Materiel Command for 1991.

The department received AMC's annual Fire Prevention and Protection Program Award in the category for government-owned, government-operated facilities. "We were tickled to death to get this thing," said Fire Chief Bill Cross, showing the award plaque.

A comprehensive inspection of the department's operations was conducted in April by a fire protection specialist from the AMC Installations and Services Activity at Rock Island, Ill. Areas checked include operational readiness, equipment, records, training, base-population fire prevention training, budget, and installation fire loss.

"This is the first time that we've had this inspection in three years, and we received an excellent rating," Cross said. He accepted the plaque from AMC during the 14th worldwide Army fire chiefs training session which was part of the annual International Fire Chiefs Conference held in Toronto, Canada.

"We worked real hard for it," Cross said, referring to the award. "I think a lot of the credit is going to have to go to people throughout the Arsenal like DEH (Director of Engineering and Housing Dave Branham), our fire marshal. He and RASA (Redstone Arsenal Support Activity) have really gone out of their way to provide the equipment and money that we need to upgrade this department."

In 1989, the department was runner-up to Yuma Proving Ground, Ariz., for the AMC award. Cross told Branham that the department's shortcoming was its lack of a training facility. He and Branham traveled to Yuma that October to see the training facility there. As a result, a new training site has been budgeted for Redstone.

The approximately 5-acre site, just east of the Airfield, is to include the following features: a three-story burn building for simulating structure fires, a burn pit

for burning aviation fuel to simulate aircraft accidents, a drafting pit filled with water that can be pumped out and back in, and a training area for hazardous materials. Cross expects the site to be completed by next fall.


"The boss expects us to perform and we perform. He does the same thing for us; he supports us 100 percent. That's why it's so good for us to get a good rating. I'd hate to have all that backing and come up short," Cross said. "One other thing that's really helping us, too, is the fact that we're networking with state and local fire departments more than we ever have before. This will allow us to receive a lot of professional training at tremendous savings to the government. We're affiliated with the Alabama State Fire Chiefs Association."

This is the first year Redstone has received the AMC fire prevention and protection award. The runner-up finish two years ago was its best previous showing, according to Cross, the fire chief here since 1987. "I'd say the whole community deserves the credit," he said. "It took everybody's participation to achieve the things that we've achieved. We've got an excellent postwide fire prevention program, and the fire loss has been low this year.

"We've got an excellent fire marshal program postwide," Cross added. The 40 organizational/activity fire marshals report to Branham, the base fire marshal.

The department's capabilities for airfield firefighting should improve with the arrival of a new \$200,000 crash truck next July, Cross said.

Redstone Fire Department is authorized 55 people. They include chief Cross; assistant chiefs Willie Pope and Tom Stephens; fire inspectors Hal Meadows, Robert Clarke, Jim Hughes and Art Murtha; secretary Barbara Ransom; eight captains, 16 drivers, 22 firefighters and one firefighter-trainee. The department's first female firefighters, Toni Mialki and Sandy Boyd, arrived this year. Sandy is a firefighter at station 1 while her husband, Joey, is a driver at station 2. The four fire stations include No. 1 at Rideout Road; No. 2 at Vincent and Redeye Roads; No. 3 at Patton and Redstone Roads; and No. 4 at the airfield.



Engineer's work

Editor:

I am an electronics engineer. During the recent past I designed, developed, and built a piece of electronics that is smaller than one-fourth of a shoe box. I worked on this project for several years at a cost in excess of \$250,000. This item is currently in the manufacturing process. When 100 of these items are produced, it should be at a savings of more than \$400,000 compared to producing the item it will replace. It is far superior, both in simplicity of production and reliability, to the unit it replaces.

Now I would like to issue a challenge to Xavier Bonilla whose letter to the editor appeared in the Oct. 30 *Rocket*. He states in his letter: "A cataloger takes the drawing and extracts the same data the engineer developed. What an engineer developed is interpreted and developed again by a cataloger within four hours." I will take a set of drawings of this device and sit with Mr. Bonilla for as many hours as he wants and answer any and all questions that he can ask. I will do this on my own time. When I have answered all the questions he can ask and he has done any other research he cares to do, I challenge him to explain what this device does and how it does it. The fact that he cannot do this explains why he earns \$13.50 per hour while I get \$26.21 per hour.

By the way, all of the electronics components of this device are on three PC boards which are each about the size of your hand.

Increase seen in unlocked offices here

An inordinate number of unsecured buildings and areas were reported to the Provost Marshal Office during September and October.

Doors, windows and gates were left unlocked. These conditions necessitated that a building custodian, or his representative, return to their building/area usually at a late hour to check for loss or damage and properly secure the building.

"Errors of this type result in non-productive effort of all personnel involved and cause unnecessary payment of overtime funds when an individual is called in to secure a building or area," the Provost Marshal Office said in a prepared release. "Failure to properly secure a building or area could result in a substantial loss of government property and in some cases, allow admittance by unauthorized persons to an activity where classified documents and/or material is stored.

"As a matter of information, 41 percent of the property stolen on Redstone Arsenal was unsecured during fiscal year 1991," the release continued. "Requirements for checks and double checks should be published in internal directives of all organizations to aid in the security of buildings and areas. In the event there is a locking mechanism malfunction, minor repair, Base Operations contractor, 876-2801, should be contacted.

"MICOM Regulation 190-1, Appendix A, outlines policies and responsibilities for the security of buildings and fenced areas. A concerted effort by all responsible individuals, including chiefs of primary organizational elements, management, and all other employees, to properly secure their buildings/areas will have a positive effect in correcting this problem," the PMO release concluded.

Land Combat Systems Office created

The Close Combat Systems Office and Lance Project Office of the Weapon Systems Management Directorate have merged into one office.

This new office is called Land Combat Systems Office. Two days of special activities marked the closeout of business for the old organization and commencement of business for the new Land Combat Systems Office.

LeRoy Schnurbusch, assistant director of Close Combat Systems Office since 1982, presented certificates of service for employees with tenures in the old organization ranging from one to 10 years. He also presented certificates of appreciation to employees

who participated in the quality of life improvements program to re-landscape building 3205.

The award recipients were encouraged by Col. Tom Brown, director of Weapon Systems Management Directorate, to use their individual talents to form a cost and mission effective team.

Land Combat Systems Office people are now located in buildings 4484 and 3205. Plans are to consolidate all LCS functions in buildings 3205 and 3207 within the next two months. For assistance in locating LCS people during this transition period, call the assistant director's office 876-4102/4103.

TMDE function reorganization nears finish

Consolidation of the Army's Test, Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment activities into a central point at Redstone is nearing completion.

Employees at the Central TMDE Activity at Lexington-Bluegrass Army Depot received letters of offer for new jobs at the U.S. Army Test, Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment Activity (USTA) Nov. 5.

Kenneth Mattoon, director of USTA, said last week that 14 of the 37 CTA workers who received the letters have already accepted the offer. He estimated that 21 or 22 people would ultimately decide to make the move to Huntsville.

Lexington-Bluegrass is one of the installations scheduled for elimination under the Base Realignment and Closure Commission recommendations.

The transfer of CTA to Redstone is part of a larger restructuring plan, announced at the end of 1989, designed to streamline and consolidate the Army's TMDE mission.

The workers who are moving from CTA will begin work around Jan. 12.

Missile Command welcomes visiting resource managers

Top resource managers from throughout the Army Materiel Command are meeting in Huntsville today and Thursday for their quarterly review of automated systems.

Quarterly meetings of the AMC Resource Management Systems Review Committee are rotated among the major subordinate commands. The last meeting was held in August at Rock Island, Ill. The Missile Command previously served as host in November 1987.

"The purpose of the committee is to provide direction, guidance and make policy concerning AMC resource management standard automated systems. That also includes AMC personnel automated systems as well. It's a similar committee to that which deals with AMC logistics standard automated systems,"

aid Col. David Roesler, director of Resource Management at the Missile Command.

The committee is led by Col. Barry Baer, deputy chief of staff for resource management at Army Materiel Command headquarters. Its 10 voting members include Roesler and the other resource managers of AMC's subordinate commands. In addition, there are 13 non-voting members who serve as an advisory group.

"In general we review all the systems — automated systems — that we have; and look at the changes that are in progress, the changes that need to be made. From a functional perspective, we put the workload in priority for the data automaters so the data automaters know what to work on," Roesler said. "And we basically serve as the approval authority for all resource management and personnel automated system life-cycle management actions.

"We also use the opportunity (of the quarterly meetings) to discuss other resource management issues affecting the AMC community such as budget, finance and accounting, manpower issues," he added.

The committee was chartered in 1985. Baer will not be able to attend the meeting here so the chairman in his absence is Robert Weidenmuller, his deputy. Forty people are expected to attend. The meeting, being held at the Holiday Inn near Madison Square Mall, will culminate late Thursday afternoon with an executive session of the voting members.

"The real issue to me is to check the progress of all those (automated) systems' changes to ensure they're being done on time and in the priority that we've set; to ensure that we provide adequate Resource Manage-

ment services both now and in the future," Roesler said. "What complicates our job are scarce ADP (automatic data processing) resources, and the changing RM environment of unit costs and the defense business operating fund."

David Carter is chief of the systems management office within Resource Management Directorate. This week's meeting gives the resource managers "an opportunity to come together to see the progress that has been made, and to ensure that we on the systems side are still following the guidance that they've laid down for us," Carter said.

"We welcome the opportunity to host our contemporaries," Roesler said. "We always look forward to the chance to meet with them to discuss the issues and problems that face us all."

Systems to be discussed at the meeting include the Budget Resource Information Management System, Automated Financial Entitlements System, Standard Army Civilian Payroll System, Standard Army Procurement Appropriation System; Standard Operation and Maintenance Army Research and Development System; Commodity Command Standard System; Retail Army Stock Fund Inventory Accounting and Reporting System; AMC Automated Manpower Management Information System; Automated Time Attendance and Production System; and the Zero Based Resourcing System. The latter two systems — automated time attendance and production, and zero based resourcing — are both slated to be implemented at the Missile Command in 1992. The other systems have all been in use here for varying periods of time, from one year to more than a decade.

Post Chapel ready for Thanksgiving

"It'll be a traditional Thanksgiving worship service," said Chaplain (Maj.) David McLean, the scheduled speaker. "Normally it's a capacity crowd at the Post Chapel.



Redstone represented at Army family action conference

Two delegates represented Redstone Arsenal at the ninth annual Army Family Action Plan Planning Conference held Oct. 21-25 in Arlington, Va.

Brandon Parker, a retired colonel, represented the retiree community here while Leah Amato represented military family members. They were among 152 delegates from the total Army family who met to surface quality of life concerns submitted by soldiers, retirees, reservists, civilians and family members.

Twelve work groups discussed 90 issues related to relocation, housing, medical/dental, entitlements, consumer services, children/youth/education, force support, community involvement, family support and reserves. Parker was assigned to the Medical 1 work group while Amato was a member of the Force Support 1 group.

"This was the first time for me; and of all the conferences that I have attended at the DA (Department of Army) level, this was the most successful," Parker said. "And the reason it was most successful, was the fact that you had a delegate from every major command... And this gave every delegate a chance to express his desires from his respective command."

Amato was impressed with the emphasis on cooperation with the other military services during these times of downsizing. The Army, for example, has adopted a military pay system similar to the Air Force's system. "You want a total military family instead of Army vs. Air Force vs. Navy," Amato said. "We really looked at the total military issues: retiree, National Guard, reservists, family member. These issues were not just for active-duty but the total military family."

Of the 90 issues, some 23 came from the Army Materiel Command and four of these were from Redstone. The four included the partnership doctor program, funding support for family child care programs, troop eyeglasses, and the casualty assistance program. Two other issues from Redstone — dental

care for retirees and the Exceptional Family Member Program — were originally submitted last year and were discussed again.

"At the end of the conference, the 12 work groups submitted 27 major issues that should be looked at by the Department of Army," Parker said. "Of the 27, everybody voted on the top three that will go to a general officer steering committee."

The top three issues include the following: inequitable military pay; lack of aggressive Champus marketing and training; and deficiencies in dependent dental plan coverage (an issue submitted from Army Materiel Command). Three other issues given priority include inaccessibility of interservice support facilities and services; lack of utilization of teen programs; and inconsistent access or use of all Defense Department facilities.

Redstone Arsenal's fifth annual Family Symposium will be held Feb. 27-28 at the Bicentennial Chapel. "We're still working on our local issues which we keep track of through our Human Resources Council. And we're already gearing up for our symposium," said Sue Paddock, the Redstone Arsenal family action plan

manager. "In December time frame, I will be coordinating with all of the major organizations on the Arsenal to start recruiting for delegates."

B Company helps 832nd family project







Food baskets help families in need during the holidays

The chaplains' annual food basket drive to brighten Christmas for needy Redstone families is well under way.

Dec. 13 is the deadline for contributing money or non-perishable goods to the Redstone Arsenal Chaplains' Christmas Food Basket Drive. Food baskets will be distributed Dec. 18-20 to military and Redstone Arsenal civilian families.

"Last year, due to Desert Storm, we distributed over \$33,000 worth of food items; that was 338 baskets. But a lot of that had to do with Desert Shield and Desert Storm and the number of families involved in National Guard and Reserve units," Chaplain (Maj.) David McLean said. "We do not anticipate quite as big a need this year, although we gave out 190 baskets the previous year. So we anticipate giving about 200 food baskets at a cost of \$20,000 to \$25,000."

Cash donations last year helped purchase more than \$20,000 in food items from the Commissary; the rest of the contributions were non-perishable foods such as canned fruits, vegetables and dry goods.

"We're already beginning to receive donations both in money and in food items to provide for the needs of our military members and their families during the Christmas season. It is the tradition on Redstone Arsenal, both civilian and military community, in working together that provides much needed support," McLean said. "We're collecting items right now. Boxes are being placed at the PX, Commissary; and various offices and units are establishing boxes to collect the food items."

"What we are asking is that as items are collected, they can be dropped off at the Post Chapel at anytime; but our deadline (is) to have all items collected and turned in by the 13th of December. At that time, our retiree community will consolidate and pack the Christmas food baskets that will be distributed on the 18th, 19th and 20th of December. The Chaplains Office is working with the command sergeants major on post, first sergeants and commanders and ACS (Army

Community Service), to identify and collect the names of families," McLean said.

Recipients are not confined to any particular grade or rank, but are determined through the units according to needs. "This is the Redstone Arsenal drive that provides for its servicemembers and civilians," McLean said. "The Chaplains Office already works with civilian organizations in the Huntsville/Madison County area that provide for other families."

The Christmas food basket program helps relieve burdens on Redstone families in need, according to Chaplain (1st Lt.) Steve Logan. "If you've got \$100 worth of groceries, that's 100 more dollars you can spend on Christmas and children," Logan said. "I think it's an opportunity for our community to show

in a tangible way what the Christmas season's all about."

Members of 832nd Ordnance Battalion are among the contributors to the program. Three units in the 832nd — Headquarters and Headquarters Company (HHC), B Company and E Company — conducted a fund-raising "Haunted House" and hotdog sale Oct. 28-31. Some \$286.75 in proceeds were donated Nov. 5 to the food basket program.

"This (food basket program) really is a total community endeavor because it takes all of us working together to make this possible," McLean said. For more information call McLean or Logan, the project officers, at the Post Chaplains Office 876-5751.



Wellness center urges smokers to quit during Smokeout

The Civilian Wellness Center staff wants to help all of Redstone's smokers kick the habit during the Great American Smokeout.

The center will have a quit-smoking booth at various cafeterias next week for the lunchtime crowd. Scheduled to start 11 a.m., the informational table will be at building 4488 on Monday, Nov. 18; building 5400, Nov. 19; building 5250, Nov. 20; and building 5681, Nov. 21. The booth will include literature from the American Cancer Society, tips on quitting and "fun and games," according to Elisa Mullins, director of the Civilian Wellness Center.

Great American Smokeout, Nov. 21, is an annual effort sponsored by the American Cancer Society to encourage millions of Americans to stop smoking for at least 24 hours. Smoking contributes to health problems, Mullins said.

"It's probably the major risk factor for heart disease. Plus it's also of course related to lung cancer," she said. "Studies have shown: When people stop smoking, the good type of cholesterol increases and that helps protect against coronary heart disease."

"Exercise can help in the quitting process — to relieve stress, and get past a 'trigger' (urge) for smoking. It definitely does. When you're hit with that trigger, you can go out for a walk instead," Mullins said.

In breaking the smoking habit, "different things work for different people," according to Mullins. "But in general, going cold turkey seems to work; but they have to come to that decision that they want to quit — have to have that mindset that you are ready to quit. I think that's the first step: making that decision. After you make that decision to quit, I think the next thing you have to do is figure out what the triggers are — what your personal triggers are. Then try to substitute alternative coping strategies; that would be

the things like exercise, breathing techniques, sugarless gum or mints."

The civilian wellness center's informational booth next week is for all Redstone Arsenal employees. Mullins estimates that "a very small percentage" of the wellness center's 900 or so members smoke.

For the smokeout booth, the Mill restaurant is donating \$5 gift certificates as prizes for some of the games.

"Joining the walk is also a great way for non-smokers to show their support for a smoker," she said.

Dippers and chewers shouldn't feel left out. They, too, are encouraged to kick the habit for a day.

"The Great American Smokeout is for everyone. Join the millions who'll quit for the day, and who knows, you might decide to quit for good," Cole said.

She said the walkathon at Redstone is particularly significant this year because this is the only one in town.

"Due to budget cuts, the American Cancer Society isn't having a walkathon this year," Cole said.

Adoption papers and information on quitting smoking will be available at building 116, Preventive Medicine Service Nov. 18, 19 and 20.

The Health Risk Appraisal team will also have a





'Quick Pay' program to aid retirees

WASHINGTON — Retiring Army civilians can expect a speedy turnaround for their first pension check because of the Army's new pilot program called "Quick Pay." Unfortunately, Redstone Arsenal is not among the sites where the program is being tested.

Developed with the Office of Personnel Management, Quick Pay is designed to expedite the receipt of new retirees' first annuity checks.

The initiative is currently being tested at 36 sites, including all Forces Command and Training and Doctrine Command installations. Quick Pay participants will receive their first check in

the earliest date that payment is legally authorized, normally 30 days after retirement. Retirees opting for direct deposit will cut down processing by five days, according to officials at the U.S. Total Army Personnel Command.

To be eligible, an employee must be retiring on a non-disability retirement and submit a complete retirement application packet to their civilian personnel office at least 30 days prior to the date of separation. "We're not doing it at this time, no," said a civilian personnel office worker when asked if Redstone is among the test sites. (Adapted from an Arnews release)
