Logisticians to equip smaller U.S.-based force in future

Logisticians, the people responsible for getting equipment where it needs to be when it needs to be there, will face a different challenge in the future.

They will have to help maintain the readiness of a smaller U.S.-based Army which responds to contingencies worldwide.

That was part of the message delivered at a unique workshop held Thursday by the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Society of Logistics Engineers. Held at the Officers Club, the daylong event brought together a six-member panel of active and retired general officers.

"The Army's in a transition period, a period that will have an impact on logistics and how we do our business in the future," said Lt. Gen. Marvin Brailsford, deputy commander for materiel readiness at headquarters Army Materiel Command. He explained that the Army will be smaller and will have less dollars to do its job; also, he said, there will be less industries available in the field to provide critical support.

Efforts will be aimed at keeping the Army's war-fighting functions in-house while enabling contractors to provide more of the support functions, according to Brailsford. "It is fact that we cannot today support our Army without our contractors," he said.

Maj. Gen. Harry Karegeannes, commander of the

Army Depot System Command which is based in Chambersburg, Pa., described how DESCOM is being downsized. "I'm proud to say, to date we have not had a major reduction in force. We have come down through attrition. I'm here to tell you, that's the way to do it," Karegeannes said.

Other panelists included retired Brig. Gen. William Fiorentino, a consultant in Huntsville; retired Maj. Gen. Don Infante, assistant division manager for Hughes Aircraft Company; retired Maj. Gen. Patrick Roddy, president of Raytheon Service Company; and retired Gen. Glenn Otis, corporate vice-president of

Coleman Research Corporation. Otis served as moderator.

Some 140 people attended the workshop which was entitled "Logistics Challenges of the Future." John Chapman, deputy director of the Integrated Materiel Management Center, serves as chairman of SOLE's Tennessee Valley Chapter.

"We've never done this before," said Henry Fail of the SOLE chapter. "Each year we have strived to include maybe a general officer or two... But since we've been in being, to my knowledge, we've never had a general officer panel like this."

Redstone gives thanks with Post Chapel service, feast

The Redstone Arsenal community Thursday will celebrate Thanksgiving with an ecumenical service at the Post Chapel and a traditional feast in the military dining facilities.

Chaplain (Maj.) David McLean is the scheduled speaker for the 10 a.m. worship service. Music will be provided by the Post Chapel Choir. "It'll be a traditional Thanksgiving worship service," McLean said. "Normally it's a capacity crowd at the Post Chapel."

Both military dining facilities here are preparing for their most well-attended meal of the year: the traditional Thanksgiving feast. CWO 3 Felix Battle, the installation food adviser, expects a thousand diners.

The Nov. 28 schedule for dining facility 1, building 3438 south, and dining facility 3, building 3438 north, is as follows: breakfast, 7-8 a.m.; Thanksgiving meal, first setting, for single soldiers, 11-noon; second setting, for soldiers with family members, guests and retirees, 12:15-2:30; and dinner from 3-5:30 during which short-order will also be served.

"I think the meal means a lot to the folks that are operating the dining facility. They have pride in the meal that they're preparing plus it will give them a time to show off their culinary skills," Battle said.

Holiday meal prices include \$3.15 for enlisted personnel, officers, and family members of active duty military; cost is \$1.50 for age 11 and under active-duty family members. Guests of active duty, plus retirees and their guests, pay \$9.25 which includes a \$6.10 surcharge; those age 11 and under pay \$4.60 which includes a \$3.10 surcharge.

"It's a time of the year where folks get together and enjoy this traditional meal. It's a time of the year to be thankful," Battle said.

About 900 people attended the Thanksgiving feast last year which is the dining facilities' "largest meal or day of the year," according to Chuck Minga, contracting officer representative and quality assurance evaluator in the installation food service office.

The scheduled menu includes shrimp cocktail, roast turkey, baked ham, steamship round (beef), savory dressing, cornbread dressing, giblet gravy, mashed potatoes, candied sweet potatoes, buttered green peas

with mushrooms, cranberry sauce, buttered corn, buttered broccoli, tossed green salad, assorted dressings, cole slaw, creamy dressing, mixed fruit salad, creamy fruit dressing, hot rolls, butter patties, pumpkin pie with whipped cream, mincemeat pie, fruit cake, assorted candies, mixed nuts, assorted fresh fruits, coffee, tea, milk and carbonated beverages.

Organizer of MICOM soldering center dies in Huntsville

Howard Murry Lamm Sr., a former Missile Command product assurance worker, died Sunday at Huntsville Hospital. He was 64.

Lamm had worked for the Department of Commerce in 1960, the Department of Air Force from 1961-65, and Department of Army from 1965-90. He retired at MICOM on Nov. 30, 1990. He was a senior inspector examiner in first category A which is a Defense Department certification in high reliability soldering, according to Tom McVey. McVey, chief of the advanced technology and methodology division at Product Assurance Directorate, was Lamm's branch chief for three years in the critical processes branch.

McVey had written the following in late 1989 as Lamm's sponsor when Lamm was recognized for 30 years of government service: "Having been Murry's supervisor for the past three years and having worked with him over a much longer period, I have acquired a great deal of respect for both his professional skills as well as his positive attitude toward his work.

"I am sure he has done many things over his long career in federal service worthy of praise. The one which I think has contributed most to MICOM and the Army is the establishment of the MICOM Soldering Technology and Certification Center. This Center exists today, I am convinced, because of Murry's persistence. Like all new ideas, high reliability soldering had to be sold. Many times it was a product that was difficult to sell for not everyone appreciated its potential value. In the beginning, there were many doubters and more foes than friends. Nevertheless Murry Lamm proceeded with his mission. Slowly he gained a few converts. After years of planning, the Center which serves as the graduate school of soldering technology, opened in 1982. During the seven years it's been in operation, over 900 soldering instructors from

both industry and government have been certified. Some came with doubts but after 80 hours of intensive training, they all became believers in high reliability soldering. Today most of these are in plants across the country ensuring that the quality and reliability of MICOM items remain high," McVey wrote.

Lamm is survived by his wife, Marie Lamm; sons, Stewart Lamm and Tracy Lamm, both of Huntsville, Howard Lamm Jr. of Florence, and Gary Lamm of Loretta, Tenn.; brother, Jesse Lamm of Lumberton, N.C.; and seven grandchildren. The funeral was held Tuesday at Spry Funeral Home. In lieu of flowers, the family requests donations to the American Heart Association or the American Cancer Society of North Alabama.

Charity campaign has best year ever

This year's Combined Federal Campaign was the most successful ever. The overall campaign collected \$1,284,239 which was 114 percent of the goal of \$1,125,000. This equated to a 17 percent increase over the previous year.

Of the 33 government agencies reporting, 29 exceeded their goal. And while the campaign is officially over, money is still being turned in from the individuals who were on TDY or overseas.

The three agencies with the highest collections were Marshall Space Flight Center with \$403,476, the Missile Command with \$385,781, and Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) Browns Ferry with \$126,383.

Many factors influenced the campaign. Of first importance was the highly motivated group of loaned executives that gave presentations to the different agencies participating. There was a positive correlation between those offices that used loaned executives, and the results attained. Also, this year's keyworkers did an excellent job of managing the pledge cards.

Increased advertising and media coverage helped. This took the form of informational newspaper ar-

ticles, agency bus tours, T-shirts, door prizes donated by local businesses for the kickoff luncheon, and a halftime reporting cookout which was also sponsored by local businesses.

This was also the first year, in recent campaigns, where each Local Federal Coordinating Committee member set actual dollar goals for their agency and were tasked with managing their campaigns. It is obvious that they all did an outstanding job.

The name of the campaign was changed to better reflect the area covered by its workers and agencies. Next year we will all be participating in the Tennessee Valley Combined Federal Campaign.

The government workers really took pride in themselves and their community and opened their hearts to those in need. The Combined Federal Campaign is an important part of the local United Way charity drives. All of these campaigns have suffered from decreased funding due to an uncertain economy. The federal workers filled the funding gap needed to support those efforts.

Thanks to everyone involved. It really does make a difference in the community and makes this area a better place to live.

Test traced to faulty wire

The U.S. Army Strategic Defense Command and the Strategic Defense Initiative Organization have determined the cause for the unsuccessful launch of the second High Endoatmospheric Defense Interceptor (HEDI) Kinetic Kill Vehicle Integrated Test Experiment (KITE) at White Sands Missile Range, N.M., Sept. 23.

Previous data showed the cause to be a premature detonation of the Flight Termination System warhead caused by erroneous commands from the missile's on-board computer. Extensive simulations and testing to reproduce those commands traced the problem to a short circuit in a five volt wire in a connector on one of the missile's bulkheads. This wire is used only for preflight ground testing of the seeker and will be disabled for the next flight.

Corrective measures for future flights include increased vibration and shock qualification testing and inspection of bulkheads after installation.

The KITE-2 test is rescheduled for early summer 1992. This test will gather data relative to shroud separation dynamics, sapphire window cooling and shock loading and aero-optic effects on seeker acquisition and tracking of the target.

Army Community Service assists families in many ways

Editor's note: Dempsey, the outreach program manager at Army Community Service, describes how ACS helps families in this article for National Family Week, Nov. 24-30.

Army Community Service, building 3491, is one of the first places to go if you are new to the installation or need help. A staff of professional and volunteer people provide assistance to active and retired soldiers and their families.

"We are staffed and organized to provide valuable needed and practical help to soldiers from the day they arrive at Redstone until the day they leave us and go on to other assignments," said William Resha, chief of ACS. "We offer help in many ways. From our welcoming program, lending closet, to family-oriented assistance and education services... we strive to meet the needs of military families."

Here is a listing of services offered by the staff at Redstone Arsenal's Army Community Service:

- **Welcome Packets:** Stocked monthly, the packets are full of information about Redstone Arsenal, Huntsville, and the surrounding community. Included are maps, brochures, coupons, and practical guides to getting settled. "Everything a family needs to know quickly is in the Welcome Packet," says Jean Simon, volunteer supervisor at ACS. You can pick up a packet at ACS, building 3491, for yourself, a neighbor or new soldier in the unit.

- **Lending Closet:** ACS maintains a full range of kitchenware and such items as vacuums, playpens, high chairs, and linens for loan to families on a short-term basis.

- **Emergency Food Locker:** Available for emergency assistance to families who have a need and are referred by their unit commander. Juanita Adams is the person to contact for this program which accepts donations as well as provides assistance. The food locker is regularly stocked with canned foods, dry foods, diapers and formula. "We can give a soldier and his family enough to get by on for three days," Adams says.

- **Army Emergency Relief:** Provides interest-free loans and grants to soldiers and retirees who find themselves in a financial emergency which is unexpected and due to conditions beyond their control.

- **Information, Referral and Follow-up Program:** Provides an information file/directory listing military and civilian family service agencies and other sources of service to which personnel may be routinely referred. Referral procedures are used when the client needs

exceed ACS program resources. Follow-up procedures are used to ensure client needs are effectively coordinated.

- **Exceptional Family Member Program:** Supports assignment authorities when they are reassigning servicemembers who have handicapped adult or minor family members. It also gives servicemembers a means of identifying family members with physical, emotional, or intellectual handicaps, so that assignment authorities may give special consideration to reassigning servicemembers to locations where their family members can receive appropriate treatment.

- **Consumer Advocacy Program:** Provides assistance with consumer information, complaint assistance, and general educational materials to help families and individuals become more efficient consumers. Dan Kelly, CAP program manager, is especially concerned about younger and more inexperienced soldiers.

- **Debt Liquidation Program:** Provides assistance to soldiers, retirees and others who are in debt difficulty by developing a budget to help stabilize the family and then working with creditors in an effort to restructure repayment in such a way that the family has a chance to get out of debt once and for all.

- **Relocation Program:** Provides information, guidance and assistance to servicemembers and their families moving from one military community to another and settling into a new community. Provides troop orientation briefings, family welcome visits, installation fact sheets, and maintains welcome packets for all posts in the United States and abroad.

- **Family Member Employment Program:** Provides employment information and referral services to job applicants. The FMEAP does not function as an employment agency, but as a support program to assist with the job search process. The FMEAP staff also offers assistance with interviewing, resume writing, Federal Job Application Forms (SF Form 171) and other activities that facilitate employment.

- **Installation Volunteer Coordinator:** Serves as a link between the command and volunteer agencies on the installation. It is an ongoing recruiting program for finding new volunteers, referral service for volunteer agencies, and provides volunteer service and volunteer recognition within the community.

- **Outreach Program:** Seeks to link service to geographically or socially isolated families, first-term soldiers and families, geographically separated families, and single-parent families. Provides a

systematic method of assessing the needs of the military community; organizes the delivery of exit services; identifies needs and develops appropriate services not already available.

- **Family Advocacy Program:** Provides educational services in the areas of spouse violence, a variety of parenting classes, stress management classes, and professional assistance and referrals.

- **Foster Care Program:** The ACS Foster Care Program works in coordination with the Department of Human Resources in Huntsville to help provide foster families or group care for children whose parents or relatives cannot maintain a home for them. The program helps military families make contact with community resources when the need for placement arises and recruits foster parents from military families or individuals to provide a stable foster home. Single individuals are no longer disqualified as foster parents. Foster parents are needed for children of all ages. Military personnel who will be residing at Redstone Arsenal or in the Huntsville area for at least a year and would be interested in sharing their life and home with a child in need should call Sal Riccardi of ACS 876-5397.

- **Total Tots Program:** Provides for short-term emergency child care for families who are unable to pay for it. Families are referred by human services agencies, unit commanders, and the Family Advocacy Case Management Team. The program is open primarily to active duty families.

- **Volunteer Corps:** Volunteers make an important contribution in all ACS programs, performing a wide variety of jobs. Free child care is provided for volunteers between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Several volunteers, who have children in Williams Elementary School, are currently needed to serve on the Education Council. The council coordinates and advises the commander and the Huntsville City School Board on the needs of military children.

Services are offered at ACS, building 3491, Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Call 876-5397/2859/5468 for appointment information. Some of the classes are offered during non-duty hours, and Army Emergency Relief will respond to emergency needs 24 hours a day.



Strategic Defense small business advocate wins again

It was the second time around for Virginia B. Wright on Nov. 14 when she received the Department of Army Small and Disadvantaged Business Utilization (SADBU) award from the secretary of the Army, Michael Stone, in a ceremony at the Pentagon.

Wright, associate director for SADBU at the Strategic Defense Command since 1983, was selected for the award from all Army SADBU advisers across the nation.

This is the third year that this prestigious award has been presented by the secretary of the Army and Wright has been the recipient two of those three years: 1989 and 1991. The award recognizes outstanding command accomplishments, such as efforts to increase contract opportunities for historically black colleges and universities/minority institutions (HBCUs/MIs), small businesses, small disadvantaged businesses, and woman-owned businesses.

Wright frequently works directly with contractors, educational institutions, and other agencies, including local and state government officials to increase the small business opportunities throughout the United States and particularly in Huntsville, the state of Alabama and the southeast region of the U.S.

"I believe in small business. My faith is renewed on a daily basis when I use the things innovated by small businesses in their basements and garages, such as the Polaroid camera, the Hewlett Packard computer, overnight express mail, and many lifesaving drugs," Wright said. "Furthermore, small businesses employ half of America's workforce."

Among her strengths is the ability to identify and focus on specific major tasks that foster increased small business participation in SDC research efforts.

Under her direction, SDC has become a leader in Army utilization of small, disadvantaged, and woman-owned businesses. In fiscal 1991, the command funded slightly over \$1 billion in contracts and significantly

exceeded its goals in four out of five small business categories.

In addition to the SDC Huntsville and Washington elements, Wright also manages the small business efforts of the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll in the Central Pacific.

During a distinguished government career spanning more than three decades, Wright has received various commendations and awards for exceptional service, including the Commander's Award for Civilian Service, presented earlier this year by former SDC deputy commander, Maj. Gen. John Peppers.

Wright is a member of several professional organizations, including the Minority Business Council, the Department of the Army Small Business Council, the Huntsville Chamber of Commerce Small Business Committee, and the Southeast Area Council.

She began her government career in 1960 at the Missile Command at Redstone Arsenal and transferred to SDC in 1969 as a GS-6 communications specialist. In 1974, she accepted a job in SDC's Contracting and Acquisition Management Office as a GS-5/7/9 procurement analyst trainee. Since that time, she has consistently qualified for positions with increased responsibility and higher grade in the contracts and acquisition field — culminating in her current position as a GM-15 supervisory procurement analyst.

On one wall of her office at SDC are two 8-by-10 neatly framed color photographs of a deteriorating small white house. The peeling paint, the sagging door, and the barren, glassless windows are evidence that the home is now unoccupied and abandoned. Wright will proudly tell visitors — if asked — that the photographs are of her childhood home in Limestone County. One of her most striking characteristics is this candid truthfulness about how her past has contributed to where she is today.

"I believe it's not where you have been that matters,

but where you are going," says Wright in her typically straightforward manner.


Williams is the first and only civilian to be appointed as a PEO at Redstone. He has held that position since April 27, 1990.

Service becomes watchword for personnel directorate

Members of Personnel and Training Directorate are making an extra effort to better serve their customers.

They graduated Nov. 20 from training in Total Quality Management. TQM means better understanding current processes and streamlining those processes.

"This is a wrapup and celebration; that is, the tail end of our basic TQM training," said Ron Slaughter, the lead TQM adviser for the directorate. He is one of seven TQM advisers in the more than 200-member organization. "And in addition we pulled in 18 other Redstone Arsenal community facilitators to help us with that training and many of those facilitators are helping us with our TQM breakout groups this (Nov. 20) morning," Slaughter said.

The directorate had an awareness day Sept. 27 to introduce its workers to Total Quality Management. On Sept. 30 its top managers developed a directorate vision statement. The organization's line supervisors were trained Oct. 1-4. At the end of that session, the line supervisors and midlevel managers developed long-range and midrange goals for the directorate. Basic TQM training for employees was conducted from Oct. 7 through Nov. 15. This employee training consisted of 10 sessions, each lasting two and a half days.

On the morning of Nov. 20 at the Huntsville Marriott, the employees, their line supervisors and their functional chiefs developed short-range goals and objectives in their natural work groups. That afternoon, the organization held its graduation ceremonies with the awarding of certificates.

"The Equal Employment Opportunity Office has participated in this training with us all the way through, since our functions are so closely related," Slaughter said.

The directorate plans to double its number of TQM advisers from seven to 14 by the end of 1992. Its advisers include Brenda Anders of the Nonappropriated Fund Office; SFC Bill Baxley of the Military Personnel Office; Shirley Knowles, chief of the readiness section in recruitment and placement branch, Civilian Personnel Office; James Foster, chief of the career management section in the training and career management branch, CPO; Jim Smith, a supervisor in the technical services branch, CPO; Pat Weaver, a

management-employee relations specialist in CPO; and Slaughter, a position classification specialist in the research and development section of CPO's position management and classification branch.

"I'm currently on a one-year detail to the Personnel and Training TQM Office. At present, we have two full-time employees including myself and a clerk, Juli Kettell. It's a permanent office that will be staffed on approximately one-year rotations," Slaughter said.

Among the functions of the TQM advisers is assisting the directorate's executive steering committee and quality management board. The executive steering committee consists of Col. Michael McGuire, the director of Personnel and Training Directorate; LeRoy Daniels, the civilian personnel officer; Jim Anderson, deputy civilian personnel officer; and Joe Winston, chief of military personnel's plans and operations division.

McGuire expects his 222-member organization, including 188 civilians and 34 military people, to benefit from Total Quality Management. "I think this is going to improve our ability to service the civilian and military population in the Redstone Arsenal area," he

said. "I also believe it's going to improve the way internally we view ourselves and the way we view the employee next to us. I have seen already that it's improved the employees' motivation to want to do better. And I hope it will cause each employee to contribute on a day-to-day basis to meeting the goals that individually and collectively the directorate has established, and we can provide the service that is expected of us."


"The directorate level of P&T Directorate in developing its vision, coined a motto throughout the directorate: 'Service is our business and personnel are our customers.' I believe we need to be mindful of that, and TQM will facilitate that," McGuire said.

The directorate's quality management board consists of chiefs from the organization's 11 major functions. Quality management board members include Ruby Turner from the Community Counseling Center; Dr. Mary McGough from the Army Education Center; Dwayne Seale from the Plans and Operations Office (better known as the Emergency Operations Center or EOC); Patricia Evans from the Program Management Office; Maj. Skip Sharples and E.J. Dlugasch, his deputy, from the Military Personnel Office; Don Dixon, chief of recruitment and placement branch, CPO; Lori Reynolds, chief of the position management and classification branch, CPO; Harry Trent, chief of management-employee relations branch, CPO; Dr. Delia Black, chief of training and career management branch, CPO; Leonard Farbman, chief of technical services branch, CPO; and Billy Hughes, chief of the Nonappropriated Fund Office.

"Bear in mind," Slaughter added, "in a few years it won't be necessary to say this is a TQM ESC (executive steering committee) or TQM QMB (quality management board) because this will be the normal, preferred way of structuring and doing business."



Command urged to maintain pace in value engineering

The commanding general congratulated value-engineering coordinators of the Missile Command for another good year and issued a challenge for 1992.

"I urge that you continue your efforts," Maj. Gen. William Chen, MICOM's commander, said at the fiscal 1992 kickoff luncheon for value engineering. "This is a team effort on the part of PMs (project managers), PEOs (program executive officers), and all the functionals involved.

"I thank you for your efforts of the past year. And we look forward to 1992 for another successful year," Chen said. About 90 people attended the luncheon held Nov. 20 at the Officers Club.

Value engineering is a commandwide program which pursues money-saving alternatives. In fiscal 1991 the value engineering program here continued to be recognized as the leader among Army Materiel Command, Department of Army and Department of Defense, according to the Missile Command's VE Office. The Missile Command has won the Department of Defense award for Best Field Command in four out of the last five years, with the fiscal 1991 results indicating a continued success.

The command reported a hard-dollar savings of \$78.6 million vs. a goal of \$40.1 million for fiscal year '91. Thirteen MICOM elements achieved their savings goal. Among those, the Resource Management Directorate exceeded its \$12,000 goal by more than 1000 percent with \$150,000 in savings.

During fiscal 1991 the Missile Command also continued its trend of low processing times for Value Engineering Change Proposals, and high VECP acceptance rates. The processing times dropped from 214 days in fiscal year '90 to 209 days in fiscal '91. Acceptance rates increased from 76 percent in fiscal '90 to 91 percent in fiscal year '91.

The following organizations achieved their VE savings goal for fiscal 1991:

- Program Executive Office for Air Defense: Non-Line of Sight Project Office and Patriot Project Office.

- PEO for Fire Support: Advanced Antitank Weapon Systems Project Office, Army Tactical Missile System, Multiple Launch Rocket System, and TOW Project Office.

Maj. Gen. William Chen, in his opening remarks lauded the center, which is one of 61 in a DA worldwide program.


"The Army is in the process of drawing down, like it did after World War II, the Korean War, and Vietnam," said Chen, commander of the Missile Com-

Ramona Roy is the transition services manager, and Maureen Chemsak is the contract installation manager.

The ACAP is open from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Prospective customers are encouraged to make an appointment for ACAP services early, as soon as the decision is made (or notice is received) to leave federal service. An appointment can be made by calling 955-6490.

The transition from federal service to civilian life requires planning and assistance if it is done smoothly and effectively. ACAP can provide the help to ensure the process is completed in a caring and professional manner.



Shiloh Battlefield a lesson for modern soldiers

Editor's note: Capt. Hubbs is assistant training and operations officer at Readiness Group Redstone. On Nov. 5-6 he led a bus tour to Shiloh, Tenn., for members of his unit. His description of the Civil War battle was taken, in part, from information furnished by Shiloh National Military Park.

Corn stubble lies in fields where corn has grown for generations and peach trees stand waiting for spring in the orchard near Bloody Pond. It's quiet now where the morning frost glistens on the manicured lawns and fields.

Marble and granite monuments give silent testimony to the heroics of entire units or single individuals. Upright cannons mark the spots where a key leader fell in battle.

Shiloh National Military Park in Tennessee is now such a quiet, peaceful place it is difficult to imagine that 100,000 men crashed through these woods and fields with the sole intent of killing one another.

Forty-two officers and noncommissioned officers, Readiness Group Redstone, visited Shiloh Nov. 5 and 6 as part of the Officers/Non-commissioned Officers Professional Development Program. This "staff ride" was preceded by a briefing on the battle at the Readiness Group classroom Nov. 4.

Through use of maps and actual Civil War weapons and artifacts, each officer developed a firm understanding of how the battle was fought and how the successes and failures of key leaders conform to what we now know as the nine principles of war. The weapons studied clearly illustrated what each soldier of that era was facing and what was required of him in combat.

THE TOUR OF THE BATTLEFIELD was like a homecoming for me. I had been employed at Shiloh National Battlefield Park as a historical interpreter in the summer of 1977. My experience in firing Civil War cannons and rifled muskets, along with conducting tours of the battlefield, greatly enhanced the presentation I gave to my fellow officers.

During the winter of 1861-62, Federal forces pushing southward from St. Louis, captured Forts Henry and Donelson on the Tennessee and Cumberland Rivers. This action forced Gen. A.S. Johnston to abandon southern Kentucky and Tennessee. After withdrawing further south, he establish-

ed a new line covering the Memphis and Charleston Railroad, the only direct railroad link to Richmond, Va., and Memphis, Tenn. Realizing that he could not wait for another Federal advance, Johnston began concentrating 44,000 men at Corinth, Miss., from whence he hoped to take the offensive and destroy Gen. U.S. Grant's Union Army of the Tennessee before it could be joined by Gen. D.C. Buell's Army of the Ohio. (It was common practice at this time to name armies for the river near which they operated.)

There was a delay before Grant's Army of the Tennessee, 40,000 strong, moved south along the Tennessee River toward Pittsburg Landing (22 miles northeast of Corinth). Ordered to wait there until Buell's army joined him, Grant camped his men in the woods and fields around Shiloh Church. Concerned about the large number of raw recruits in his army, Grant decided to drill his men rather than fortify his position.

When Johnson's Army of Mississippi hit the Federal camps on the morning of April 6, the Confederates achieved complete surprise. The Union division commanders had done little or no patrolling and the senior commander on the field, Gen. W.T. Sherman, treated all reports of Confederate troops in the area with contempt. Some Northern troops fought doggedly to hold their line; others fell back and reformed elsewhere. Many who had never been in combat fled for safety to the Tennessee River. The Southern army rolled over one Union position after another until noon. Then, along the Sunken Road, the Federals finally established and held a line that stopped the Southern advance. Confederate soldiers knew they had struck a "Hornets' Nest," and named it that. Rather than seek a way around the stronghold, the Southerners charged the position repeatedly.

To the right and left of the Hornets' Nest, Federal forces fell back before the Confederate attack and the fighting became a confused slugging match. On both sides, regiments became disorganized and companies disintegrated. Johnston was killed while trying to push home attacks in the Peach Orchard.

By late afternoon Grant's surviving troops were safe in their final line. The vanguard of Buell's army cross-

ed the Tennessee and filed into position on Grant's left covering Pittsburg Landing. Union infantry, artillery and gunboat fire on that flank hurled back the Confederate attempt to cross the rugged Dill Creek terrain and the fighting sputtered out for the night.

By dawn on April 7, the combined Federal armies numbered 55,000 men. Beauregard, Johnston's successor, was unaware that all of Buell's army had arrived. He went on the offensive and was, at first, successful. The stronger Union armies, however, soon began to push the Confederates back. Low on ammunition and food and with 15,000 of his men killed, wounded or missing, Beauregard knew he could go no further. He withdrew beyond Shiloh Church and began the weary march back to Corinth. The exhausted Federals did not pursue. The battle was over. Some 3,482 were dead and 16,420 lay wounded.

OUR STAFF RIDE began at the Cherry Mansion, Grant's headquarters, at Savannah, Tenn., 12 miles upriver and continued to the Battlefield Park. Each important location and phase of the battle was dissected bit by bit as we trekked on foot along the main lines of defense which the Union army occupied. The members of our group were in awe of the fact that so many troops could be massed in such small areas and forced to cross wide expanses of open ground while enduring a hail of rifle and cannon fire. It was clear why one of every five participants in the battle was either killed or wounded. For many of the officers of our group, the tour of Shiloh reaffirmed a longstanding interest in military history. In others, a new spark of curiosity was ignited and their interest has grown. The lessons these modern soldiers have learned through the experiences of our ancestors can easily be applied to tomorrow's high-tech battlefields.

According to Bruce Catton, an author of books on the Civil War, "On paper, Shiloh was a draw: Actually it was one of the decisive battles of the war. It was a battle the Confederacy simply had to win. For it had been a blow struck to restore a disastrously lost balance, a desperate attempt to re-establish the Confederate frontier in the Kentucky-Ohio valley. It had failed and the fact that it had come close to being a dazzling victory did not offset the failure..."

The Lasers will be playing the Louisville Shooters, and the night will include the national entertainment act of Flash-n-Crash. Tickets are on sale at the rec center for general reserved seats at a cost of \$4.50, a savings of \$1.50 per ticket.

The Auburn Tigers hope to salvage their season by upsetting archrival Alabama this weekend at Birmingham's Legion Field.



Video teleconference link established with Kwajalein

"Good afternoon, General Hammond. How are you, sir?"

Like Alexander Graham Bell's "Mr. Watson come here, I want you," these words began a new era in telecommunications for the Strategic Defense Command. This greeting officially signed a new DoD Video Teleconference Center (VTC) at the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll on the air.

At Kwajalein, Lt. Gen. Robert Hammond, SDC's commanding general; Brig. Gen. Robert Menist, Office of the Assistant Secretary of the Army; and Kwajalein's VTC manager Ira Lee Stewart conducted the first official video teleconference from the new facility with SDC VTC manager Jack Miller Jr. at the SDC VTC in Huntsville.

Unlike Bell's message which traveled between two rooms, the Kwajalein-SDC VTC link spans 7,050 miles as the seagull and a few airlines fly, making it possible for personnel at the Army test range on Kwajalein Atoll in the Central Pacific to see and talk with co-workers at SDC in Huntsville and any other VTC facility in the Defense Department network.


"The USAKA (Kwajalein) center is now the most distant facility in the DoD system," Miller said, "since it's located approximately 2,000 miles beyond the VTC at Fort Shafter, Hawaii. In spite of the distances involved, the audio and video between USAKA and Huntsville are as clear as between any other facility in the system and better than some."

The link travels via the Defense Satellite Communication System to Colorado Springs, Colo., where it interfaces with the Defense Commercial Telecommunication Network. The new VTC facility is part of the Strategic Defense Initiative Organization/Air Force Systems Command VTC network, but is also compatible with all existing DoD VTC facilities, including the Missile Command's at building 5250.

SDC manages the Kwajalein VTC project with funding from SDIO and Kwajalein. AT&T is responsible

for engineering and assembly of the facility. Miller attributes the success of the project to several key individuals: Stewart, the Kwajalein VTC manager; Oscar Soto, Kwajalein/Dyncorp engineer; JoAnne James, AT&T VTC project manager, Forrest Crowson, AT&T installation engineer, Tom Bisaga, AT&T project management specialist; and Chris Capilongo, SDIO/AFSC network manager.

Stone, Sullivan seek congressional support for drawdown

WASHINGTON — The secretary of the Army told a recent meeting of military and corporate leaders in Washington that congressional support is essential during the ongoing military drawdown.

At issue is the Army's portion of the Defense Department reshaping plan — a plan Army Secretary Michael Stone and his chief of staff, Gen. Gordon Sullivan, said could be derailed by arbitrary constants and a "yo-yo of funding changes" from Congress.

During an Oct. 14 speech to the Association of the United States Army, Stone urged Congress to approve the plan, which calls for massive personnel cuts by 1995.

"We need to reach agreement on these plans...with minimal piecemeal changes," Stone said. "Their execution should then be delegated to the Army without the straightjacket of resource fencing and without the encumbrance of the need to produce unnecessary and unproductive reports."

He hinted that many in Congress should overcome their reluctance to reduce Reserve forces in their home states. The Reserve components grew from about 575,000 soldiers in 1980 to about 767,000 in 1991, according to the Defense Department. Meanwhile, the strength of the active force remained constant, at about 780,000 soldiers, with a planned end strength in 1995 of 535,000. Since the drawdown began in 1989, the Army has cut its active strength to 710,000 soldiers.

Stone said the Army must reduce the Reserves as well — to 550,000 soldiers by 1995 — to maintain a

"common sense balance" among active and Reserve forces. Those cuts, he said, can't be made without congressional approval. "We logically and financially must maintain a proper basis and a proper balance bet-

ween the active component and the Reserve component," he said.

Sullivan told the convention the following day that "we have the right force mix today and will retain it" if Congress allows the military to implement its reshaping plan. "We must have a balanced force by type and component," he said.

"Today's superb Army can be fractured if we are saddled now with arbitrary and well-meaning constraints that often produce unintended, adverse consequences," he said. "The Army has a plan; we must be allowed to execute it — without unwarranted fine-tuning and restrictive guidance." (Arnews)



Take steps to prevent chance of cold weather injuries

With the advent of cooler weather, now is the time to take steps to prevent cold injuries. Knowing who is likely to be injured and what the symptoms are help keep personal injury and suffering to a minimum.

Cold injury is a term which includes all of the types of injury produced by exposure to cold, i.e. non-freezing injuries, chilblains, trench foot/immersion foot, frostbite and hypothermia.

Certain factors increase an individual's susceptibility to cold injury. These include smoking or other tobacco use, fatigue, concomitant injury, poor nutri-

tion, race (blacks are more susceptible), too much or too little activity, certain medications, and consumption of alcohol.

The only warning symptom may be tingling, sting-

ing, or at most a dull aching sensation to the affected part, followed by numbness. The skin briefly may appear red and then become pale or waxy white. At this state, the affected part may feel like a block of wood.

If a cold injury occurs, the patient should be restricted from his/her usual duties or activities until the severity of the injury can be evaluated. A medical officer should see the injury as soon as possible. All constricting items of clothing, such as boots, socks, or gloves, should be removed from the site of injury. The injured area must then be protected from further cold injury by blankets or any available clothing which is not constricting. Refreezing of previously thawed areas greatly increases the damage to the injured area.

Wear and carry adequate clothing for the weather to be encountered. Wear clothing and footgear loose enough to permit layers of air to provide good insulation and to permit good circulation of blood to all parts of the body. Keep hands, ears, and feet well protected. Avoid immobilization in the cold when possible. Avoid overheating. Remove excessive clothing when in front of or in a warm enclosure. Carry extra socks. Change when wet, or if not wet, at least once daily.

Successful prevention requires vigorous command leadership and prior planning in such activities as cold weather training and the provisions of proper clothing and equipment. Specific preventive measures are directed toward conservation of total body heat and avoidance of unnecessary, prolonged exposure of personnel to cold, moisture, and activities or factors favoring cold injury.





Indian couple wants its children to know heritage

Spec. Jim and Della Yonnie may be the only full-blooded Navajo Indian couple at Redstone Arsenal. But any adjustments they've had to make are not ethnic related, but instead revolve around being far away from the Indian reservation on which both grew up.

"The difficult part is being away from family. I grew up around grandparents and my mom taught me Navajo traditions and culture. It's different for me now," Della said.

They lived close to the land, farming and leading a life close to nature and the seasons. Few distractions available to modern-day youth were available to them and they entertained themselves within the family unit, Della said.

Della is a student at the North Alabama College of Commerce, studying to become a business administrator and accountant. She also works in Huntsville Hospital's business office.






