International users of TOW slate Redstone visit

Redstone is the first U.S. site for a semiannual meeting next week of 10 international customers for the TOW missile system.

The TOW Weapon System Partnership Committee, part of the NATO Maintenance and Supply Agency, will meet March 30 through April 2. This is the first time the group has met outside the country of Luxembourg.


There will be TOW program managers here from Canada, Denmark, Germany, Greece, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal and Turkey. About 35 visitors, including military and civilian, are expected to attend.

"It's a semiannual meeting, and it's normally always at the depot facility at Capellan (in Luxembourg). Col. Jack Conway, the TOW project manager, invited them for a one-time deal to move their meeting out of Luxembourg into the U.S. mainly so that they could get an opportunity to see where TOW is managed, all the U.S. TOW facilities plus our depot capabilities at Anniston," said Perry Michael, the TOW international program manager. A member of the Security Assistance Management Directorate, he is assigned to the TOW Project Office.

The attendees will have an opening two days of meetings at the Tom Bevill Center on the campus of University of Alabama-Huntsville; a tour of the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School; opportunities to watch two missile firings; and a tour of the Anniston Army Depot. Conway, the project manager, is to present the latest information on TOW developments. Otherwise, the agenda for the two days of meetings will consist of business for the 10 member nations.

"It's going to give the NATO representatives a better understanding of what actually takes place in the United States regarding the TOW missile system," said 2nd Lt. Ann Mejasich, fielding officer in the TOW Project Office.

The stateside meeting will also give the international users a chance to meet their U.S. counterparts who they interface with, Michael said. Their host, the TOW Project Office, is under the Program Executive Office for Fire Support.



The alliance's maintenance and supply agency was established in 1958. Through partnership committees, the member nations pool their resources to alleviate some of the cost of buying weapon systems. The 10

members of the TOW weapon system partnership committee collectively support their maintenance depot in Capellan, Luxembourg. The committee normally meets in Luxembourg. (See TOW, cont'd on page 9)

Redstone will honor its young military family members with many fun activities during April's annual "Month of the Military Child."



Does not compute

Editor:

What is automation? It surely is not Usage Based Requirements Determination (UBRD), at least not from a cataloging standpoint. I will not go into the entire history of UBRD because the key players already know the background. A part of UBRD is called the Provisioning Screening System (PSS). PSS is supposed to replace the Cataloging Provisioning System (CPS) Application 433. It does not! Application 433 is a CCSS Application written in Cobol Language. The logic in CPS has been stable for many years. Basically, CPS is a good system. Under UBRD, the logic in CPS has been rewritten into Model 204 Language. What's wrong with this is that now we have to debug all the logic that was not correctly rewritten.

PSS will also route reports that CPS provides in hard copy to an on-line system. The Logistics Data Management Division (LDMD) has been doing this for over two years. The most important report is the Manual Item Supply Selection Decision Report (MISSDR). I know that provisioners, catalogers, and item managers know what a MISSDR is. Think what would happen if PSS could not correctly process MISSDRs. Under PSS, the name MISSDR has been changed to Decision Report. Changing names does not equate to automation.

Automation, in most cases, is supposed to reduce manual effort which equates to jobs. PSS does not eliminate manual effort. In fact, it increases manual effort based on what the LDMD representatives have seen on PSS. If you have 9,000 hard copy MISSDRs, it still takes the same number of personnel to work them, even if the MISSDRs are on an on-line system.

LDMD MISSDR On-line System does not eliminate jobs. It improves the process, eliminates the routing of hard copy, and it provides an audit trail on a MISSDR. Not only does it process a MISSDR, it also serves as a management tool.

The present owner of PSS is having a problem understanding the things required on PSS. Maybe they should take a lesson from Tech Staff on how to program Model 204. I saw a briefing on the MMD policy book on-line system. I was impressed! This letter might be out of line at this time, but when you really feel strongly about something and you know that you are right, well, speak out!

I was surprised and upset to learn that after 12 years as a bagger or head bagger, Helen Talarico had been dismissed from her job at the Commissary.

From what I have been able to gather, she was instructed to leave her work area without so much as a day's notice or warning of any kind.

It seems that the main reason for her dismissal was that she was assured of her position as head bagger by an election that was to take place so she had to be removed before the election, so someone else could take her place.

During that period, she was instructed not to go to the Commissary and not to talk to her former employees.

The baggers were also told not to talk about the situation with the patrons or they will face dismissal.

This, in my opinion, is a sad way to treat someone who was recently recognized by the retired community for her outstanding service and has been instrumental in helping Redstone Arsenal win "Commissary of the Year" in the past.

(Editor's note: H. L. Wainwright, the Commissary officer, provided the following response. "Commissary baggers, including the head bagger, are licensees and not federal employees. To secure this license to enter the commissary for the purpose of acting as a bagger and for rendering carryout services, each bagger signs a Standard Department of Defense 'Licensee Statement of Understanding (SOU) for Bagger/Carryout Services'. The SOU clearly states that the license may be revoked by the installation commander or by the commissary officer (if so delegated by the installation commander) at any time. Ms. Talarico's license was revoked for failing to comply with the SOU.

"Ms. Talarico was instructed to leave her work area immediately because once the license was revoked, she no longer had access to the commissary as a bagger. Ms. Talarico continues to come to the commissary as an authorized patron to shop, but she was asked not to talk to the other baggers while they were on duty. The remaining baggers were told nothing by commissary personnel to indicate they were not to discuss this situation with patrons.

"Our goal is to provide this community with the highest level of service possible. Eighty-eight commissary employees and approximately the same number of licensed and contract employees work very hard toward that goal every day. Bagger and carryout services are an important part of the commissary operation and even though they are not federal employees nor under the direct control of commissary management, you can be assured that they are treated fairly and with compassion.")

VA Hospitals

Editor:

The story I am about to reveal happened at one of our VA Hospitals... for I should know since I spent the last nine days of my father's life in the waiting room of the ICU...

My father had progressive Parkinson's disease, a neurological disorder, whereby dopamine is depleted from the base of the brain which causes paralysis. Medications work to create the same effect as dopamine and allows the individual movement. After a period of time, the drugs will wear off and the person again experiences paralysis until medication is ingested into the system.

On June 3, 1991, I received a phone call at work stating my father had pneumonia and was in need of immediate hospitalization. I wanted him transported to the VA Hospital in Birmingham to be near the chief of neurology at UAB since he was very familiar with my father's case. The doctor was successful in his treatment of my father when he contracted pneumonia in 1988. I was told that *all* the hospital beds were full. He would have to be transported instead to another VA Hospital location where there was no medical college, such as UAB or Vanderbilt University, nearby to rely on medical expertise.

How bad was the care? To begin, my father was given penicillin and he was allergic to penicillin. He was never weaned off of a respirator and after one day he was removed from the intensive care unit onto the regular ward. He experienced a cardiac arrest the following night. Prior to this, he had been fully alert and was able to communicate.

There are no words to describe the amount of suffering he experienced for the doctors never had my father on his Parkinson's medication. In other words, he was totally paralyzed on what is referred to as a "drug holiday." To treat the pneumonia they rammed tubes down his throat and never even bothered to question why they were having such difficulty. What I saw in the last 48 hours of my father's life was blood, intensifying in color, coming up in the canisters while he laid there in a comatose state. He wasn't even on any pain killers! Why did they not just put him outside and shoot him for it would have been kinder.

Soldiers/veterans, we have need to be concerned! We *must* collectively make sure the mess in the VA Hospitals is cleaned up for good. This is a benefit you have all earned. You fought greater battles than this one. There are fellow veterans behind you that need for you to do something *now* for the mess is just not going to go away. It requires *action*. Stand up for yourselves and demand better treatment for now and possibly your future.

Exit bonus deadline extended for certain officers

The captains' reduction in force (RIF) board scheduled to meet in March has been canceled, and the exit bonus application deadline for RIF-eligible majors has been extended to May 1.

A sufficient number of captains in the zone of consideration applied to leave the Army under one of the voluntary separation programs. The Army had established that 700 captains in year group 1982 must voluntarily leave or face being involuntarily separated when the RIF board met.

Since more than 700 applied to leave the Army voluntarily, Department of the Army will now have to decide whether all who applied to leave will be allowed to do so. No numbers are available on just how many captains applied for the early exit bonuses.

The RIF board for majors was set to meet March 10 because not enough majors in year group 1978 applied before the Feb. 29 deadline to voluntarily leave the Army. However, now that the bonus application deadline has been extended, officers who apply for one of the bonuses before May 1 will be allowed to separate voluntarily, even if they are selected by the March RIF board.

Locally, the new deadline for majors who want to apply for an exit bonus is April 24.

Major numbers

The number of majors the Army needed cut was originally 750, but as of March 9 that number had been changed to 300-350, according to information from the Military Personnel Office.

Majors with a date of rank between July 2, 1989 and March 1, 1991 inclusive (predominately year group 1978) were considered by the board, provided they have served at least one year on active duty in current grade as of March 1, 1992 and have less than 15 years active service as of Sept. 30, 1992.

Majors who do not apply for a bonus and end up selected by the RIF board will be forced out with regular separation pay, an amount lower than what he would receive under either of the two bonus incentive programs.

Officers on a promotion selection list, those who have already applied for an exit bonus and those who already have an approved voluntary or involuntary separation date prior to Oct. 1, 1992 were not subject to consideration by the RIF board.

Additional category

An additional category of officers has been identified who should seriously consider applying for the

voluntary incentive programs, according to Military Personnel Office.

These are captains and first lieutenants who were considered by a promotion board for the first time and not selected (major's promotion board of Nov. 19, 1991, and captain's board of Oct. 29, 1991).

The major's promotion list was released March 12, and those captains who were not selected for promotion have a deadline of May 7 to apply for the voluntary incentive program.

The captain's promotion list hasn't been released,

but once released, those first lieutenants who didn't make the list may apply for the bonus, provided they meet other qualifications.

Most first lieutenants won't meet the six years service requirement for applying for the incentive, according to Edward Dlugasch of MILPO, but they will be entitled to some benefits.

Panama assignment unique for chief of family housing

If things ever get intense for Redstone's family housing manager, he can always draw on his experience of the past two years as chief of the housing operation in postwar Panama.

Harold Lawson volunteered for the challenging assignment of providing housing at U.S. military installations in Panama in the aftermath of the invasion by the United States which toppled Manuel Noriega. Lawson was there from Jan. 11, 1990 until he returned to Redstone this February.

"When a war ends, it doesn't end completely. You still have some skirmishes here and there. Most of the war had stopped, and I got there during the cleanup portion of it," Lawson said.

By the time he arrived in Panama, most of the families of U.S. servicemembers had left in compliance with an order to evacuate. Things got even more interesting when that order was rescinded and the families were allowed to return. "The problem was to get the troops out of the housing and get houses back in livable condition for the families that were coming back," Lawson said. "It was a great challenge because you couldn't let the troops go for the protection; and we had the families there. The problem was where do you put the families. So it was a great coordination effort.

"We're talking about I'd say 1500 units that were being used by troops that had to convert back over to families; and also to provide household furniture and whatnot — which you don't normally have this kind of problem back in the states," he said. The majority of the occupants were U.S. citizens, with the exception of a few Panamanians who were permitted to live on post because of their employment with the U.S. government.

"One of the main problems we had was providing housing for the civilians. We had to provide them housing as well as the military because no one was allowed to live offpost I'd say for the first 12 months there because of the condition of the country," said Lawson, who went to Panama with his wife.

The problem of frozen pipes in Redstone housing, which he had addressed before leaving for Panama in

January 1990, probably seemed minor compared to the concerns he met in that country. "From a housing manager point of view, it was something I had never experienced," he said.

Lawson says he's happy to be back in the United States, and Redstone Arsenal in particular. The 52-year-old Chicago native first arrived at Redstone in August 1988 after spending two years in Korea as chief of family housing at Yongsan. At Redstone, he heads the 13-member family housing branch under the Directorate of Engineering and Housing; his office manages the 1,171 family housing units onpost plus the offpost referral program. His interest in housing began during his years in the Coast Guard from 1957-61 when he took care of lighthouses. Lawson's government civilian career, which began in 1962, has included five years with the Veterans Administration in Cleveland, Ohio; and five years with the Department of Housing and Urban Development in Cleveland. He has an associate degree in real estate from Cuyahoga Community College in Cleveland, a bachelor's degree in

public administration from Dyke College there; and he plans to return to Alabama A&M University this summer to complete the requirements for a master's in regional planning.

He and his wife, Nancy, have a son and a daughter. Harold Jr., 25, is a self-employed carpenter in Cleveland. Dardrena, 30, is a housing manager in Cleveland. Lawson's hobbies include operating ham radio, camping and gardening. He and his wife attend Ascension Lutheran Church in Huntsville.

"There's been some changes around here in the city (of Huntsville)," Lawson said, describing his feelings upon returning to this community. "I come in and see some super highways, streets that have taken to the sky. I was kind of amazed at that. I got lost a couple of times. There's been a lot of progress in the community plus at Redstone Arsenal — with ACOE (Army Communities of Excellence). It's amazing what federal employees can do with a paint brush. It feels comfortable to work in an environment you help to create. So, I fell right in with dungarees and paint brush. It's a great feeling to be back at Redstone Arsenal."



Domestic violence topic of upcoming events in Huntsville

Two events coming up downtown next month should be of interest to anyone who is concerned about family violence and its consequences in our society.

As was pointed out in last week's *Rocket*, Redstone has its share of family violence, just like any other community.

Gayla Sauls, executive director for HOPE Place, a shelter for family violence victims, said that of the 479 people who sought shelter at the facility last year, 100 — 44 women and 56 children — were Redstone residents.

Sauls stresses that while it's certainly important to help spouses involved in abusive relationships, it's just as important that children in these families also receive counseling. That, she believes, is the only way to break the cycle of domestic violence. And she has some sobering statistics to back up that belief.

"Seventy percent of male children in abusive homes grow up to be batterers, and 50 to 60 percent of females become future victims. Ninety to 95 percent of prison inmates come from abusive homes," she said.

Statewide, the number of people who sought shelter from abusive situations was 58,000 in 1991. In 1990 the number was 30,000.

HOPE Place is one of the sponsors of a public forum and a symposium dealing with the topic of

domestic violence. The forum, titled "Violence in the Home, Violence on the Street," will include speakers from the National Victim Center, the Quincy, Mass. District Attorney's Office and the Survivors Panel on Spouse Abuse, Street Crime and Sexual Assault. It will be held April 14 at 7 p.m. at the AmSouth Center, 200 Clinton Ave., West. Admission is free and

refreshments will be provided by the DuMidi Woman's Club.

On April 15, a conference on "Breaking the Cycle of Violence in the Home and on the Street" will be held in the north hall of the Von Braun Civic Center.

Topics of the conference include violence against women, violence in schools, effects of violence on children, model programs, community reclamation, and the correlations between domestic violence, child abuse and juvenile delinquency.


The conference will run from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The cost is \$20 and includes a luncheon sponsored by the DuMidi Woman's Club.

A seminar to help military families prepare for the transition to civilian life during the Army's downsizing will be held Thursday at the Bicentennial Chapel.

Results studied of second ERIS flight test

In the first Exoatmospheric Reentry Vehicle Interceptor Subsystem (ERIS) flight test on Jan. 28, 1991, ERIS performed all its expected functions, including completing a successful intercept. The second ERIS test interceptor was launched from Meck Island, Kwajalein Atoll, Republic of the Marshall Islands on March 13. The target vehicle was launched 20 minutes earlier by a Minuteman I ICBM from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.

ERIS' on-board telemetry, ground radar, and airborne observers indicated that the interceptor correctly identified the target and moved toward intercept. A self-imposed requirement for the interceptor to collect maximum data, pre-intercept, for utilization across the National Missile Defense Segment of GPALS, required a delay in the final divert maneuver. This delay, coupled with the particular, unexpected geometry of this target complex, proved to be just enough to preclude an actual intercept. Had the interceptor not been directed to collect this data (not required for this test), there is no doubt that an intercept would have occurred even with the unexpected target complex geometry.

Target vehicle and interceptor data were successfully acquired by assigned sensors, to include the Kwajalein radar suite, airborne sensors, and telemetry systems for postmission analysis.

More information will be provided as it is confirmed.



Association of the U.S. Army (AUSA) civilian advisory committee members visited Redstone last week to find out what issues and concerns Army civilians have.


The committee will use the information to advise their National Board of Trustees on what issues, position and direction AUSA should take in the interest of Army civilians in the legislative arena.

mally meets there in April and October. Of course, its spring meeting this year will be here for the first time.

"They own about 20 percent of the TOW systems that are fielded," Mejasich said. The Netherlands acquired this weapon system in 1972, followed by Germany in '73. The other eight nations, ending with Portugal, got the system by about 1978. TOW was first fielded in the U.S. Army in 1970.

The countries have tried to keep up with the constant TOW upgrades since then, according to Michael. "They've tried to keep standardization with the U.S. Army. That's the most important function: standardization of the TOW system within the using NATO countries," he said.



School's forklift accident could have been far worse

A variable reach 6,000-pound forklift slid down a five-foot embankment and landed on its side when the driver came too close to the edge of a rain soaked road March 10.

The advanced-individual-training student driving the forklift was taken to the hospital where she was treated and released.

SFC Eugene Bauer, safety office chief at Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School, said heavy rain the night before and morning of the accident, as well as the operator driving too close to the edge of the road, caused the embankment to collapse and the forklift to overturn.

The equipment was being used as part of a field training exercise. It was being convoyed back to the Ammunition Supply Point after training was completed at the Ammunition Transfer Point.

After negotiating a slight curve, the forklift came too close to the edge of the road. The training department instructor sounded his horn to gain the attention of the ground guides, but at the same time the forklift driver turned to the left, according to Bauer. Since the forklift was in four-wheel drive, the back wheels turned to the right. This brought the right rear wheel too

close to the edge of the bank causing it to give way under the weight of the forklift.

The accident caused \$430 in damages to the right rear fender and signal light of the forklift. Bauer said the result could have been far worse and called it a "safety success."

"We will look at the issues leading up to the accident," he said. "We could also use these issues to point fingers at what should have been done. But, in this case far more was done. It's important to point out to our soldiers and leaders what works and that their efforts are worthwhile. European production line for MLRS achieves status

Editor's note: The MLRS Project Office provided the following article.

On Feb. 18 another significant event in the storied young history of the Multiple Launch Rocket System took place. It was on this date, in Koblenz, Germany, that Col. William Taylor, the MLRS project manager,


awarded second source qualification status to the European MLRS Production Line.

In attendance from the United States were George Williams, the program executive officer for fire support, and John Beale, assistant MLRS project manager for coproduction.

The European MLRS production line consists of the prime contractor, the European Production Group-MLRS located in Munich, Germany, and numerous work-package manufacturers (subcontractors) located in Germany, France, Italy and the United Kingdom. The award was made to the European MLRS Program Bureau director, who is the official European partner nations representative in Europe. For such an award to take place there was a tremendous amount of international cooperation and coordination between the governments of the United States, the four partner nations and their contractors.

In July 1979 the governments of France, Germany, the United Kingdom and the United States entered into a Memorandum of Understanding for a cooperative program for a medium launch rocket system. The government of Italy joined the partnership in July 1982. The vision was to create a standardization/interoperable weapon system into the national ground forces of the participants. Objectives of the partnership were: to achieve the required operational capabilities while avoiding costly duplicate development programs; the development of production capabilities for the MLRS and its components in the countries of the European participants and the United States; and finally the development of a common logistical support system in Europe.

From the excellent results achieved during the European rocket qualification tests at White Sands Missile Range, N.M., to the completion of launcher qualification tests at CEM test range, France, the European MLRS has continuously performed to the Technical Data Package requirements. Then, during the Gulf War, a first of its kind took place on the battlefield of Desert Storm when the U.S. and European launchers stood side-by-side and performed brilliantly while sharing not only rockets, but common logistical support. This was tremendous proof of the successful culmination of the planning and vision formulated in 1979 and a giant effort in international cooperation. The MLRS has proven that it is truly an international system with its birth and success in the United States and rebirth and growth in Europe today.
