Work continues on reorganization of Missile Command

As the time for creation of the Missile, Armaments and Chemical Command draws closer, work on the reorganization is intensifying.

"We want to keep the work force informed as we move through the transition period," said Dr. Pauline Cason, chief of the Program Analysis and Evaluation Office.

"We haven't said a lot to date because the decisions were still being made, and it wouldn't make much sense to tell people something and then come along and change it," she added.

Current plans call for the creation of MACCOM — incorporating the armaments and chemical portions of the current Armaments, Munitions and Chemical Command at Rock Island Arsenal, Ill. and MICOM — at the end of September 1994. Workers from Rock Island are scheduled to begin moving here during FY 1995. Before MACCOM is established, two components, the Armaments Research, Development and Engineering Center, located at Picatinny Arsenal,

Plans call for the creation of the Missile, Armaments and Chemical Command at the end of September 1994.

N.J.; and the Chemical Research, Development and Engineering Center at Edgewood Arsenal, Md. will become subordinate to MICOM in FY 1994. The two activities will remain in their present physical locations.

The combination of activities to make MACCOM will be considered a transfer of function, according to Cason.

"People would have transfer of function rights. If there is a job duplication — if a person moves from Rock Island to fill a job, and there is already someone here in that job, then it may come down to seniority rights," she said. She added that she believes such a

situation would be rare, since Rock Island workers will generally fill armaments positions, while workers of the former MICOM will fill missile positions.

Concurrent with the creation of MACCOM will be the creation of the Logistics Support Activity here. Although the creation of LOGSA is being handled by the Army Materiel Command, Cason's office is working in a liaison capacity.

Cason has already begun briefing officials in communities that will be affected by the reorganizations, and her office has produced a plan for keeping people informed. MICOM's Civilian Personnel Office is putting together a plan to deal with the potential loss of skills and corporate knowledge that could result if a large number of Rock Island workers refuse to move.

"Our major concerns right now are the impact on missions, the loss of skills and knowledge and the impact on people's personal lives," she said.

Cason said MICOM workers will be kept informed of various aspects of the reorganizations and of decisions and developments as they come about.

Program informs Army about concerns of single soldiers

The Army wants to let single soldiers know they are an important part of the Army family, and is finding out what issues are important to them through the Better Opportunities for Single Soldiers (BOSS) program.


Locally, top military chain of command officials showed their support of the BOSS program by turning out in numbers to hear what single soldier concerns are.

In a BOSS workshop outbrief at the Post Chapel Thursday, unit commanders and/or first sergeants from all Redstone units got an opportunity to find out what BOSS is all about.

The soldiers presented a briefing to Maj. Gen. William Chen, commander of the Missile Command and Redstone Arsenal, at the conclusion of their three-day workshop.

The BOSS workshop was conducted by a training team from the Army Materiel Command. Also attending the workshop was CSM Michael Pierce, command sergeant major at Army Materiel Command.

Fifteen single Redstone Arsenal soldiers between the ages of 18 and 25, and representative of all soldiers demographically, were chosen as workshop participants. Installation staff representing recreation,

housing, food/club services and transportation were also workshop participants.

The workshop provided a forum for the exchange of information on quality of life issues between the soldiers and installation staff.

BOSS is a Department of the Army program which was begun in 1989 to identify leisure needs and improve the soldiers' quality of life, according to Michael Chemsak, chief of the Community Recreation Division and coordinator for the workshop. But since then, BOSS has been expanded to include quality of life issues such as housing, medical, commissary and PX concerns soldiers have.

The workshop was held off-post in a casual setting without interruptions so that soldiers would feel more at ease in expressing their viewpoints, Chemsak said.

The workshop consisted of focus group discussions

from the perspectives of both installation staff and soldiers. Through guided discussions, issues were brought up, analyzed by both groups and feasibility determined.

For the soldiers, BOSS provides an opportunity to express how they perceive their lives in the Army. It also lets them know how they are an important part of the total Army family.


Installation representatives benefit by not having to second guess what soldiers want or need, and are able to provide better products and services to the soldier.

Prior to presenting workshop findings to Chen on Thursday, Wanda Kirkpatrick, BOSS program manager from Department of the Army, said that the soldiers' recommendations were "not pie in the sky, but realistic recommendations."

As a followup to my wife's letter to the editor in the March 18 edition entitled "No recognition," I would like to make a few comments and pass on some information.

First, I was pleasantly surprised to discover the amount of people who expressed a personal concern for the situation I found myself in just prior to retirement. These included my wife, my present and former Battalion Commanders, Maj. Storey and Lt. Col. Holloway, the Chief of Staff Col. Amato and many others throughout the Arsenal, even though I had given it up as a dead issue and didn't pursue it any further.

Secondly, several points were brought to light as a result of my wife's letter. There is a seldom used and little known exception available to "flagged" personnel to receive an award. The Battalion Commander may request a waiver of the flagging action to have an award approved and presented, which is now being considered in my case. This of course, can only be used at the commander's discretion on a case-by-case basis. Even as an old admin sergeant, I wasn't aware of that one and neither were any of the Battalion PAC personnel. The Military Personnel Office was aware of it, I didn't inform the PAC of it until my wife's letter started people looking into the situation.

Lastly, to repeat nothing that every soldier hasn't heard before: If you feel that you have not been treated fairly in any situation, bring it to the attention of the "right people," namely your chain of command. If I had made more of an issue of this situation and made sure more of the right people heard me, I may not have had to leave Redstone Arsenal and the U.S. Army without any official recognition after 20 years of service. I guess you are never too old to learn and hopefully others will learn from this also.

Paper recycling day changes to Monday

Office paper recycling day here will change from Friday to Monday. The first Monday pickup day is April 6.

The Defense Reutilization and Marketing Office is changing to a work schedule of 10 hours per day, Monday through Thursday. Since DRMO will be closed Fridays, there won't be anyone to weigh the contractor's paper trucks in and out, explained Jerry Holton of the Missile Command's Environmental Office.

Pickups will still be every week or every other week, depending on the building. Only the day will change. Building custodians have been notified of this change by telephone, Holton said.

People in any building not currently participating in the Office Paper Recycling Program who wish to have their building brought into the program should call Holton, the recycling program manager, at 876-6125. "We will negotiate with the contractor to allow modification to the contract to add more buildings," he said.

"We have recycled over 450 tons of office paper since the program has been in operation. We would like to continue to increase the amounts we recycle. If you are in a building which is in the program, please participate. We could double or triple our recycling quantities if everybody in the buildings we now serve would get a box and join our recycling effort," Holton said.

"Recycling office paper not only prevents pollution and cuts down on solid waste, but all profits go to the Community and Family Activities Account, which supports our troops," he added.

Redstone an excellent community, says deputy CG

Redstone Arsenal has a commitment to excellence, says the deputy commanding general for the Missile Command.

"I think it's true that we have a very extensive sense of community here at Redstone, which is due to the commitment to excellence," Brig. Gen. James Link said during the March 23 ceremony in which he received his first star.

"I can tell you truthfully I cannot think of a better place to start my service as a general officer," he said.

Link is an Ordnance officer with a dual specialty as a multifunctional logistician, specifically in the areas of maintenance and supply management. He served as acting director of the Missile Logistics Center here from March to December 1988. Before that, he was director of the center's Materiel Management Directorate for two years.

Other prior assignments include chief of the Ordnance Corps assignments branch at Military Personnel Center from January 1984 until June 1985 in Alexandria, Va. Link commanded the 194th Maintenance Battalion at Camp Humphreys, Korea, from December 1982 to December 1983; immediately before that, he spent three and a half years on the Department of Army staff in the Office of Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics.

Link, 49, deployed from Germany to Southwest Asia on Dec. 8, 1990 and returned to Europe five months later. He served in Saudi Arabia, Iraq and Kuwait as commander of the 16th Corps Support Group in

supporting the VII U.S. Corps. His group consisted of five logistics battalions of 6,300 soldiers of active duty, Army Reserve and National Guard.

Before returning this year to Redstone, he served a

brief tour at Fort Lee, Va., as deputy commander for training developments in the Combined Arms Support Command.

Link was born in Columbus, Ohio, and raised in North Carolina. His father, now retired, was a career soldier who moved the family to the Fort Bragg area during World War II. Ralph Link is a veteran of World War II, Korea and Vietnam, who retired in June 1968 as a command sergeant major with 25 years service. Ralph and Rosemary Link now reside in Fayetteville, N.C. Their son James carried on the family's Army tradition by signing up for the Army's college option program Feb. 10, 1967 while attending graduate school at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. He graduated from Methodist College in Fayetteville in 1966 with a bachelor's degree in history. Link attended basic training at Fort Dix, N.J., advanced individual training at Fort McClellan, and Ordnance officer candidate school at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md. He was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Ordnance Corps on Dec. 7, 1967. Link's first assignment was to the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg; shortly afterwards, he went to Vietnam with the 173rd Support Battalion, 173rd Airborne Brigade, as a company commander. He served in Vietnam from July 1969 to July 1970. Link received a master's of business administration from the University of Tennessee in 1975.

He and his wife, Judy, have a daughter, Carey, 16, who attends Lee High School.

Intelligence professionals forming local chapter

An organization for intelligence professionals is being formed in the Huntsville area with an initial meeting scheduled Thursday afternoon.

The local chapter of National Military Intelligence Association (NMIA) will have its organizational meeting 4 p.m. Thursday at 5650 Sanderson Road, Suite G, near the Madison Square Mall. That facility, in an office building located behind Food World, serves as the classroom for the Strategic Defense Command's Opsec (Operations Security) course.

Intelligence professionals — military, civilian and corporate — are invited. The initial meeting, expected to last until about 5:30, will include membership sign-up and election of officers.

"NMIA was formed in 1974 as an organization to network intelligence personnel in the services, agencies and industry, and provide them with an outlet to enhance their development," said Wayne Simpson, a security supervisor specialist for SDC's Assistant Chief of Staff for Intelligence. "And additionally the intent has been to make the importance of intelligence better known to the public and to public officials. And


NMIA is dedicated to support of U.S. security through educational means."

Simpson is organizing the local chapter along with Col. Robert Troth, the assistant chief of staff for intelligence at SDC.

"Once we get organized, we plan to have a meeting probably every six months or as needed. We intend to submit articles for the *American Intelligence Journal*, and all members will receive that," Simpson said. An intelligence professional for 35 years, including active duty and civil service, he has been associated with NMIA off and on since about 1976.

The Washington, D.C.-based organization is led by a board of retired officers from the military services. Its headquarters address is Pentagon Station, P.O. Box 46583, Washington, D.C., 20050-6583.

"This is such a lucrative area for intelligence professionals — what with SDC, MICOM, MSIC and contractors, all the different organizations here — we think we have really fertile field (for potential members) in the Huntsville area," Simpson said. CG supports worker input in process improvements

Workers should not be afraid to speak up when they disagree with their supervisors, the MICOM commanding general said during a Total Quality Management meeting Thursday.

"In the job environment, yes sometimes it's difficult to say what you really have on your minds. Sometimes it's difficult to articulate your viewpoints, but you really need to try to do that, particularly when a supervisor is trying to impose on you something that is not right," Maj. Gen. William Chen said during the in-

service day for the Missile Command's TQM cadre.

The most direct approach is not always the best approach, and workers need to plan a strategy to get their point across, the commander said.

Chen expressed his view that the working level, and not the corporate headquarters, is best able to improve its own processes.

"My message to you is twofold. First, this whole business of process action teams that you play in: You're the ones that work the processes. You're the ones that best know how to streamline. That needs to come from bottom up," he said. "Second of all, we need to continue this overall implementation of TQM in this decentralized mode that we have."

The Acquisition Center conducted this in-service day at the Officers Club for the command's Total

Quality Management cadre. An estimated 140 people attended a morning session in which Dr. Alan Zimmerman, a consultant from Prior Lake, Minn., gave a presentation on "Living by Constructive Risk." After lunch, there was light entertainment followed by Chen's remarks.


This was the TQM cadre's third in-service day, according to Melvin Waters, the Missile Command TQM executive officer. "We hold them about once every quarter to try to promote team-building, introduce the cadre to new ideas that are coming across, tell them what's happening at AMC (Army Materiel Command) and DA (Department of Army), and to identify some shortcomings that we have here at MICOM," Waters said.



Stinger cleanup after desert exposure a major task

Editor's note: The Air-to-Air Missile Project Office provided the following article.

Just like the Phoenix, the Stinger will rise to fight again.

Perhaps the least publicized participant of the 1991 Southwest Asia conflict was the Stinger missile system. Due to the obvious absence of an air conflict, there was little mention made of the mighty Stingers' presence on the battlefield. In fact, there were literally thousands of the highly lethal shoulder-fired missiles present. Additionally, other Stingers were deployed onboard the new Avenger platforms which deployed in the 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment from Fort Bliss, Texas, and the 1st Cavalry Division from Fort Hood, Texas. In contrast to other larger missile systems, the tactical employment characteristics of the Stinger dic-

tated extreme exposure to the harsh environmental conditions of the battlefield.

After six to eight months of daily exposure to the heat and sand of the Saudi Arabian desert, the Stingers now require an extensive refurbishment program. According to Julia Wilson, who as chief of the deployment branch, Air-to-Air Missile Project Office, (See Stinger, cont'd on page 13)





Missile school plans bass tournament to help AER drive

The Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School will sponsor a bass tournament April 25 at the civilian recreation area to raise money for Army Emergency Relief.

Check-in time for the tournament will be 5:50 a.m., with a 6 start time. The tournament waters will be from the Guntersville Dam to Wheeler Dam.

Entry fee is \$30 per boat (two persons per boat limit) with \$5 of the fee going to the Big Bass Contest.

Payback for the event is as follows: 30 percent for first place, 15 percent for second place, 10 percent for third; and the remaining 45 percent goes to the AER campaign.

The Big Bass contest will be on a total payback based on the \$5 per person entry fee included for the tournament.

Official rules for the OMMCS AER Bass Tournament are as follows:

- The tournament is open to anyone 18 years or older with a valid Alabama state fishing license. Participants under 18 must have a signed notarized statement from a parent or guardian.
- There will be no official practice or off limits time for this tournament.
- Safe boat conduct will be observed at all times.

All competitors will wear an approved life vest and it must be zipped, strapped, or snapped securely and maintained in that condition any time the main engine is running.

• Competitors are expected to follow high standards of sportsmanship, courtesy and conservation. Safety will be observed at all times. Use of alcohol or drugs (other than those over the counter or prescribed by a physician) by any competitor will be cause for automatic disqualification.

• Only artificial lures may be used; there will be no live or prepared bait used, with the exception of pork strips, rinds, etc. Only one casting or spinning rod and reel may be used at one time. Rods will be no longer than 8 feet. Other rods may be on the boat and rigged.

• No boat may have a motor that exceeds the limitation set by the U.S. Coast Guard i.e., will not exceed the horsepower rating on the horsepower rating plate.

• All boats will have an aerated livewell and bilge pump.

• There will be no fishing within 50 yards of a marina gas pump, or another competitor. And contestants must remain in the boat at all times except in an emergency.

Scoring will be by the pounds and ounces. Only

Spotted, Redeye, Large and Smallmouth bass will be weighed. The limit is seven fish per boat, and all fish must be 12 inches in length. Only seven fish will be allowed in the livewell at one time; when the eighth fish is caught, it will be released or culled with one in the livewell.

The aforementioned rules for this tournament will remain unchanged except for special circumstances. The tournament director will have the final decision in all matters on rule change. Violation of any of the rules is reason for disqualification.

Any fish brought to the scales measuring less than 12 inches will receive a one pound penalty; and there is a four pound penalty for all dead fish.





Fast recreational runner wins Rocket Run 10-miler

Mike Yarnell may just run for fun these days, but he sure does run fast. The Westinghouse software engineer won the annual Rocket Run 10-miler here Saturday in 56 minutes and 27 seconds.

"I ran in high school. I wasn't good enough to run in college. I just run for fun now," said Yarnell, 31, of Harvest. "It's just personal pride now; just to see how good I can do."

He did very well Saturday. Yarnell caught Mark Dummer at six miles then ran stride for stride with Bruce Mann from about eight and a half miles until only a half mile left in the race. He sprinted in for first place. Yarnell, who is just starting to get back into the racing scene, did better than he had expected. "I'm very happy," he said.

Mann, 33, finished second in 56:41. Dummer, 29, placed third in 57:51. The first female finisher was Jamie Clay, 35, in 66:42, only about five seconds off her personal best time for the distance. "Yong (Yancura) and I were together for like two or three miles, and she was right behind me the whole way," said Clay, who works at the University of Alabama-Huntsville for the dean of the graduate school.

Lawrence Hillis, 42, won the 5K (3.1 mile) race in 16:32. Stacy Schorr, 27, was the top female finisher in the 5K in 19:58. There were 92 finishers, including 22 females, in the 10-miler; and 86 finishers, including 23 females, in the 5K. Sixteen people ran both races which were held near Pagano Gym on a sunny, clear morning with temperatures in the 50s.







Retired chaplain has advice for transitioning soldiers

BY SKIP VAUGHN

The past staff chaplain for Redstone Arsenal encourages soldiers leaving the military to accept their transition and use it to their advantage.

"It's going to be painful, it's going to be scary, it's going to be depressing, but in the end it'll be rewarding," retired colonel Billy Whiteside said during a transition seminar held Thursday at Bicentennial Chapel.

Whiteside, 58, served as Redstone's staff chaplain until retiring from the Army in April 1991. He recently served as staff chaplain for Methodist Hospitals in Winchester, Tenn., but is leaving Winchester to return to Leavenworth, Kan., where he lived from 1976-86. He plans to open a private counseling practice in Leavenworth and go to school. "I'll probably be the only person in class that uses my Social Security to go to school," Whiteside quipped.

He painted a realistic picture of what the transitioning soldiers can expect from life on the outside. "The Army has always prided itself in taking care of its own. But when you move out into the civilian community, that's not there. And that's one of the things that I miss," he said. Whiteside described how the Army community at Redstone welcomed him with open arms when he arrived in 1986. He had already received calls of welcome, a house awaited him and the neighbors greeted him. "These are the things you really ap-

preciate in the military, but these are the things you don't find in civilian life," Whiteside said.

The retired chaplain encouraged the attendees to keep a positive attitude to help them through the changes that transition will bring. "If we see ourselves being successful, we will be successful. If we see ourselves being a failure, we will be a failure. We become what we see ourselves being and becoming," he said.


Whiteside listed the typical stages people go through when they experience loss: denial, anger, bargaining, depression, and acceptance. "When we leave the military we are suffering a great loss, particularly if we intended to make it a career," he said. "Grieving allows us to go to the next stage: acceptance.

"Life is an ongoing process; and being an ongoing process, we begin to have a glimmer of hope. We see light at the end of the tunnel," he said. "While this (transition) is very painful, we will move out of it a much stronger and a better person."

A friend of his became unemployed but moved on to a better job within three weeks, he related, asserting that this is a typical case.

"Whether we like it or not, we are always created with potential. The greatest fear we have is not our fear of failure, as we thought it was. The greatest fear we have is that fear of our potential," Whiteside said. "We have all been created with potential, and the thing we fear the most is that fear of our potential."

When it comes to system integration, we wrote the book.

directed the system deployment: This refurbishment effort approaches a logistical nightmare.

Since early September, Red River Army Depot in Texas has been establishing accountability, cleaning and repainting missiles, containers, and related equipment. This task is monumental. The cleanup effort and subsequent repackaging effort will continue throughout the summer.

Stinger must now assume a more prominent role in the air defense community, due to the recent cancellation of the ADATS program. Redeployment to tactical troops has already begun, Wilson said. As more missiles emerge from refurbishment, they too will be assigned to other tactical units. As Avenger/Air-to-Air-Stinger deployments continue, so will the need for more Stingers.

Col. Donald Watt, the Air-to-Air Missile project manager, foresees nothing less than a bright future for the highly effective Stinger program. In fact, there are several hardware enhancements on the drawing board.

"We are the FAADS (Forward Area Air Defense System) community. We are the only ones left to defend in the air battle," Watt said.


