Daily routine not immune from hazardous material spills

Hazardous material spills are everyone's problem — whether they're caused by improper use of the gas pumps or by careless dumping.

That's the message being hammered home by Redstone fire, safety, environmental and contractor officials. They gathered to talk about the problem Thursday, only to be called away in mid-interview by a report of a hazardous spill at building 8022.

Someone reported seeing janitorial workers pouring used stripper into the storm drain outside that building; and sure enough, this is a corrosive material strong enough to kill nearby grass. The storm drain of course leads straight to a body of water. "I hope this is not indicative of what the cleaning service does all over the Arsenal," said Jerry Holton, the installation spill coordinator who works in the Environmental Office.

Improper use of the gas pumps, resulting in gasoline spills and a potential fire hazard, pose a similar problem for officials. "It just disrupts everything and costs a lot of money," Holton said.

On June 12 at the motor-pool gas pumps, someone put a rock under the handle of the nozzle in order to keep the hose open. After filling up, the individual drove off with the rock still under the handle resulting in a major spill of diesel fuel. The military police and fire department responded; fortunately there was no fire.

People driving off with the nozzle still in their gas tank has been a continuing problem, according to Roy Coulter, the field operations foreman for the base support contractor, BAMS. He recalls seven cases this year alone in which nozzles have had to be replaced.

"They seem to just leave the nozzle in the tank and for one reason or another drive off," Coulter said. "We've had seven of them replaced and these are right at \$50 a piece, not to speak of the fire hazards that we have.

"We know who does it every time," he added, referring to information from the computer system which records the vehicle number and time. This gas station for government vehicles in an unattended station

which users access by putting their assigned cards into its computer.

This qualified as a hazardous spill, and was handled accordingly — the substance was neutralized and then captured as much as possible. Holton said major fuel spills at the motor-pool gas station are just as costly.

Problems caused by improper use of the pumps include bringing a spill into the environment and creating a possible fire hazard, said Sherrie Elliott-Bishop, a safety and occupational health specialist in the Missile Command Safety Office.

Fires resulted from two separate incidents at the gas pumps last year. These caused about \$1,200 damage to the pumps, according to Jim Hughes, a fire inspector with Redstone Fire Department.

"Unauthorized containers like milk jugs, gas cans, are not allowed to be filled at the gas station. Also, it is the responsibility of the user for safety at the gas station because it is an unattended gas station," Hughes said.

Officials list the following steps that people should use to ensure safety at the gas pumps:

- No smoking.
- Turn off the vehicle. Make sure the vehicle is turned off before engaging the gas pump or the diesel pump.
- Get authorization from the computer before removing the nozzle from the pump. There is a 60 second delay from the time the computer gives you authorization to fuel your vehicle, so you have plenty of time to put the nozzle in the gas tank after stepping away from the computer, pointed out Diane DeHart, the contracting officer's representative in contract services at Directorate of Logistics.
- Ensure that you hold the nozzle in your hand; do not place anything under the handle such as the gas cap or rock or anything like that.
- After filling up, be sure to replace the nozzle on the pump before departing.

"People need to realize how dangerous a situation this is, not only to the person who's filling his vehicle and committing an offense but to the other customers at the time," said Coulter, the BAMS field operations foreman. "Gasoline is something we use every day and tend to take for granted, but it is a very dangerous substance."

Commentary: Retiring colonel a real Pershing soldier

The American soldier his counterparts in the once Soviet Union know best is Col. Thomas M. Brown. One of Brown's former Pershing warrant officers says that caused the end of the Cold War. "The Sovs thought we all were like Colonel Brown and gave up," he explains.

As anyone in MICOM will tell you, none of us are like Colonel Brown. He is without question, absolutely, one of a kind — an American original. Which is one reason many of us hold him in special esteem. Getting to know him is worth the effort.

The Pershing warrant's theory notwithstanding, the Cold War started winding down when the United States and the then Soviet Union agreed in December 1987 to scrap their intermediate range nuclear missiles instead of shoot them at one another. Soldiers of both sides who had spent their adult lives getting ready to fight would now instead watch one another destroy some of their best weapons. Neither side had any practice at this, but it clearly was something that had to be done right the first time, carefully, by-the-numbers.

Our Army told Brown to take charge, march off and do whatever had to be done to make sure the Army made good on its piece of the American INF promise. Brown then was the Pershing project manager, the Pershings were the Army missiles covered in the treaty. So he was the logical choice and as it turned out, the right one. Taking charge, marching off and doing

whatever must be done are some of the many things he did well in three decades of active Army service that ended last midnight.

He is the first to tell you he had a lot of help. His stories about the INF Treaty days are all about his people — soldiers and civilians — Pershing project office then, the Weapon Systems Management Directorate now. They specialize in managing "mature" weapons. That requires an ability to overcome a chronic lack of money with great personal energy and enthusiasm and, at times, audacity. It is worth noting that soldiers who once worked for Brown and who admire him greatly say "audacious" when describing him.


Bringing the Pershings home from Germany and getting rid of them were the easiest parts of the INF task. Doing it when and how the treaty said it would be done while complying with federal, state and local environmental regulations proved harder. No state regulator or environmentalist is pleased to meet a man looking for a place to captive-fire 800 large solid fuel rocket motors, each capable of blowing more than a ton of hydrogen chloride into the atmosphere. There were also the Soviet inspectors. No piece of Pershing could be eliminated without a Soviet watching and more important, willing to agree that it had in fact been eliminated.

So Brown and his people went off to do face-to-face business with the Soviets, but not without misgivings in some quarters. There was, for example, an Army

- You can legally purchase fireworks in *rural* Madison County and the City of Owens Cross Roads.
- All vendors must have a valid permit from the State Fire Marshal's Office, as well as a state license to sell fireworks.
- You can legally use fireworks in *rural* Madison County, however, it is the user's responsibility to ensure that the fireworks are utilized in such a way as to not injure themselves, other people, or property. Persons who cause fires as a result of carelessly using fireworks will be held liable for damages.
- It is illegal to use fireworks in the city limits of Gurley, Huntsville, Madison, New Hope, and Owens

Officers may be selected for law school program

Applications are now being accepted for the Army's Funded Legal Education Program (FLEP). Under this program, up to 10 Army officers may be selected to attend law school at government expense while on active duty.

Because of possible funding limitations, participation will be contingent on availability of funds. This program is open only to active duty commissioned officers who have at least two but not more than six years of active duty at the time legal training commences. Further eligibility requirements and the application procedures are set forth in Army Regulation 27-1, dated Sept. 15, 1989.

Eligible officers interested in applying should immediately register for the fall offering of the Law School Admission Test. The original application must be sent through command channels, to include the officer's branch manager at PERSCOM, and be received by Nov. 1 in the Office of the Judge Advocate

General, Attn: DAJA-PT, Washington, D.C., 20310-2206. Submission of the application well in advance of the deadline date is advised.



Soldier just proud to have been part of it all

"Beyond anything else that might be said to characterize him, first and foremost he's a soldier."

Words of Maj. Gen. William Chen, commander of Army Missile Command and Redstone Arsenal, to welcome fellow professionals, friends and family to the retirement ceremony Monday at the Officers Club honoring Col. and Mrs. Thomas Brown.

"Whatever he did, he distinguished himself as an expert," Chen continued, mentioning Brown's expertise

the Intermediate Nuclear Forces treaty, on the elimination of weapon systems, on arms control, as a DA staff officer and as project manager.

Brown completes more than 30 years service as a regular, field artilleryman and a paratrooper upon his retirement. Among his assignments, one was with the 319th Field Artillery in 1962 and later with that regiment's 3rd Battalion during five campaigns in Vietnam, including the Battle of Hill 875 and the Tet Offensive.

In 1970 he was with the "Corps Artillery" in Cambodia supporting the ARVN Airborne Division and later the 1st Cavalry Division.

He also served in command and staff positions with the 23rd, 40th, 42nd, 73rd and 319 Field Artillery Regiments at the Field Artillery School and Fort Sill, Okla.

In 1971 he was at Fort Bragg, N.C., as operations officer for the Airborne Company Test and that experience led to an assignment in the Pentagon as a Department of the Army systems coordinator where he helped field the current family of howitzers.

By 1979 he was in a joint program officer. After a command position in Korea, he was deputy director of business management at Defense Systems Management College.

It was 1984 that Brown came to Huntsville and the Strategic Defense Command. He joined MICOM's Pershing team as project manager in 1986 and with his team played a major role in the INF Treaty negotiations.

When the treaty came to pass, Brown led the team through missile retrograde and elimination.

Brown began his last assignment, as director of Weapon Systems Management Directorate, in 1989. Chen commended Brown and that directorate for

distinguishing itself during Desert Shield and Desert Storm by maintaining high readiness levels on the Improved TOW Vehicle and support of other missile systems such as Hawk and Chaparral.

for Brown. Not to worry, Brown assured the PAO, "We are soldiers. Soldiers understand one another. We can work this out."

Typically, the working out process went like this: On one side of the junk yard car crusher (a green one with "L. Miller & Son, Huntsville, Ala." painted on it) in a high desert coulee on Pueblo Army Depot are Brown and a couple of his people and on the other side are 10 Soviets. They are discussing, with the help of a pair of anxious and by now hoarse interpreters, the fine points of the paragraph in the INF Treaty defining missile "stages." At issue is how much of a burned out Pershing II motor is about to be squashed by L. Miller's far-from-home car crusher. Brown is holding

it for just the nozzle and kevlar motor case. The Soviets insist he throw in the actuators and control mechanisms too. As the cold wind comes harder off the snow-capped Rockies to the west and the light fades, the Soviets are beginning to realize that Brown is not fazed by mind games, he enjoys them.

It went on more or less like that for three years, at Pueblo and Longhorn Army Ammunition Plant where the Pershing motors were captive fired, squashed and buried, and at Hausen in Germany where most of the

transporter-erector launchers were cut up. Individual members of the Soviet teams changed, but each time their airplane rolled to a stop, there stood Brown. Maybe he had flown all night and then driven 125 miles in a snow storm, but there he would be in a fresh uniform, wearing his hungry-wolf smile, charged up, ready to go. The dossier the Soviets compiled on him must fill a file drawer.

Imagine reading it: shaved head, artilleryman, paratrooper, two combat tours in Vietnam, shot down while flying as a forward observer, service on various staffs, faculty at DSMC. Somewhere along the way they surely realized they were dealing with a more complex character: a military historian, a weapons collector, a warrior at home in anyone's army, ours, theirs — or Patton's, Lee's or Caesar's for that matter. How did they react to a man who likes being a soldier so much that he spends his spare time reenacting Civil War battles? What did they think of someone with such traditional values about military service and his country?

The Army could have done worse when it picked Tom Brown to be the American some Soviets came to know best.

Yes, he wrote the book on treaty compliance,

eliminating military weapons and getting along with former enemies. He not only got it done, he got it done right and, on occasion, with elan. And by keeping every Pershing piece that he could out of the car crushers and available for re-use he saved you and I more than half a billion dollars. Which is not to say that anyone can take his book and do as he did. For that you need the cook, not the cookbook.

Who but Tom Brown would have invited all the old Pershings — contractors, government civilians and soldiers, and their families to Longhorn to see the last Pershing missile eliminated? And who but Tom Brown would have brought the Field Artillery Half Section: soldiers in World War I uniforms, six-horse team pulling a 75 mm cannon, down from Fort Sill to take part. What began as a ceremony became a communion. Even the Soviets were impressed.

Just before they fired the last motor that day, John White and Wayne Shields, two soldiers who put their entire careers into the Pershing system, took a piece of chalk and printed on the motor case:

"For all the REAL Pershing Soldiers
You Know Who You Are"

We all knew one: Colonel Thomas M. Brown.

MPs need your help in areas of driver courtesy, parking

Redstone military police have seen increases in the following problem areas lately: lack of driver courtesy, improper parking, and misuse of the emergency telephone number.

Specifically, motorists haven't been yielding to their fellow drivers like they should. There have also been cases of drivers exchanging unpleasanties, and forcing other motorists off the road. This general driver discourtesy isn't good for any post, particularly one which just won an Army Communities of Excellence award as most improved installation.

In the area of parking, people have been parking in handicapped spaces when they aren't eligible to. They have also been parking on the side of heavily traveled roads, causing a potential traffic hazard.

The emergency telephone number, 911, is just that: a number to be called only for law enforcement, medical or fire emergencies. Some people, unfortunately, have been calling that number on a lark. Juveniles are suspected, according to the MPs.

Lt. Col. Randy Holloway, the provost marshal, has the following guidance on the subject of driver courtesy. "No. 1, everybody should drive defensively — looking out for other people, looking out for bicycles, looking out for people at crosswalks," he said. Motorists should yield to the vehicle on their right, for example, when stopped at an intersection with multiple stop signs. They should yield to pedestrians in the crosswalks. They should also yield

to bicycles on roadways, when appropriate. "Likewise, in the same vein, bicyclists are required by law to adhere to the same rules of the road that automobiles and trucks are supposed to," Holloway added.

The problem of discourteous drivers has been evident on major access roads such as Goss and Rideout. People trying to exit Goss Road onto Rideout Road in order to leave post, are having a difficult time. "The people on Rideout exiting post need to drive in such a manner as to allow vehicles to merge with the flow of traffic, and to adhere with just common driver courtesy," Holloway said. "And that's all over the Arsenal: There are a lot of roads that are just access roads, and people just won't let you out."

On the issue of parking, there are three items that identify an individual as authorized to use a handicapped space and any one of the three is sufficient. These include a designated license plate, a blue sticker which can be affixed to the license plate, and a placard for the dashboard. Each one of these items must be ap-

plied for through the Alabama commissioner of revenue along with medical proof of disability. Even if you are a disabled veteran with a 50 percent or more disability, you cannot park in a handicapped space unless you have one of those three required items. The penalty for improper use of a handicapped parking space is a \$15 fine for violating Title 32 of the Alabama Motor Vehicle Code.

"The problem we're experiencing too is abuse of family members coming in and parking in those (handicapped) spots themselves," said Sgt. Maj. Jr. Gilmore of the Provost Marshal Office. The handicapped person must be with the vehicle, in order for that vehicle to occupy a handicapped space. If a family member alone parks there for convenience, this is a violation which could bring a \$15 fine. "They are abusing that privilege; that's not intended for them," Gilmore added.

Another parking related problem lately has been people parking in unauthorized roadside or grassy areas. Missile Command regulation 210-2, appendix B, states: "Parking is prohibited on lawns, parade grounds, grassed or seeded areas. This does not apply to government-owned, leased or rented vehicles when in the process of accomplishing official government work. Vehicles in the housing area and vehicles parked near recreation, hunting, or fishing areas may be parked on the shoulder of the roadways without curbs provided the vehicle is completely off the traveled portion of the roadway and facing the direction of travel on that side of the roadway and parked no more than 3 feet from the edge of the roadway."

When in doubt about whether you can park on a roadside, try to find an authorized parking space just to be safe, MPs advise.

Holloway offers one final note on the issue of misuse of the emergency phone line, 911: "911 is an emergency number. It is traced, and the Arsenal's experiencing a large number of false phone calls to 911 and that is a criminal offense; and individuals who are caught will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law. We believe juveniles are doing it; if it is a juvenile who's doing it and they are caught, the sponsor is the one who pays the price."





Educational program addresses perpetrators of abuse

Hope Place, a local shelter for battered women, and the Family Services Center, a United Way agency that provides family counseling services, are joining forces to provide an educational program designed not for the victims of abuse, but for the abusers themselves.

Dubbed HEART, for Helping End Abusive Relationships Together, the program is aimed at changing the behavior of the batterer.

Charles Deville, executive director of the Family Services Center, and Gayla Sauls, executive director of Hope Place, expect most of their participants to come as court-mandated referrals, since the course can be used by judges as a form of alternative sentencing.

Hope Place volunteers will distribute information about the course to judges in both the Madison County and Huntsville Municipal Courts, and will assist with the sessions.

Referrals from other sources will also be accepted, and individuals can sign themselves up. Cost for the 12-week course is \$300, plus a \$25 initial registration fee. Deville said he hopes to have enough referrals to begin a session in July.

"It's basically an educational program to teach techniques for handling anger. We'll also be looking at attitudes about women that are destructive. For exam-

ple: seeing a woman as property; and what it means to be a man," Deville said.

"People with this problem often have rigid ideas about marriage and relationships," he added.

The course will follow a set curriculum, and there will be homework assignments, Deville said.

Sauls and Deville agreed that success rates for individuals who go through the program may not be as high as could be hoped.

"But it's all there is," Sauls said.

"If a person is mandated into the training, he probably will resist, but generally men who go through tend to de-escalate their physical violence," she added.

It is conceivable that some Redstone soldiers could

be referred to this program if they are involved in domestic violence cases under the jurisdiction of the civilian legal system. Redstone may also refer soldiers if there is insufficient room in the existing anger containment and stress management classes.

"During times of financial crunch, we look to cooperation between the civilian and military communities," said Dr. Bill Resha, director of Army Community Service here. Resha added that ACS has a Memorandum of Understanding in effect with Hope Place for mutual assistance.

Deville and Sauls cited several statistics that prove domestic violence is a serious problem in our society. Among them:

- Huntsville police responded to 6,000 domestic violence calls in 1990.

- It is estimated that only one out of 10 incidents of domestic violence is reported.

- In the last two months, Hope Place has been forced to turn away 30 people because there was no room for them.

Program reaches out to military families in need

Editor's note: The worldwide Army organization that provides social services for soldiers and their family members will celebrate its 27th birthday this month. Army Community Service at Redstone plans to observe the anniversary with an open house from 1-3 p.m. July 23 at building 3491. ACS provided the following information as part of a series of articles about its programs.

The Outreach Program at Army Community Service was initiated to help soldiers and family members

develop a sense of self-reliance and belonging in the military community, to assist spouses in adjusting to Army life and to increase family satisfaction with the military lifestyle.

Norma Dalton has succeeded Virginia Dempsey as outreach program manager for the next 120 days beginning in July. Dempsey has become the program manager for relocation assistance, Exceptional Family Member Program, and the information, referral and followup program. The staff changes result from the

departure of Frances Howard who was serving as program manager for relocation, EFMP and information/referral/followup.

The Outreach Program targets those families who have the greatest level of need, but are the least likely to seek out and take advantage of services until they have reached a state of crisis.

"Through the Outreach Program, I assist soldiers and families in making the best possible use of all services and resources available to them," Dempsey said during an interview conducted while she served as outreach program manager.

She was especially interested in working with the first-time soldiers and their families, the single-parent families and families who are geographically or socially isolated. Through the Family Support Group, she could reach the spouses of soldiers on unaccompanied tours or extended temporary duty.

Dempsey would furnish the family with information about the services available to them in both the military and civilian community, assisted them in developing a plan of action that would meet their needs and provided support as they resolved their problems.

There are many education and prevention programs as well as support networks and services which are available. However, many families never have the opportunity to learn about these resources and how they can be used. The outreach program manager is a link between the family and the organizations to bring the two together.

Other duties of the Outreach Program include distributing and tabulating the yearly Family Symposium survey forms. It is important for the community to know that each survey form they complete offers an issue and a solution to be presented to the delegates at the symposium.

"These issues let the command know what the problems are and how the community would like to see the situation resolved," Dempsey said.

Through briefings and desk side visits, the outreach program manager draws together commanders, first sergeants, agencies and individuals with ideas and interests in improving the quality of life of soldiers and family members. These discussions provide the program manager with suggestions to identify community or unit needs which encourages the development of needed services not already available.

"From the commanders and agencies' staff, I learn what new programs need to be expanded or developed to meet the needs of our community. This vital interaction provides the focus and direction of my program," Dempsey said.

World War II vets visit site their ammo came from

When the 2nd Chemical Mortar Battalion was fighting in Africa, Sicily and France during World War II, Huntsville, Ala., was a place most had never heard of.

But Huntsville Arsenal was where their ammunition, the 4.2-inch chemical mortars, were loaded and prepared for shipment. The 2nd Battalion's mission was artillery support. They fired 4.2-inch mortars containing HC smoke to conceal troop movements.

Neal Holland of Decatur remembers his war days in Italy when he saw crates arrive with Huntsville Arsenal markings. It made him feel "just a little bit closer to home," he said.

On June 11-13, the battalion had its yearly reunion, something they've done since 1946. Holland and his wife, Emma, were instrumental in planning the event, which brought some 100 veterans and their families to Huntsville.

The group visited Redstone Arsenal on June 12 to learn about the place they had some connection with during the war. Prior to the Space and Rocket tour that showed them certain landmarks on the Arsenal, they had lunch at the Challenger NCO Club and were told about Huntsville and Redstone Arsenal's histories.

CSM David Holmes, post sergeant major, welcomed the group to Redstone. On display were two empty 4.2-inch mortar shells the Public Affairs Office borrowed from the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School's Explosive Ordnance Division to show the vets.

Claus Martel, MICOM Historical Division, told the veterans that some 42,207 4.2-inch mortar shells were filled at Huntsville Arsenal between the years 1942-44, and many were returned here after the war for renovation or demilitarization. Between January 1948 and April 1949 a group of soldiers were brought to Redstone to remove as many hazardous munitions as possible, but 43 years later 4.2-inch mortars continue to be unearthed, Martel said.

For example, several years ago during the construction of the Software Engineering Building 6260, 4.2's were unearthed, Martel said. In 1989 during construction of Interstate 565 more shells were found, and 20 were unearthed that same year near the Historic Redstone Test Stand.

"More recently, there have been several incidents in which contractors digging near the old railroad bed in the NASA portion of Redstone Arsenal unearthed

4.2-inch mortars. Apparently, empty rounds were used as fill material during railroad bed construction many years ago," Martel said.

John Puskar of Edgewater, Md., was assigned to A Company and was later C Company's first sergeant. He saw action in North Africa, Sicily, Italy, and southern France.

"A group of us went into France from Italy in gliders," Puskar said. Three chemical mortar battalions participated in the assault on the beaches of southern France, one being the 2nd Chemical Battalion's A Company which was part of an airborne task force created especially for the operation.

Dave Gerdell said no lives were lost during the glider operation. Several, however, were wrecked by sawed-off utility poles (Goering asparagus) with which the Germans studded some of the most likely landing sites. One glider hit with such impact that the jeep loaded in its nose catapulted through the front end of the aircraft, seriously injuring the three men sitting in the vehicle (according to *The Chemical Warfare Service: Chemicals in Combat*, U.S. Army in World War II, published by the Office of the Chief of Military History, 1966).

Clayton Seifried, who now lives in Oregon, was a member of B Company and remembered how it was in the heat of battle.

"As young men, it was our first introduction to fear. We thought we weren't afraid of anything, but we all experienced fear every day we were there. Some never showed it, but we were involved in a very dangerous occupation," he said.



West Point cadets get on-the-job training this summer

Some West Point cadets are spending part of their summer at Redstone Arsenal — learning about how the Army does business, enjoying the Southern hospitality, and getting a break from the rigors of life at the U.S. Military Academy.

Cadets Warren Hamilton and Joe Marino arrived June 14, and will be leaving July 2 after a three-week stay. Hamilton has been working in the Patriot Project Office while Marino has been with the Avenger Project Office.

"We're both management majors, and we figure this will give us some hands-on experience," Hamilton said.

"Plus it'll give us a chance to see a different side of the Army," Marino said. "We don't often get to see the procurement side." Most of their training at West Point covers the field Army — things like combat arms and infantry armor. They don't get a lot on how the weapon systems are developed; West Point teaches how to use those systems.

The West Point program that enabled the cadets to visit Redstone is called Academic Individual Advanced Development. Three cadets were here before Hamilton and Marino, and there will be two more, according to Marino. These include four management majors while the others are from other departments. Each spends three weeks at Redstone. "And we have other summer training that we do also after this," Marino added.

Both Hamilton and Marino are spending part of their second straight summer in Alabama. They were at Fort McClellan for five weeks last summer training military trainees.

"This (summer's) program is an academic program. Last year we were down there as part of our leadership training," Hamilton said.

In Patriot Project Office, Hamilton has been working on a project that analyzes Patriot's performance in Operation Desert Storm. His boss has been Lt. Col. Steve Kuffner, assistant program manager for Patriot.

As a member of Avenger Project Office, Marino has been studying the Avenger project's use of Total Quality Management. He has been looking to see if the procurement process is oriented on the TQM principles. Marino has worked mostly with Lavelle Smalley, the acting chief of program management for Avenger.

"Hopefully the offices we work at will get some good out of us," Hamilton said, "and hopefully we'll be able to learn out of all this stuff that we're doing, too."

Marino, 20, is from Tampa, Fla. He graduated from Brandon High School in 1989 and then went to West Point where he will be a senior next year. After graduation in late May 1993, Marino's plans include spending seven to 10 years in the Army — including the five years of mandatory service for West Point

grads. "Basically when I get my family, I want to open up a business, use my management major," he said. Marino plans to enter the air defense branch after West Point. His parents, Joe and Char Marino, moved

to Baltimore about a year and a half ago; he has a 13-year-old sister, Jennifer.

Hamilton, 21, is from Dilley, Texas which is south of San Antonio. He was born in San Antonio and went to school in nearby Dilley; he graduated from Dilley High School in 1989 and then went to West Point where he will be a senior next year. "Right now I'd like to stay in the Army as long as possible," Hamilton said, describing his plans after graduation from West Point in 1993. "And I'm going to try to branch Aviation." His parents, Jim and Rhett Tatsch, reside in Dilley; he has a brother, Taylor, 11, and a sister, Tamara, who will be 16 on July 8.

Both cadets say they have enjoyed their time at Redstone. "It's a nice post. It's not too big," Marino said. "People are friendly — I guess that's true for most of the South, but they're pretty nice around here."

"The BOQs we're living at are great," Hamilton said. "We're just living like kings down here. Have to go back (to West Point) and make up your own beds and stuff."

Total Tots Program pays for emergency child care

From time to time, military families find themselves in a crisis where they suddenly need child care, but they cannot afford to pay for it.

In the past, neighbors, family or someone from the unit would lend a helping hand. Today, it is not so easy to find that kind of help, but the Total Tots Program (TTP) can assist the military family.

"Our function is to serve the community as a safety net for those children and families whose lives have been unexpectedly disrupted by medical emergency, conflicts with duty and other circumstances that sometimes occur in a military lifestyle," said Virginia Dempsey, who served as TTP coordinator until succeeded by Norma Dalton. "As a volunteer agency which derives our funding from community goodwill, we can respond immediately and craft a solution to the family's child care problem that is in the best interest of the children and the parents."

Military families are often stationed away from relatives and close friends or get reassigned so when a family needs help, there is no one there to ask. More

and more women are working full or part time and cannot provide the community volunteer services that they did in the past.

In an emergency, the parent of the small child is often faced with two problems: where to find quality child care quickly and how to pay for it when there is no money.

When faced with this situation, call the TTP coordinator at 876-5397 between 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. She is located at Army Community Service, building 3491. Commanders, leaders and agency representatives are encouraged to refer

cases at the earliest possible moment. Total Tots Program services are available after duty hours through the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School staff duty officer, and through the Family Crisis Hotline at 876-8000.

The program was developed in 1986 at Redstone to meet the emergency child care needs caused by these realities of modern military life. The idea behind TTP is to provide immediate and direct assistance to families in crisis.

Many times, soldiers and their dependents may not be eligible for assistance from other support agencies. These are the TTP committee's target population, Dempsey said.

Some examples of situations that required TTP assistance include an Advanced Individual Training student whose spouse is hospitalized and the children need day care while the soldier attends class. A single soldier is hospitalized and 24-hour child care is provided for the children until a family member arrives to help. A couple wishes to attend counseling or a parenting class, but cannot afford the child care. Total Tots Program helps so the family can improve their situation.

The TTP is able to provide services due to the generosity of its sponsors, the Redstone Arsenal Catholic and Protestant congregations, the NCO Wives Club, the Officers Wives Club, the Thrift Shop and individual donations. The program is funded entirely by donations from the community. All monies are used to provide child care. There are no administrative costs.

F&A workers fixing up their newly renovated building


Members of the Finance and Accounting Division are doing self-help projects to further improve their newly renovated building.



New Mexico honors MICOM logistic assistance rep

A Missile Command logistic assistance representative has received the New Mexico Medal of Merit from the governor of New Mexico.

Gonzalez is among 21 short-range air defense specialist LARs. The logistic assistance division has 160 LARs worldwide.



Battalion's drownproofing class helps build confidence

With summer upon us, more soldiers are taking advantage of the water activities that are available to them in the Huntsville area.

With so many soldiers going out to the different lakes and pools, the 832nd Ordnance Battalion is providing a drownproofing familiarization class for the soldiers here at the Arsenal.

The training consists of a poolside block of instruction about the various floating techniques, the air-exchange method of breathing and the travel stroke. These methods help a person move through the water while expending the least amount of energy.

The class is then divided into swimmers and non-swimmers. The non-swimmers are introduced to the water and given more instruction on the various techniques from the first block of instruction. The swimmers are once again broken into groups: floaters and non-floaters.

Swimmers/non-floaters are given more instruction and then are allowed to attempt to swim two laps of the pool using the travel stroke.

Swimmers/floaters are given time to practice the methods and then allowed to attempt to use the techniques in a 30-minute unassisted float. They then attempt to swim two laps of the pool, while in uniform using only the travel stroke.

After the in-pool instruction, the soldiers are given the second block of instruction. This block consists of various methods of using the uniform or other available clothing as flotation devices.

All the groups are given the opportunity to practice the techniques in their respective groups.

The class lasts approximately two hours. The basic techniques taught in the class provide the soldiers with the confidence and skills necessary to survive in the water.

The air-exchange method enables the individual to resupply the lungs with air in a slow, controlled process. About 70 percent of the air is exhaled under the surface, through the nose. As the head is raised out of the water, the remaining 30 percent is exhaled. The mouth is opened, and the lungs are refilled with fresh air before the procedure is repeated.

The hanging and vertical floats taught are used by natural floaters, in addition to the air exchange method, to stay afloat for long periods of time and survive in the water.

The travel stroke is the last technique taught. This is primarily for non-floaters. It is similar to the breast-stroke; however, on the second stroke the hands come

to the sides and the legs are straightened. The face is down.

This instruction shows the soldiers how to glide through the water between each stroke.

Each procedure is fully explained and caution is given to perform each technique in a slow and controlled manner.

The 832nd Ordnance Battalion drownproofing team was initially formed in April. The team consists of volunteers from throughout the 832nd. The team was broken into four groups, one for each technique. A separate group teaches the flotation techniques using the uniform.

Each group worked diligently to perfect its area of instruction. Although the groups' primary responsibility was their own block of instruction, each trained to assist the other groups. This ensured the team of being able to provide continual training and minimize down-time.

Everyone was required to demonstrate all the techniques in the water.

Prior to the first class on May 30, the team rehearsed 12 times, both on and off-duty.

The primary reason that each member volunteered was to provide information that may save a life. Most of the team members have children and have taught these same techniques to the entire family. A professional and caring attitude has been put into each teaching effort. To date, approximately 1,600 soldiers have received the instruction.

Throughout the training, the emphasis has been made to ensure that individuals do not panic should they find themselves in trouble in the water. The class is a confidence builder, not a lifeguard or water safety class.

Think safety when going in or near the water. Do not drink alcoholic beverages while swimming, boating or fishing. Take the measures that may one day save a life, possibly even yours.

New storage yard opens today for recreational vehicles

A new consolidated open storage yard has been constructed offering Redstone Arsenal civilians, active duty military, and retirees more than a 50 percent discount on secured storage, when compared to other facilities in the area.

"For less than 70 cents per day, you can store your valuable recreational vehicle or boat in a secured, lighted area," said William Moreland, director of Outdoor Recreation. "The new storage yard is completely fenced with perimeter security lighting and is located on Mauler Road across from Barclay Hall."

The new storage yard now managed by Outdoor Recreation, opens today. The area will accommodate approximately 200 recreational type vehicles and equipment, i.e., boats, trailers and campers. Fees for the upkeep and maintenance may be paid on either a semiannual (March) or annual (October) basis. The yearly rates represent a \$24 savings over the monthly and semiannual rates.

Fees are as follows:

• For E-5 and below — Rates for vehicles up to 20 feet are \$13 for one month, \$72 for six months and \$132 for 12 months. Rates for vehicles over 20 feet are \$14 for one month, \$78 for six months and \$144 for 12 months.

• For E-6 through E-9 — Rates for vehicles up to 20 feet are \$15 for one month, \$84 for six months and \$156 for 12 months. Rates for vehicles over 20 feet are \$18 for one month, \$102 for six months and \$192 for 12 months.

• For Company Grade Officer — Rates for vehicles up to 20 feet are \$14 for one month, \$78 for six months and \$144 for 12 months. Rates for vehicles over 20 feet are \$17 for one month, \$96 for six months and \$180 for 12 months.

• For Field Grade and General Officer — Rates for vehicles up to 20 feet are \$16 for one month, \$90 for six months and \$168 for 12 months. Rates for vehicles

over 20 feet are \$19 for one month, \$108 for six months and \$204 for 12 months.

• For Retiree — Rates for vehicles up to 20 feet are \$15 for one month, \$84 for six months and \$156 for 12 months. Rates for vehicles over 20 feet are \$18 for one month, \$102 for six months and \$192 for 12 months.

• For Civilian — Rates for vehicles up to 20 feet are \$18 for one month, \$102 for six months and \$192 for 12 months. Rates for vehicles over 20 feet are \$21 for

one month, \$120 for six months and \$228 for 12 months.

The current storage areas located on Vincent Drive and Entac Circle are being closed Aug. 1 due to upcoming construction on the sites.

Individuals interested in using the new storage yard must register their vehicle at Outdoor Recreation, building 5132, located on Patton Road. Hours of operation are 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday through Saturday; phone 876-4868.




