## Readiness Group soldiers supporting hurricane relief

Some soldiers of Readiness Group Redstone are among the many servicemembers helping the civilian communities in south Florida recover from Hurricane Andrew.

Twenty-nine officers and NCOs from the readiness group are in Miami to assist the Joint Task Force staff in relief operations.

"Our first group deployed on 29 Aug. and the last individual went down on 3 Sept. And the majority of these personnel are logisticians to assist in the gigantic supply effort required to try to provide the relief, the necessities, facing the victims down there now," said Charles Betts, assistant for operations and training at Readiness Group Redstone.

The readiness group people are operating mainly out of the Miami International Airport, the Eastern Airlines terminal, in what is called a disaster field office. Around 18,000 servicemembers from all branches of service are represented in the relief effort.

Primary efforts include moving in construction materials; life support centers, including feeding operations; upgrading shower facilities; and providing diversions such as televisions and VCRs to help the displaced residents get their minds off the tent over their heads. Also, efforts were under way to reopen the schools. Reopening the schools involved debris removal, minor construction, and contracting to rebuild those that were demolished.

"Two other major efforts that have been established include distribution centers for all the foods and supplies that have been donated," Betts said. "And transportation, shuttle bus services, have been established to transport people to the distribution centers, the life support centers and the food areas."

The readiness group soldiers are working long hours — 12-hour shifts — but report that their living conditions are adequate and that they find the work fulfilling. "Most that I have talked to are thoroughly enjoying what they're doing," Betts said. "And for the most part they're doing what they were trained for in

the military; they're functioning as a part of the military joint staff."

The readiness group soldiers are working at the headquarters level for Joint Task Force Andrew. The joint task force headquarters coordinates the relief activities of the 18,000 servicemembers. Lt. Gen. Samuel Ebbesen — commander of the 2nd Army out of Atlanta which is over seven readiness groups, including Redstone — is commanding the task force. Most of the soldiers in this joint task force are from the 18th Airborne Corps, out of Fort Bragg, N.C., and the 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y.

Because of the magnitude of this operation, the 2nd Army has designated all seven of its readiness groups to provide adequate staffing for the joint task force. These include Readiness Group Jackson, S.C.; RG Bragg, N.C.; RG Patrick, Fla.; RG Atlanta, Ga.; RG Knox, Ky.; RG Puerto Rico; and RG Redstone. "We cover Alabama, Tennessee and Mississippi. That's why we're the largest Readiness Group; we have a three-state area," Betts said.

Redstone readiness group's involvement in this relief operation is projected between 30 and 60 days.

"Our primary mission is to assist the Reserve Component units in a three-state area to achieve as high a training readiness posture as possible in preparation for a possible mobilization," Betts said. Disaster relief is a supplemental mission to the readiness group. The Redstone group's last involvement in a declared disaster occurred about 1989 when the small town of Elba in south Alabama was flooded due to a broken levee.

Col. Charles Webb is commander of Readiness Group Redstone. The deputy commander, Lt. Col. Wister Smith, is in Florida serving on the crisis action team for logistics. Referring to the hurricane site, Betts recalls a conversation with Smith. "To hear Colonel Smith describe it, it's really something, hard to put in words," he said.

"The relief effort is going real well," Betts said.



"And our situation reports indicate that the military task force is beginning to transfer the missions they assumed back over to the civilian government which is our goal."

## Military retirees have their annual day Saturday

Active duty and retired military and their families are invited to Redstone's annual Retiree Activity Day set for Saturday at the Challenger Club.

The day's events from 8 until about 2 are planned to advise and inform military retirees of their rights, privileges, and benefits and also extend the hospitality of Redstone Arsenal. Admission is free. Attendees can pay \$3.50 for lunch.

There will be a military retiree update by a speaker from The Retired Officers Association in Washington, a Redstone Arsenal services panel, awards presentations, and county-fair-type informational tables.

"It's held to update and keep the retirees within the community informed on changes as far as health care benefits, medical benefits, survivor assistance benefits — the whole myriad of things that retirees are interested in. And it keeps them abreast of the changes here," said Phil Fredrich, retirement services officer for Redstone Arsenal.

Scheduled guest speaker is Edward Gryczynski, a retired lieutenant colonel who serves as director of personal affairs for The Retired Officers Association in Alexandria, Va.

Members of the Redstone Arsenal services panel are to include representatives from Fox Army Community Hospital, the Dental Activity, Military Personnel Office, Post Exchange, Commissary, Legal Assistance Office, Office of the Chaplain; Morale, Welfare and Recreation; and Redstone Arsenal Support Activity.

After a lunch break, the county-fair exhibits and

services are planned. This will consist of about 60 informational tables with representatives from groups and agencies throughout the community. "They provide literature. In some cases there's medical screening, blood pressure, cholesterol checks — things like that," Fredrich said.

Attendance at this annual event usually ranges from 600 to 700. Lunch for \$3.50 is to include baked chicken, mashed potatoes, green beans, salad, iced tea and rolls. Breakfast will also be available on a pay-as-you-go basis.

"It's a day that's established for the retirees and active duty people; all the active duty will be retirees eventually. It gives them an update. It provides them with current information that affects their life, welfare, well-being, income. It's beneficial for them, and it's provided for them," Fredrich said.

This is also an opportunity for retirees to meet others and to exchange information, according to Reggie Wilson, assistant retirement services officer.


"I just encourage everybody to come and attend," Fredrich said. "It's a day that's put on for them."

Retiree Activity Day, conducted in conjunction with the Redstone Arsenal Military Advisory Council, has been held each year since 1978. There are more than 10,000 military retirees within the area of northern Alabama and southern Tennessee.

## Family child care

**Editor:**

I feel with all the bad publicity that the Family Child Care (FCC) Program has been receiving, it is time someone spoke to the important issues. All the arguing and finger pointing is having a negative impact on the FCC program and in my opinion is threatening a very desperately needed and highly fulfilling alternative to the basic concern of child care. I am an active duty mother of three and must rely on someone for my children's daily development and care. Like any service you use in life, some providers are better than others. You must shop around and find what is best for your needs. In this case, you must go to the different homes and find the care giver that provides the things your child needs. Not all homes are the same. Not all child development center providers are the same.

I have used both the child development center and FCC homes over the past 13 years with my children ranging in ages from 13 to 2. I have found that the in-home personal attention the child gets in an FCC home better relates to the type of care I would give my child if I could remain at home. The child is in a home, yet receives scheduled daily activities and learning sessions for growth and development to better prepare them for school. They receive more one-on-one attention and develop a close relationship of trust and understanding. These care providers are more than just babysitters. They are trained in first aid and CPR and basics in child development. Whether for hourly care or full-time care, the FCC is a viable and perhaps even refreshing alternative to a day care center.

Yet, some of these FCC providers are considering not participating in the program anymore. Several of the providers have openings that are not being filled. I can only guess that this is because people were frightened away by all the negative articles (letters to the editor) written and constant tension present with the heads of the Redstone Arsenal programs being scrutinized. Let's not forget the basic reason the program exists is to provide better care for our children. It matters not who is in charge of the bureaucracy as long as the people working below believe in what they are doing.

I am completely satisfied with the care my child receives and could not have asked for a more loving and caring environment for her. She also receives the types of lessons in motor skills and listening and basic

knowledge that is so critical at this point in her development. I would ask anyone looking for an alternative to care for their child to visit these homes and decide for themselves. They will be pleasantly amazed at the care offered.

## New deputy post commander hopes to maintain Redstone's excellence

The new deputy post commander is happy to be back at Redstone where he served a previous tour 1986-88.

Col. Ross Sanders became the deputy post commander and the commander of Redstone Arsenal Support Activity on Sept. 15. He succeeded Col. Joseph Mabry who is retiring from the Army and residing in the Florence area.

"We enjoyed our tour here from '86 to '88 and it's just great to come back because it's such a positive attitude here. It's a professional attitude here. Folks are very friendly. It's just a great area," Sanders said.

From 1986-88 Sanders served as deputy director at what was then known as the Missile Logistics Center, now the Integrated Materiel Management Center. In 1988 he assumed command of Lexington Blue Grass Army Depot, Ky., which he led for two years. He was deputy commander of the 19th Support Command, Taegu, Korea, from August 1990 to July 1992.

Sanders hopes to "further the outstanding reputation that the Redstone Arsenal community has earned through their efforts in Army Communities of Excellence. I hope to add to that.

"The bottom line is if I can leave here having said the Redstone community is a better place than when I came from the standpoint of quality of services, quality of facilities, that we have strengthened the aspects in terms of longterm growth — that's my goal," Sanders said.

# Planning under way for reshaped Army of the future

The winds of change are blowing in the Army. The Cold War is over, and there's no longer the Soviet threat, a major determinant of what our Army has been for the last 45 or so years.

Troops are being pulled back to the United States, no longer required to stand at the German border to deter an advance from the East.

The bulk of the Army of the future will be based in the U.S. And yet, expectations are not that the "next battle" will be fought in the continental U.S.

Army decision-makers acknowledge that what's needed is a strategic Army capable of deploying anywhere in the world to face any special set of circumstances a conflict may call for.

And then there's the reality of drastically declining defense resources.

All these circumstances will change the face of the Total Army, and planning is already under way at high levels to transition from a Cold War Army to a new world order.

One mechanism whereby the Army is looking to redefine itself is with the 1994 Louisiana Maneuvers, which is being promoted by Army Chief of Staff Gen. Gordon Sullivan.

Last year, Sullivan became interested in knowing more about the large scale maneuvers of 1941 that pitted entire field armies against each other in mock battle on 30,000 square miles in northwest Louisiana.

Sullivan's interest in the 1941 exercise is to look at how those were done because he sees a parallel between the transition the Army had to make at that time and the changes that face the Army today.

There are certain historical parallels between 1941 and 1994. For instance, a change of focus, in 1941 from isolationism to world power; in 1994 from Cold War to regional forces.

Also, in 1941, the Army was concerned with building up; in 1994 with building down. 1941 training needs were for the impending war in Europe; 1994 training needs involve the dramatic transitions from overseas to CONUS, personnel turbulence and new roles.

Other parallels exist in the areas of organization, equipment and manning.

"The original maneuvers are being used as a rallying point," said Col. Arthur Meier, MICOM's primary point of contact for Louisiana Maneuvers. He added that, unlike the 1941 maneuvers which pitted entire field armies against each other, the modern-day processes will be via computer simulation. Meier is deputy

director of the Research, Development and Engineering Center.

Phase I is under way with the formation of Sullivan's board of directors. Gen. Jimmy Ross, commander of Army Materiel Command, is a member, along with the other major commands (Training and Doctrine Command, Forces Command, etc.).

Meier is a member of the colonel-level working group (representing major subordinate commands) which provides MSC input to the board.

AMC has identified four areas, or pillars as they're being called, it envisions supporting, Meier said. Those include sustainment, development systems/new technology, industrial preparedness and logistics support group.

Here at MICOM, sustainment and logistics support group are the responsibilities of the Integrated Materiel Management Center; development systems/new technology and industrial preparedness fall to RDEC.

Within the IMMC, Faye Jernigan, chief of Missile Systems Readiness Directorate's policy, plans and programs division, has been designated overall coordinator for Louisiana Maneuvers. William Ingram, also of MSRDC heads the sustainment pillar; Tommie Cutts, Maintenance Engineering Directorate heads up logistics support group.

On the RDEC side, Dr. Bruce Fowler is the contact for Developmental Systems/New Technology and Ken Dulaney is in charge of industrial preparedness.

Both Meier and Jernigan believe that MICOM will be a heavy player in Louisiana Maneuvers.

"When we establish MACCOM and have the Logistical Support Activity here, we'll have a tremendous data base capability for all weapon systems in the Army, plus access to the data base for all equipment in the entire Army," Meier said.

"Louisiana Maneuvers will enable us to assess today's Army's abilities to perform its roles and missions in the context of our new strategy, both warfighting and Title 10 responsibilities," Jernigan said.

Meier envisions that Louisiana Maneuvers will afford RDEC and the IMMC an opportunity to work closer together than they've been able to previously.

Gen. Ross views Louisiana Maneuvers as an opportunity for AMC to be less reactive (supply) and more proactive, Meier said.

"These are exciting times. We are going to be thinking less in terms of armor, infantry and artillery, but in terms of combined operations. I see it as a mechanism to experiment with new units, equipment, doctrine," Meier said.

MICOM's commander, Maj. Gen. Joe Rigby, prior to his assignment here, was a task force commander for Louisiana Maneuvers at AMC.

"Louisiana Maneuvers is the most important thing the Army is doing now to shape itself for the last part of the century," Rigby said.

Through simulation and in-depth seminars, the Army can look at alternatives for reshaping itself in the areas of industrial base, new doctrine, tactics, etc., Rigby said.

The coming of the new Missile, Armaments and Chemical Command and establishment of the Logistics Support Activity here, "gives us the opportunity to play in all four pillars," he added.

# Commander of space/strategic defense sees future need

Complete with the Redstone Arsenal Post Color Guard and music by the 14th Army Band from Fort McClellan, Lt. Gen. Donald M. Lionetti, commanding general, was officially welcomed to the U.S. Army Space and Strategic Defense Command (USASSDC).

Lionetti, who assumed command of USASSDC Aug. 24, met with members of his Huntsville work force for the first time Sept. 8 at the Rocket Auditorium.

"The day after Labor Day is a great time to assemble the command and have you come in to meet the new leadership team — in particular the new commanding general," said Brig. Gen. Jan Van Prooyen, USASSDC's deputy commanding general for just five weeks, as he introduced Lionetti.

The new commanding general gave employees his assessment of the command's current status and his vision of where USASSDC is headed in the future.

"Throughout my career, I have been a representative of the user — the operator," Lionetti said. "I have not been a materiel developer per se. But over the last 12 years or so I have worked very, very closely with the materiel development and acquisition community ... and I have come to know and love the materiel developers."

Lionetti came to USASSDC from the U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC) at Fort Monroe, Va., where he had served as deputy commanding general/chief of staff since November 1991.

"If I bring anything to SSDC... it's some basic knowledge of what happens in the acquisition and materiel development world but as well, a greater knowledge of what we will eventually do with whatever we develop," he added.

The USASSDC serves concurrently as the Army component of the U.S. Space Command through its Colorado Springs, Colo. offices, manages the Army's strategic defense research and development activities for the Strategic Defense Initiative Organization, and operates the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll as a national range. In July 1992, several programs formerly managed by USASDC and the Program Executive Office (PEO) for Air Defense combined to form the new Army PEO for Global Protection Against Limited Strikes (GPALS).

Lionetti related the formation of USASSDC to changes in the world order brought about by the collapse of the Soviet Union and to America's victory in the Gulf War.

According to Lionetti, because of these events, there is tremendous popular, and therefore congressional, pressure to spend significantly less on defense. As a result, he said, there is tremendous energy being generated in all of the services today to reorganize, to realign, and to restructure to compete more effectively for the shrinking defense resources.

Although the military services are challenged to articulate the need for various warfighting capabilities in this uncertain future, Lionetti said the Gulf War gave the Army and USASSDC a glimpse of the ballistic missile future.

"The tactical ballistic missile genie is out of the bottle and can never be put back," according to Lionetti, a former commanding general of the U.S. Army Air Defense Artillery Center and School at Fort Bliss, Texas. "There won't ever again be an armed conflict without tactical missiles."

Lionetti says he views the current environment not only in a context of service competition for resources and a national commitment to downsize, but at the

same time in the context of a national resolve to build both defenses against tactical missiles and as a limited protection system for the United States.

"Although SDC as we know it is no more, because we are in the process of divesting the various program offices that comprise Global Protection Against Limited Strikes, the remaining USASSDC, with all the technology directorates and all the matrix support for GPALS PEO, will find an important role to play in any future of strategic defense," Lionetti said.

Lionetti reassured employees that he and Maj. Gen. William Chen, GPALS Program Executive Officer, will work very closely to execute the roles and missions of the two organizations.

"The PEO GPALS is the materiel developer that will create capabilities that the USASSDC will deploy and operate in the future," either in a tactical missile defense world or in a strategic defense world, Lionetti said.

"The relationship that exists between those who formerly were SDC and now are in PEO GPALS must continue to be a close one," emphasized Lionetti. "Gen. Chen and I have talked and agreed that this

kind of professional and close relationship will exist. We will be careful not to destroy the institutions and the infrastructure that has been developed over such a long and historic period here in Huntsville — that created SDC, that made enormous and priceless contributions to the defense of the United States. As well, the relationship between SSDC and MICOM is an important one that must continue to be close — and it will be."

Just as the Gulf War showed us the future regarding tactical missiles, it also showed us that future conflict is even more dependent upon products from space, according to Lionetti.

Communications, imagery, position location, missile warning are some of the capabilities that the U.S. Army in supporting a warfighting Commander In Chief (CINC) with an Army component must have in the future. He also said that whenever the Army component of National Missile Defense (NMD) is deployed, it would be operated by soldiers and civilians of the Army Space Command component of USASSDC.

"So although there are obviously no guarantees in these uncertain times, it does appear that we, the USASSDC, are in a growth industry," Lionetti said. "Yes, no guarantees, but I can guarantee you this — that within USASSDC, you deserve and you shall have caring and concerned leadership for our military and for our civilian work force."

Lionetti assured employees that in the immediate sense, there is no indication and no requirement for drastic changes. When there is a need for changes, he promised to seek and to consider input from the Huntsville USASSDC work force.


He charged USASSDC's military and civilian leaders to create the kind of climate in which innovation can flourish, excellence is noticed and rewarded, where every employee feels — and is — important, and where opportunity for advancement is truly equal, regardless of race or gender.

"Human resources are our most precious asset," the general concluded. "It always has been in the Army and it always will be in the Army. And although my Army doesn't all wear green suits, just a few green suits — my Army wears mostly civilian clothes — you're still my Army and you're still important to me!"



# Director of Smart Weapons Office makes smart move

The new director of the AMC Smart Weapons Management Office says moving to Huntsville was a smart move for himself and his family.

Lt. Col. Richard Hayes assumed the director's duties Aug. 1 after serving as an executive officer at headquarters Army Materiel Command in Alexandria, Va. He succeeded Col. Robert Friedrich who retired July 31.

"I was very excited about it. I'd seen the products of the office for quite some time in my previous job, and I knew of the office. So when the opportunity came up for this job, I jumped at it," Hayes said. "Also, my wife and I wanted to come to Huntsville so it worked out very well for us."

Smart weapons are weapons that can be programmed to find and attack a target. A launched round can go out to an area, search for its programmed target by using sensors, and then either impact on the target or fire a projectile from within itself. A smart mine can be emplaced in an area and attack when a certain type vehicle, its programmed target, arrives. Another type of smart weapon is a guided munition whose operation involves a soldier.

"Smart weapons are the future," Hayes said. "As we move forward in many respects with a smaller Army, a more deployable Army, smart weapons are going to be what we're going to use. It's a combat-multiplier that we'll use to make a minimum number of people have maximal effectiveness."

His organization was originally chartered in May 1986 as the Smart Munitions Program Office. The name was changed Jan. 6, 1989 to the Smart Weapons Management Office. The office includes three military members, six technical people and five administrative workers. One of the military members works at Eglin Air Force Base, Fla.; and one of the civilians works at the Pentagon. The office assesses smart weapons programs; identifies and solves smart weapons' research, development and acquisition problems; and produces educational products to educate other organizations on smart weapons related issues.

The office is responsible for the Army portion of "Project Chicken Little," an ongoing smart weapons test and evaluation program being conducted jointly with the Air Force.

Hayes reports to Maj. Gen. Joe Rigby, the post commander, in Rigby's role as the Army Materiel Command executive agent for smart weapons.

"Right now I would like to bring to completion the projects that are already ongoing: battlefield damage assessment; independent technical assessments that we're working on; we're publishing a U.S. smart weapons reference book, and a rest of the world smart weapons reference book," Hayes said. "Looking off into the future, I'd like to move more in the area of standardized signatures — that's vehicle signatures; technology transfers; and developing more standard methodologies for use by the smart weapons community."

Hayes, 43, is originally from Winder, Ga. He spent half his early years in Detroit, Mich., where his mother, Curtis, still resides. The first person in his family that ever made the military a career, he has two brothers and a sister. Hayes is a 1971 ROTC graduate of the University of Georgia with a bachelor's degree in accounting. He received a master's degree in management in 1985 from Webster University in Kansas City.

He began his Army career as an artillery officer. Hayes went to flight school, and he flew OH-58 Scout helicopters in Germany. He became a flight instructor at Fort Rucker, Ala., and then went to Fort Greely, Alaska, as an aviation and armor test officer. Hayes' next assignment was with the Operational Test and Evaluation Agency in Falls Church, Va., as a communication and electronics test officer.

In 1984 Hayes went to the Command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, Kan. He returned to Fort Greely as commander of the 172nd Infantry Brigade, Aviation Detachment for two years, and then transferred to the Cold Regions Test Center there as chief of the weapons systems test division. Hayes, a member of the Army Acquisition Corps, became an executive officer at AMC headquarters in December 1989.

He and his wife, Beverly, a native of Birmingham, have a son and a daughter. Richard Jr., 18, attends Calhoun Community College; and Kara, 16, is a junior at Grissom High School. Hayes' hobbies include hunting and fishing.

"I like this area," Hayes said. "My wife went to high school here — she went to Lee High; she lived here for two years as a kid. She assures me that I'll fall madly in love with Huntsville."

# Federal coordinating committee conducts annual CFC

The Combined Federal Campaign is run by federal employees for federal employees. All decisions regarding the conduct of the CFC are made by the Local Federal Coordinating Committee (LFCC), which is made up of one voting member from each of 33 government agencies in the Tennessee Valley area.

There is no connection between the campaign and any agency listed in the CFC brochure.

The LFCC member from the largest government agency in the campaign area — in this case the Missile Command — is the chairperson of the committee.



"There'll be four sessions, and there'll be plenty of time for reflection and fellowship and also the meals," Logan said.




"I think it's a perfect opportunity for couples to get away to hear about issues or to talk together about those issues and to enjoy some good time and good food in a wholesome atmosphere."





# Future UAH business student gets defense scholarship

One of the first 10 Defense Acquisition Scholarship recipients will attend the University of Alabama in Huntsville beginning this fall.

Latonda Raft of Athens received her undergraduate degree in computer information systems from Tarleton State University at Stephenville, Texas with highest honors. She will use the Defense Acquisition Scholarship, which covers tuition, fees, books, laboratory expenses, and a stipend, to earn her master's of science in management degree from the UAH College of Administrative Science. In accordance with the scholarship requirements, Raft will work in an acquisition position, upon completing her degree.

The Defense Acquisition Scholarship program was established under provisions of the Defense Acquisition Workforce Improvement Act and directs the secretary of defense to establish a scholarship program for the purpose of "qualifying personnel of acquisition positions in the Department of Defense."

These positions fall into 12 professional and administrative career fields and encompass a broad range of academic disciplines. For this pilot year of the program, the department focused the competition on students who had undergraduate degrees in scientific, technical, or business disciplines and who had been accepted into accredited degree programs. The students are required to have an undergraduate grade point average of 3.5 out of 4.0 to qualify.

Raft graduated with a 3.8 grade point average. She is a member of the Alpha Chi, National Honor Society

and Epsilon Delta Pi, Honor Society in Computer Sciences. She has been employed as a data processing supervisor and accountant with Stone and Webster Engineering Corporation and as a data base administrator with Sargent Electric Inc. at Beaver Valley Nuclear Station.

The other recipients of the scholarship will earn their master's in business administration from colleges around the country, including Georgetown University,

the University of Georgia, Florida State University, the Darden School of Business at the University of Virginia, the University of Texas, Austin, the Crummer Graduate School of Business at Rollins College, Winter Park, Fla. and the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana.

"I'm pleased Ms. Raft selected UAH to earn her master's of science in management degree," said Dr. David Billings, dean of the UAH College of Administrative Science. "She will join civilian and military personnel currently employed in the acquisition field who are completing our program in management. I am confident that she will be well prepared to meet the challenges of her future career upon graduation from our program."







# Program offers incentives for blue-ribbon contractors

In an effort to find a better way of doing business, the Acquisition Center has instituted the Missile Command Spares Blue Ribbon Contracting Program.

This program "relays the message to the contractor that we're serious about the quality of items we purchase for our troops and we're willing to pay for it," said Lt. Col. Stovall Witte, deputy chief of procurement division "D" at the Acquisition Center.

Blue Ribbon contracting falls in line with Best Value contracting, which recognizes that under certain circumstances the lowest bid may not always be the best deal for the government, Witte said.

Blue Ribbon contracting was launched early this year when missile spare and repair parts contractors were sent letters outlining how the program works: The government will pay up to a 10 percent price premium to lower performance risk contractors over a low non-Blue Ribbon offerer.

Spare/repair-parts contractors who bid on contracts for the following technology areas were solicited to become Blue Ribbon contractors: electro-optical; cable assemblies, electronic components; electronic assemblies; mechanical assemblies; and electro-mechanical assemblies.

Contractors must have delivered items on at least three MICOM spare/repair parts contracts within a specific technology area worth an aggregate total of \$30,000 or more during the last 36 months to be eligible to become a Blue Ribbon contractor.

They must have demonstrated on-time performance of 90 percent or higher for the past 24 months in the technology area; they must have a quality deficiency report rate (number of deficient units divided by total number of units built) no greater than 1 percent; a first time quality verification sample rejection rate (number

of contracts rejected on first submission due to QV inspection and test divided by total number of contracts submitted for acceptance that required QVs) no greater than 10 percent; and first article test reject rate (total number of first articles rejected on first submission divided by the total number of FA submitted) no greater than 25 percent.

Additionally, contractors with a FA or QV sample rejected in the past 24 months on the second or subsequent submission is ineligible for inclusion on the MICOM list of Blue Ribbon Contractors.

But being a Blue Ribbon certified contractor won't automatically guarantee in every case that the company will be awarded the contract, Witte said.

"Good business judgment will still be used by the contracting officer," he said.

If a contractor has been granted Blue Ribbon status in the production of item "A" and now wants to bid on item "B," he won't necessarily have one-upmanship on his competitors, Witte said.

The Acquisition Center's Business Management Office, headed by Cliff Hudson, is responsible for screening the applications.

Witte credits Lisa Hopkins, Jerry Roberts, Carol Fleming, Randy Walton and Susie Pitman for the work they've done in getting the Spares Blue Ribbon contracting program up and running.

Witte also recognized Lt. Col. Mike Coburn, his predecessor, as being one of the forces in getting the program together.

The Acquisition Center coordinated getting the program going with RDEC's Product Assurance Directorate, the Integrated Materiel Management Center and the Legal Office. Some 26 contractors have thus far submitted applications to be certified Blue Ribbon status, Witte said, out of several hundred sent out by the Acquisition Center.

"Even if we don't certify a large number of Blue Ribbon contractors, the program will be beneficial because it will heighten awareness of MICOM standards in contract awards," Witte said.

So far, the following small businesses have been given the Blue Ribbon status: Optex Systems Inc., Richardson, Texas; Semco Inc., Huntsville; Cla-Bar, Tullahoma, Tenn.; Computer Measurements Corp., Chatsworth, Calif.; and Precision Technical Products Inc., Cedar Rapids, Mich.

Martin-Marietta and Raytheon Company in the large business category have been certified as Blue Ribbon contractors.

The Acquisition Center is establishing a Blue Ribbon Hall of Fame in the building 4488 lobby, Witte said. Contractors who have been certified in the program will have a plaque with their name engraved on it hung there, and the Acquisition Center will also present the company a plaque.

After Aug. 10, all competitive requests for proposals will contain the Blue Ribbon contracting provisions, Witte said, noting that sole source contracting will not contain the Blue Ribbon provisions. The

Spares Blue Ribbon contracting program will apply to contracts worth up to \$1 million.

The program was established in line with the president's Blue Ribbon Commission on Defense Management, which recommended that the Department of Defense adopt the use of commercial style competition.

T.J. LaPointe, a Redstone worker who serves as a hunting volunteer here, will be giving a tree stand safety course at the event. "And the main points we're trying to get across are the use of safety belts because now they're mandatory on Redstone; and that alcohol and tree stands don't mix, things like that," he said.

The three types of tree stands he plans to demonstrate include a ladder stand, climbing stand, and a lock on stand. The safety belt or safety harness serves as "your lifeline for staying in that tree," LaPointe said. Safety belts for tree stand users became mandatory on post this year. Tree stands are used mainly to hunt large game such as white-tailed deer.

LaPointe, a model maker in the Prototype Engineering Division at Research Development and Engineering Center, has been hunting on post since 1980. He does both gun and bow hunting, mainly bow hunting. Accidents involving falls from a tree stand can cause serious injuries, he said, stressing the importance of a safety harness.

"If we can save one person from ending up in a wheelchair, we've done our job," LaPointe said.

Bus transportation to the National Hunting and Fishing Day event will be available from the troop area and the Youth Services building. Glass expects from 700 to 1,000 people to attend. # Commissary surcharge goes right back into stores

Regular shoppers at military commissaries save, on the average, slightly more than 25 percent of what they would spend at civilian grocery stores. This is possible because the Defense Commissary Agency follows a longstanding policy — set in 1867 — of selling goods "at cost": that is, at no profit to the commissary or to any government agency.

Most commissary shoppers know that a 5-percent surcharge is added to their grocery bill at checkout. But many do not know when or why the surcharge was established, nor what projects the resultant funds finance.

Quite simply, the money generated by the surcharge goes right back into the stores. It is used to build, renovate, upgrade and aid in the operation and maintenance of commissaries. The largest share of the surcharge funds is used for building new commissaries and modifying existing structures.

In fact, not a single tax dollar goes into commissary construction or renovation; commissary patrons pay for these projects themselves through the surcharge.

Surcharge funds also buy supplies, such as paper bags, meat wrappers and other packaging materials, as well as equipment like electronic scanners and scales. Overall, the surcharge is used to make the shopping experience quick, convenient and pleasant for the shopper. These measures encourage them to continue using their commissary privilege, which in turn helps to generate more surcharge funds.

The first large-scale experimentation with a surcharge came in 1879, when Congress established a 10-percent surcharge on all commissary items — except tobacco — to help pay spoilage and transportation costs. The surcharge quickly proved to be extremely unpopular and it was discontinued in 1884.

The surcharge did not reappear until 1952, which Congress decided that commissaries should become self-sustaining. Commissaries were directed to add a

2-percent surcharge to the price of all goods sold to cover the costs of purchasing and maintaining equipment and supplies. Congress raised the surcharge to 3 percent in 1974, to provide funds for construction and improvements to store facilities. Two years later the surcharge again increased by 1 percent.

The last surcharge increase occurred in April 1983, when the secretary of defense directed that a 5-percent

charge be levied on all goods purchased at commissaries. As of today, the surcharge remains at 5 percent.

The positive effect of the surcharge can best be expressed in simple terms: While it provides funds to maintain the commissary benefit, it simultaneously enables this benefit to be maintained at no additional cost in tax dollars.

From the patrons' point of view, it is a customer cost that provides an important, tangible customer benefit — yet costs the customer half of what it did 1 years ago.

Currently, 52 stores are programmed for construction or renovation by 1993, at a cost of about \$355 million — paid for entirely by surcharge funds. (News release from the Defense Commissary Agency.)

## Historically black schools get Army research grants

WASHINGTON — Two historically black institutions of higher learning were awarded Army research grants, Aug. 18.

Clark-Atlanta University and Morris Brown College, both in Atlanta, each received three-year grants of \$2.25 million to establish Army Centers of Excellence. They are the first historically black schools to receive Army COE grants, and were chosen from

among 20 applicants. There are 15 Army COE programs at 14 of America's leading colleges and universities.

Participating schools perform research to help sustain the nation's technological edge into the 21st century. A key goal of the program is to increase the number of minority scientists and engineers. (Arnew






