Redstone in running for Army Excellence big prize

Redstone Arsenal is off and running in the Army Communities of Excellence competition to become the "best installation in the Army," and with that distinction, capture the \$1.5 million prize money.

Maj. Gen. Joe Rigby, commander of the Missile Command and Redstone Arsenal, was notified Oct. 30 that Redstone is Army Materiel Command's winner in the CONUS medium installation category to compete at Department of the Army level for the top prize, the Commander-in-Chief's award.

"The continued outstanding work of the Redstone work force and community made this award possible and will carry the Arsenal to the recognition it so well deserves as the best medium post in CONUS," Rigby said.

The DA ACOE office will announce finalists selected for on-site visits by mid-December, according to Jean Keahey, Redstone's ACOE coordinator.

Local officials feel confident this post will be among DA finalists and already are preparing to shift into the evaluation mode, Keahey said. A plan of action is being prepared to ensure the post will be ready for the team of 11 evaluators who will visit Redstone for a three-day inspection sometime between Feb. 10 and March 20, 1993.

To prepare for the inspection, a MICOM assistance team will be visiting all buildings on post, hopefully beginning by Dec. 15 and completed by the second week in January, Keahey said.

The MICOM team will make suggestions and give directions on what improvements should be made to get the post ready for the evaluators.

"There's much, much work to be done. If our people will follow the checklist they'll be getting, we'll be ready," Keahey said. The checklist includes interior "tidying up" tips such as removing visual clutter, removing unframed items from the wall, concealing

exposed wires, and replacing damaged floor tiles, to name a few.

Exterior initiatives include debris and trash removal, screening or painting dumpsters, relocating vending machines from entry ways, and self-help beautification projects.

Keahey stresses customer service as the one thing everyone can do. "Please be nice. Be courteous to everyone you meet in hallways," she said, pointing out that during the 1992 DA ACOE team visit, evaluators were "very impressed" by courteousness shown them by Redstone people when the evaluators walked the halls to engage employees in conversation.

Redstone Arsenal won the ACOE Most Improved post award in 1992 which carried a prize of \$125,000.

The ACOE Executive Steering committee here has narrowed to two projects what the money will be used for: either Rustic Lodge renovations, or walking/biking/jogging trails from the Pagano Gymnasium to the Civilian Wellness Center.

The committee received between 200-300 suggestions from the community on how the 1992 prize money should be used. Suggestions ranged from installing covered walkways between the Civilian Personnel Office buildings, to installing showers in building 5250 to applying the amount against the national debt.

"Any way we decide to use the prize money for an ACOE award must benefit all the community — (See ACOE, cont'd on page 2)

Commissary refrigeration system cools symposium issue

The Commissary is expected to have less problems keeping its frozen foods frozen, thanks to its new refrigeration system.

All the old compressors were replaced in response to an issue raised at Redstone's annual family action symposium and continuous service problems with the old system. This is part of the Commissary's renovation and expansion project set for fiscal 1993 or '94.

"What was done on this project was compatible and part of the overall project. We just got it done early to relieve the problems that we were having," said Lee Wainwright, the commissary officer.

The old compressors caused constant maintenance problems. Compressors are grouped together on racks; each rack runs a series of refrigerated cases. If one of the old compressors went down, the system would continue to operate but without the ability to meet any increase in demand. "We were operating without that cushion; so, anytime we had a minor problem it would turn out to be a major problem," Wainwright explained. "Now with the new system, anytime we have a minor problem the customer would not even notice."

A concern about the amount of downtime in the commissary's refrigerated cases was expressed at the Redstone family action symposium. "This was a family action symposium issue last year, and this project was to relieve that issue," Wainwright said.

Completed at the end of October, the refrigeration

project took about six weeks and cost a little over \$200,000. The money came from the Defense Commissary Agency (DeCA). The new refrigeration racks were custom designed and built by Hussmann Corporation, the commissary's refrigeration maintenance contractor.


A \$4.6 million project to renovate and expand the commissary is set for the end of fiscal year '93 or the beginning of FY '94. This remodeling project will include installation of new display freezer cases. Also, the newly-installed compressors "will allow us to convert to more environmentally friendly refrigerants when we remodel next year," Wainwright said.

Under the remodeling project, the store will be enlarged by absorbing about 10,000 square feet of the existing warehouse. The current sales area represents about 27,000 square feet, so the expansion will bring the store to about 37,000. "It's a dramatic increase in size," Wainwright said. Features to be added include an enlarged deli; an in-store bakery — which the commissary does not have at present; a fresh-fish department; a larger produce department; more cash registers; and customer restrooms. There will also be new lighting and new floors. The money for the project will come from DeCA, and represents funds from the surcharge which commissary customers pay each time they buy their groceries.

"It'll just make this a first-class supermarket," Wainwright said, referring to the remodeling project at the 13-year-old facility.

For those of us who do not have a personal secretary, who have job sites located all over Redstone Arsenal, who are responsible for equipment that is required to function all hours including nights, holidays and weekends; for those who take pride in their work, and who desire Redstone to be a showplace for the rest of the country to pattern after, the little \$150 spent on an answering machine is a very good investment.

CFC charity drive closing in on goal

The Combined Federal Campaign is expected to reach its \$1,265,000 goal by final reporting time, according to the coordinator for this year's charity drive.

CFC had reached \$1,170,763 for 92.5 percent of the goal by Nov. 13, the official end of the campaign. The Missile Command reported collections of \$384,730 for 94 percent of its \$409,000 goal for CFC.

"That is the entire campaign through week five. And we are optimistic that we are going to meet both

goals," said George Gunter, the campaign coordinator.

"The campaign is officially over at this point. The week six collections will be taken this week. And then there'll be 10 days or so where we'll have a cleanup," he said. Maj. Gen. Joe Rigby, commander of the Missile Command and Redstone Arsenal, is to make the final CFC report Nov. 23 at the United Way luncheon in the Von Braun Civic Center north hall.

Expect to get stuffed at Thanksgiving meal here

The military dining facilities here invite soldiers, family members, retirees and guests to their most popular meal of the year: the Thanksgiving feast.

Getting together on Thanksgiving for a great meal is an Army tradition, says Charles Minga, contracting officer's representative in the installation food service. About 725 people are expected to eat their traditional meal at the dining facilities.

Both facilities — building 3438 north (No. 3) and building 3438 south (No. 1) — will be busy Thursday, Nov. 26. Breakfast for the soldiers is set for 7-8 that morning. The Thanksgiving Day meal will be served to all personnel — single soldiers, soldiers with family members, guests, and retirees — from 11 until 2:30 in both dining facilities. This will be followed by the dinner meal from 3-5:30 for authorized military personnel.

"This meal is the largest single meal of the year for us," said CWO 3 Felix Battle, the installation food adviser, referring to the large attendance.

The defense comptroller has permanently exempted all active duty officers and family members (ID card holder) from paying the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday meal surcharges. Officers and family members will pay only the food cost. The holiday meal prices are as follows: there is no cost for meal card holders; cost is \$3.10 each for enlisted soldiers drawing basic allowance for subsistence, officers, and active-duty family members age 12 and older; cost is \$1.55 each for family members age 11 and under. Guests of active duty members, retirees and their guests pay \$3.10 plus a \$7.40 surcharge; while guests 11 and under will pay \$1.55 plus a \$3.70 surcharge.

About 300 pounds of turkey, 250 pounds of ham

and 100 pounds of steamship-round beef will be prepared for the Thanksgiving meal. The big menu includes the following: shrimp cocktail, roast turkeys, baked ham, steamship round, savory dressing, cornbread dressing, giblet gravy, mashed potatoes, buttered green peas with mushrooms, cranberry sauce, buttered corn, buttered broccoli, a salad bar, hot rolls, butter patties, assorted pies and cakes, assorted fresh fruits, coffee, assorted candies and nuts, tea, milk and assorted carbonated beverages.

Redstone working to restore clean environment

The Department of Defense is committed to the cleanup of contaminated sites at DoD installations and civil works projects which have resulted from mission activities.

The major focus has been on the Installation Restoration Program and the Formerly Used Defense Sites Program. The installation restoration program identifies contaminated sites, assesses risks to human health and the environment, allocates resources, and cleans up hazardous wastes from previous activities at defense installations. The Defense Environmental Restoration Program was established in 1984 to promote and coordinate efforts in the evaluation and cleanup of contamination at defense installations. To date, the Defense Department has identified 17,660 sites at 1,877 installations or formerly used defense sites.

Installation restoration efforts at Redstone Arsenal started as early as 1977 with the discovery of widespread DDT contamination. DDT contamination was found to be severely impacting the environment both on and off post. This discovery resulted in a postwide survey to identify, locate and describe all known and suspected past disposal sites regardless of their contents. The results of this survey are reported in the "Installation Assessment of Redstone Arsenal, Report No. 118, December 1977." These findings led to the DDT abatement program at Redstone Arsenal and later the Olin remedial action for DDT abatement at Wheeler Wildlife Refuge on Redstone.


When Redstone applied for a Hazardous Waste Resource Conservation and Recovery Act part B permit in 1986, the Environmental Protection Agency required Redstone to conduct a facility assessment and to investigate the contaminated sites which were identified in the 1977 report.

In 1987 at the request of the MICOM environmental officer, the Huntsville Division of the Army Corps of Engineers, acting as the "executing agency," initiated a remedial investigation/feasibility study of some 25 known disposal sites at Redstone. The results of this study indicated the need for further investigation at some 11 disposal sites which had indications of higher than normal contamination of hazardous wastes in the groundwater. This work was conducted by P.E. Lamaroux & Associates of Tuscaloosa.

The Corps of Engineers contracted with Geraghty & Miller of Tampa, Fla., to conduct further investigation and studies at the 11 identified disposal sites in 1989. Geraghty & Miller was also tasked to resurvey the facility assessment conducted by Environmental Protection Agency at Redstone in 1988. Some 274 solid waste management units and 13 areas of concern were found within the installation boundaries as a result of this second survey. Eighty-two of these sites are at Marshall Space Flight Center which is located on Redstone Arsenal. Eight of the sites at Marshall are considered to be contaminated as a result of previous Army activities. Since 1988 an additional five solid waste management units have been identified by the MICOM Environmental Office.

The Geraghty & Miller Phase I investigation was completed in 1991. The final report indicated that eight of the 11 sites which were studied required further investigation to characterize the contaminants in

the groundwater and to define the extent of the contamination. In the fall of 1991, Geraghty & Miller was

tasked to conduct a Phase II investigation at the eight problem sites reported in its previous study. Engineering Sciences of Atlanta was tasked to conduct a preliminary investigation on five additional solid waste management units. Engineering Services was then tasked to conduct a Phase I investigation at the five solid waste management units previously studied. These tasks were completed last September.

With the initiation of new contracts for fiscal 1993, several new programs on the Installation Restoration Program have been initiated at Redstone. They include the following:

- **Corrective Action Management Plan** — This involves the review, prioritizing and programming of the necessary actions at 284 solid waste management units on post. This work will be done by Environmental Science and Engineering from Gainesville, Fla.
- **Corrective Measures Study** for 10 solid waste management units at Redstone; conducted by Environmental Science and Engineering.
- **Phase II Investigation** at five different solid waste management units; conducted by Engineering Sciences.
- **Interim Treatment Design for Remedial Action** at five solid waste management units; conducted by EBASCO from Atlanta.
- **Interim Remedial Design and Corrective Action** at the closed Arsenic Pond-South; conducted by the Huntsville Division, Corps of Engineers.

These new programs are being executed by the Huntsville Division Corps of Engineers and the Savannah District Corps of Engineers and are being coordinated by the MICOM Environmental Management Office through the Defense Environmental Restoration Program, Department of Army. The total cost exceeds \$4 million.

These studies and designs are a significant step in the planning and programming for the final remedial action for materials disposed of during and after World War II, and for other hazardous waste disposal practices from 1976 to present. The MICOM Environmental Office estimates the final remedial actions will take place over the next 10 to 15 years, with an estimated cost exceeding \$500 million.

Army laser experiment aboard Space Shuttle

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — An Army Space Command project will be aboard the Space Shuttle Discovery when it is launched from Kennedy Space Center in early December. The Battlefield Laser Acquisition Sensor Test (BLAST) experiment is designed to demonstrate the technology associated with using a spaceborne laser receiver to detect laser energy from ground-based test locations.

BLAST will also demonstrate the Army's ability to uplink Global Positioning System information by laser from Earth field locations to spaceborne sensors. This technology will enhance the battlefield commanders' capability to detect lasers and will provide a low probability of detection by enemy forces to locate downed pilots, track vehicles, ships, and troop formations.

BLAST, designed by Lt. Col. Jan Drabczuk of the Army Space Command at Colorado Springs, Colo., and Chris Simi of the Army's Night Vision Electro-Optics Directorate at Fort Belvoir, Va., is a jointly sponsored space project of those activities and the Army Space Technology Research Office in Adelphi, Md. BLAST is being integrated and flown on the Space Shuttle under the direction of the Department of Defense's Space Test Program.

During the test, a low power visible laser mounted on a gimbaled tracking system will track the Shuttle, based on the most recent NASA Orbiter location information. The optical signal from the tracking facilities is captured by an on-board laser receiver mounted in the Shuttle flight deck overhead window. The optical signal will be processed and displayed to the flight crew real-time and recorded for post mission analysis. Data obtained will be used to develop DoD sensor technology.

BLAST will involve the use of three fixed optical tracking facilities located at the Air Force Maui Optical Site, Hawaii, the Air Force Malabar Test Facility in Palm Bay, Fla., and the Department of Energy LAZAP site in Albuquerque, N.M. Additionally, portable tracking sites will be set up at various DoD field locations.

Increased life insurance benefits available to soldiers

Servicemen's Group Life Insurance coverage in the amount of \$200,000 is now available to eligible active and reserve component soldiers due to the Veteran's Benefits Act of 1992 signed by the president Oct. 29. Current maximum SGLI coverage is \$100,000.

Fall cleanup time in family housing area

Thursday, Nov. 19 and Friday, Nov. 20 have been designated as "Fall Cleanup Days" for families residing on post.

"We have requested that commanders and supervisors release military personnel residing in Army Family Housing from duty on either Nov. 19 or 20 to allow their participation in the cleanup," stated an open letter to family housing residents from Col. Ross Sanders, the deputy post commander. "Family members are encouraged to help in the campaign. Personnel who are on leave, TDY, or training during the scheduled Fall Cleanup Days should perform cleanup of their residence by Dec. 1."

The Self-Help Center has been stocked with rakes, furnace filters, plastic bags, equipment, and tools to assist residents in the cleanup effort. The Center is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Saturday.

Residents received a checklist of items on which special emphasis should be placed during the Fall Cleanup. "This list is not all encompassing, nor does it mean to imply that everyone needs to do all of the work indicated. Please look honestly at your residence and do the things that require attention," stated Sanders' letter.

The following checklist was provided as a guideline:

- Lawns — mowed (if more than 2 inches high); raked; and policed.
- Bushes — neatly trimmed (no more than 6 feet in height).
- Trees — pruned from ground level to a height of 6 feet (this includes voluntary growth from the trunk or ground and low hanging branches).
- Edging — sidewalks, driveways, parking areas, curbs, patios, storage buildings, fences (under and along), foundation of quarters, steps; and along flower beds, plants and trees.
- Weeding — flower beds; cracks in driveways, sidewalks, curbs and streets.

The option to increase coverage is voluntary, and soldiers must elect *in writing* the higher coverage.

Teams are already being sent to each major organization on the Arsenal to prepare the interim forms. This registration will be completed on or before Nov. 30 so that eligible soldiers are covered effective Dec. 1, according to the Military Personnel Office.

Soldiers who previously elected no coverage or reduced coverage do not need to take any action, but soldiers wishing maximum coverage or coverage by increments of \$10,000 must complete paperwork.

The cost of coverage, which will be authorized in increments of \$10,000 up to a maximum of \$200,000 will be 80 cents per \$10,000 or \$16 for the maximum coverage of \$200,000.

Another provision of the Veteran's Benefits Act soldiers need to be aware of is a change in the rate of Dependency and Indemnity Compensation paid to survivors of active duty deceased service members.

The new rate is \$750 per month, regardless of the

soldier's grade. Current rates are \$616 to \$1,580, depending on the soldier's grade. Soldiers need to give this fact serious consideration when deciding on the amount of SGLI coverage to elect, according to Military Personnel Office.

"The cost of the increased coverage is not a lot, but many soldiers may say they can't afford it. Each soldier should look at his or her individual situation when deciding whether to sign up for more coverage," said Ed Dlugasch, deputy adjutant general.

The same program will also automatically insure new members for \$100,000 unless they decline coverage, elect reduced insurance level in even multiples of \$10,000, or elect a higher level in even multiples of \$10,000 up to \$200,000.

The Military Personnel Office is providing information to soldiers in all units here and ensuring the necessary forms are available, Dlugasch said.

Any soldier needing more information should contact his or her unit personnel clerk.

Drive here seeks bone marrow donors

A MICOM worker would like for people here to join the national registry of prospective bone marrow donors Nov. 23-24 at the Recreation Center.

This bone marrow donor drive involves a simple blood test in which blood is drawn from the volunteer's arm, according to Jean Weisser, organizer of the drive. The schedule is 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Nov. 23-24 at the Rec Center, building 3711. The drive here is open to military people, their family members, and Defense Department civilians. Volunteers must be from 18 to 55 years old.

"We're trying to get a goal of 500" donors, said Weisser, an equipment specialist in Logistics Engineering and Maintenance Directorate at the Integrated Materiel Management Center. Her great-nephew, Cliff Myhan, 2, has been diagnosed as having Fanconi Anemia — a deadly blood disease. 

Redstone Army Airfield personnel were treated to a beans and cornbread feast Nov. 10 by the firefighters assigned to the airfield fire station.




Sanders presented Army Commendation Medals to Sgt. William Albert Smith and Sgt. Gerald L. Aplin, both of whom are headed to Korea.



Army TACMS deputy getting top civilian award

Another member of the Army TACMS team is receiving a top individual award from Department of Army.

Don Barker, deputy project manager for Army Tactical Missile System, is to receive the Decoration for Exceptional Civilian Service from the secretary of the Army Nov. 19 at the Pentagon. This is the highest award given to a civilian by the secretary of the Army.

The Army TACMS project manager, Col. David Matthews, had received the Project Manager of the Year award for 1991.

"He got the PM of the Year award, and I'm getting this award from the secretary of the Army. We're not dumb enough to think we did it all or we do it all," Barker said. "I've got 100 folks down the hall (in the project office). I've got a lot of folks here at MICOM in the functional area that support Army TACMS; and we have what I feel to be one of the best contractors in the defense business, Loral Vought out of Dallas. And without the folks here, the functional support, the superb contractor, Col. Matthews and I would not be given these awards and Army TACMS wouldn't be recognized as a successful system."

This has been a very good year for the Army TACMS program. The award to Barker recognizes achievements from December 1990 to July 1992. The missile system performed well in Operation Desert Storm. In addition, improvements have been made to the system over the year; specifically, a software change called "explicit guidance" increased the system's survivability and increased its range by about 25 percent. The Army TACMS team marked a production milestone this year with delivery of its 500th missile. The project office also made progress this year by implementing an aggressive Total Quality Management program. "So, I think the award is given in recognition of those (achievements) plus other things that have happened in the project office this year that I've been a part of," Barker said.

Barker was nominated by Matthews for the award; and the nomination was endorsed by George Williams, program executive officer for tactical missiles. The project office consists of about 100 people including core and matrix support, civilians and military. "Col. Matthews and I have worked very hard to make this an Army TACMS family," Barker said. "We strive for a family atmosphere, and I think we've achieved that."

Originally from McMinnville, Tenn., Barker received a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from Tennessee Tech in 1966. He received a master's degree in administrative science from the University of

Alabama in Huntsville in 1973. Barker, 48, is also a graduate of the Defense Systems Management College's program management course. His government career began in 1966 at Marshall Space Flight Center as a test and instrumentation engineer. After a brief stay there, he transferred to the Army in 1967. Excluding two years in the military — he was drafted into the Army in 1969 — he has been here ever since. This includes 16 years in the Pershing Project Office. Before joining the Army TACMS project office as deputy in December 1990, Barker had served as deputy for system integration in the Air Defense program executive office.

He and his wife, Linda, a Birmingham native, have been married for 24 years. They have two daughters: Sheri, 21, a junior at Auburn University who plans to be a lawyer; and Staci, 18, a freshman at Calhoun who plans to be a respiratory therapist. The Barkers reside in Huntsville. They enjoy water sports and have a cabin at Smith Lake, about 50 miles south of here.

"I really enjoy what I'm doing here," Barker said, when asked about his future. "My plans are to stay on as deputy and try to make Army TACMS even better than it is now, by trying to get some of the enhancements to Army TACMS that will improve the system — give the system more capabilities for use by the troops."

Production milestone achieved for Army TACMS team

EL PASO, Texas — The LTV Missiles Division has delivered the 500th Army Tactical Missile System missile to the Army.

George Williams, the Army program executive officer for tactical missiles, and Col. David Matthews, Army TACMS project manager, accepted the missile recently at the Missiles Division's final assembly facility at Horizon City, near El Paso.

"The acceptance of this missile represents a significant milestone in the production of the most reliable and lethal conventional surface-to-surface missile the Army has ever had in its arsenal," Matthews said.

Army TACMS, the first tactical surface-to-surface missile fired in combat by the Army, had a 100 percent success rate during Operation Desert Storm. LTV accelerated production so that the long-range missile could be used against high priority targets, including air defense sites and command, control and communication installations — all of which were destroyed or rendered inoperable.

LTV won the competition to design and produce the missile in March 1986 after nearly a decade of research and testing. The resulting conventional missile gives Army battlefield commanders the capability to engage enemy ground targets at long ranges and disrupt the flow of reinforcements.

"The delivery of the 500th production missile is a proud accomplishment for the ATACMS team," said Robert Anderson, ATACMS program director for the Missiles Division. "In just over six years, we have started and completed development, supported a war and continue to produce ahead of schedule."

TOW workers get chance to see system used in field

Members of TOW Project Office are getting a chance to travel to see soldiers in the field use their missile system.

Under TOW's ongoing "Greening Program," the workers can watch TOW users in action this month at Fort Benning, Ga., or in December at Fort Campbell, Ky. Future sites include Fort Polk, La., Fort Stewart, Ga., and Fort Irwin, Calif. On each two-day trip, there will be five to 10 volunteers from the project office.

"It's a part of the Army greening program that's ongoing throughout the Army for ensuring that Department of Army civilians are familiar with the military and the missions that we have," said Lt. Col. Lloyd Holloway, special staff officer for TOW Project.

The workers will see how the soldiers train with and maintain the equipment, and get a better understanding of the environment in which the system must operate. The trips are open on a voluntary basis to all 100 members of the mostly-civilian project office; they can take as many of the scheduled trips as they wish.

"The goal of the program is to provide an ongoing and continuous effort to ensure that members of the TOW Project are in-tune with the needs and expectations of their customer (the soldiers who use the system)," said Holloway, coordinator for the greening program.

The first trip was scheduled for Nov. 12-13 at Fort Benning, with the 29th Infantry Regiment serving as host. Logistical support — including tents and sleeping bags — was being provided by 1st Battalion of the 50th Infantry.

Jennifer Howard, a secretary in TOW's logistics management division, said she was looking forward to that trip. "I think it's going to be good. I think I'll learn a lot," said Howard, a member of the project office for a little more than a year.

Jeff Hanson, an engineer in TOW's product assurance office, and Latana Pempleston, a program analyst in the project's resource management division, are among those scheduled to visit Fort Benning Nov. 23-24. Hanson, with the project for three and a half years, wants to see how the soldiers use the system. "I work with the testing and qualification of a lot of the components, but I don't really get a chance to see the system as a whole," he said.

Pempleston has been with the government for five years and has been with TOW Project for a year. She said she is excited about seeing the final product being used in the field. "This is the first chance I've had an opportunity to get a firsthand view of why I'm here and how my job interacts with the whole process," Pempleston said.

Carol R. Jones, an engineer in TOW's technical management division, is scheduled for the Dec. 7-8 trip to Fort Campbell. "I'm excited about the opportunity to interact with the soldiers, to understand how they use our product, to understand some of their desires and problems that they have with our TOW weapon system, and to understand how they maintain the system in the field," Jones said. "It'll be a good

opportunity to see its use and its real intent."

As part of the greening program, TOW trainers from Fort Benning are to travel to Redstone in early December to conduct two weeks of training for volunteers from the project office.



Engineering apprentice a finalist at national competition

A Grissom High School junior who spent eight weeks conducting research in MICOM's Research, Development and Engineering Center was selected as one of 10 national finalists after presenting her paper at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

Erika Swinson, a science and engineering apprentice program participant who spent her summer working in the Advanced Systems Concepts Office, had as her research project the testing of fiber optic cables for use in battlefield environments.

At project completion, she presented a paper that documented her work of testing fiber for bend radii, compression and tensile characteristics. After recording results, Swinson then selected the most promising fibers for future use in the Unmanned Ground Vehicle system.

She was third place winner in the engineering category in local competition and received a savings bond and a trip to Washington, D.C. to compete at the national level.

As one of 10 national finalists, she presented her work at George Washington University in Washington, D.C. All finalists served apprenticeships in Navy and Army laboratories.

Swinson was recognized at the local chapter meeting of the Armed Forces Communications-Electronics Association on Nov. 17, where she gave an overview of her project, received an award from the chapter and was presented a \$50 savings bond.

Swinson, 16, is studying physics and trigonometry at Grissom. After high school she hopes to attend either the University of Alabama in Huntsville or the University of Florida.

"The apprentice program helped me decide on what I want to be. I'm leaning toward (a career in) engineering more, because the summer experience made me see you can be a female and still be successful in an engineering profession," Swinson said.

She credits Suzy Young, her mentor in RDEC, as being a "great role model." Young is a mechanical engineer in the Advanced Systems Concepts Office.

Young said Swinson's eight-week apprentice program was mutually beneficial, in that Swinson conducted a project that needed doing but she hadn't had time to do.

Swinson is the daughter of Lt. Col. Mark and Priscilla Swinson. Lt. Col. Swinson is assigned to the Unmanned Ground Vehicle Project Office.

"Next to Thanksgiving, it is the most important Thursday in November," says a release from the Civilian Wellness Center.





Waterfowl hunters receive guidelines

Alabama waterfowl hunters will have a split duck season this year for the first time in many years.

Hunting begins Dec. 17 and ends Jan. 3 for the first portion of the season. It resumes Jan. 9 and continues until Jan. 20.

Shooting hours begin one half hour before legal sunrise each day and end with sunset.

The daily bag limit is three ducks. Of that total only two may be mallards, one of which may be a female. Hunters may take two wood ducks, but only one black, one redhead or one pintail. The season on canvasback ducks is closed.

Only steel shot may be used and repeating shotguns must not carry more than three shells.






