## Commissary clears confusion concerning cost codes

Redstone Arsenal Commissary officials want to clear up any misunderstanding caused by the small red numbers penciled in on the shelf price labels on certain commissary items.

This customer concern came to light at the Post Exchange/Commissary Advisory meeting on Jan. 22 when it was reported that some people are confused about whether the written-in red number, or the bold black computer-generated number, is the price items sell for.

"The red pencil-written number on some shelf price labels are nothing more than codes to our store personnel who make signs showing an item price reduction," Commissary manager Lee Wainwright explained.

"We make these signs showing "before" and "after" prices to show customers how much they're saving," Wainwright said.

"For example, say an item was selling for \$.99. We get new price changes from our vendors on the first of the month. Some items will increase in price; some will decrease. If the item marked \$.99 goes up to \$1.19, we don't pencil in any price, because there's no customer saving there. However, if that item drops to \$.89 and a new computer label is generated to replace the \$.99 price label, one of our store personnel will pencil in the old price (\$.99) so that another employee can make a sign to draw customers' attention to this price decrease," explained Jimmy Steelman, who's in charge of commissary pricing.

"We have now stopped writing in the old price on the new label to avoid any possible confusion," Wainwright said.

### Pricing procedures

Pricing in the commissary is different from other stores on post, Wainwright said.

For example, the Post Exchange is profit-making enterprise, with employee salaries paid from profits.

## MICOM has best ever CFC campaign, receives top award

The Missile Command received the "Top Gun" award from United Way of Madison County for being the top public sector contributor in the recently ended Combined Federal Campaign.

Net profits realized after expenses are then donated to the Morale, Welfare and Recreation fund.

"We have nothing to give back. We're required by law to break even," Wainwright said.

MICOM contributions to CFC totaled \$437,4007, 106.9 percent of its established goal, according to George Gunter, MICOM CFC coordinator. This was the largest amount of money ever collected by MICOM for CFC.

Gunter accepted the award for MICOM at the United Way of Madison County annual meeting and awards dinner Jan. 26 at the von Braun Civic Center North Hall.

The Tennessee Valley Combined Federal Campaign reported \$1,330,000 in contributions this year, exceeding its goal of \$1,265,000.

"Our keyworkers are the ones who really went out and did the job that had to be done," Gunter said of the MICOM CFC campaign.

"We attribute the success of the campaign to the generosity of our employees. The average per capita gift to the CFC ran higher this year than in previous years," Gunter said.

Gunter presented the "Top Gun" award to Maj. Gen. Joe Rigby, MICOM commander, in a ceremony last week at MICOM headquarters. The trophy is now on display on building 5250 lobby.

Approximately 22,000 federal employees participate in Tennessee Valley CFC, a geographical area that includes Cullman, Limestone, Madison, Marshall and Morgan counties in Alabama, and Lincoln County, Tenn.

All commissaries worldwide are managed by the Defense Commissary Agency at Fort Lee, Va., and are required by law to sell everything at cost. The five percent surcharge added to the shopper's total bill is also required by law, and pays certain commissary operating costs such as equipment purchases and maintenance, daily operating supplies such as paper bags and packaging material for meat products.

### Posted prices honored

Another commissary procedure customers need to know about is the commitment to honor a posted shelf price, even if it's incorrect, Wainwright said.

"So if an item rings up \$1.99 at checkout, and the shelf price hasn't been changed — it still says \$.99, we'll let the customer have the item for \$.99," he said.

### Price changes

Some customers wonder why prices change when they do — the first of the month, Wainwright said.

"Some customers think we raise prices on the first of the month in an attempt to take advantage of them, because they just got paid. Nothing could be further from the truth. We would never do anything like that to hurt the soldier," he said.

Prices are quoted by vendors on the first of the month for the entire month. So on the first day of the month, the commissary gets approximately 3,300 price changes, some increases, some decreases. (Incidentally, that same number of new shelf price labels must be generated and posted.)

"We don't have a choice; our price labels must change on the day the price we pay for the item changes," Steelman said.

### Overall savings

Sometimes customers wonder why they can buy selected items for a lower price at commercial grocery chains, Wainwright said.

## Traffic situation

# Commentary: Jury duty proves a worthwhile experience

If you have an Alabama driver's license and have been a resident of Madison County for at least a year, chances are you will be called for jury duty here some day.

Take it from me. I got called to serve as a juror for the week of Jan. 25. Like most of you, I didn't relish the opportunity. It meant dropping my responsibilities at the office for probably five days. But from the first day on, I began to warm to this responsibility.

You see everybody deserves a fair trial. The Constitution gives everyone that right. And if our government can't count on being able to call at least 12 citizens at random to serve as impartial judges, if you will, then our judicial system just wouldn't work.

On Monday morning, Jan. 25, I was among the more than 100 citizens who filled a courtroom at Madison County Courthouse. Billy Harbin, the circuit court clerk, told us there were 168 cases set for trial at week, including 130 criminal cases. He said most would not go to trial because they would be disposed of some way or another — by people pleading guilty, the case being nolo prosequere or dismissed, or the two sides settling their disputes out of court.

Harbin told us that the system needed at least 90 citizens to serve as jurors that week. This number was arrived at by multiplying 12 times each of the six circuit judges and adding 18.

Each time a judge needed a group of prospective jurors, 30 would go to his courtroom. Each side in the case would have the opportunity to excuse nine prospective jurors; this would leave an agreed upon 12-member panel to hear a particular case.

We took the oath of jurors, acknowledged that none of us had ever been charged with a felony crime and

that we all were U.S. citizens who had resided in this county for at least a year. Circuit Judge Jeri Blankenship introduced us to the other judges who stood before us and then those judges left for their respective courtrooms.

After further instructions, we went to the jury venire room on the sixth floor of the courthouse. We had been warned during the instructions that much of our time would be spent sitting and waiting for something to happen. This proved to be true.

About 2:30 p.m., I was among a group of 30 jurors called to the courtroom of Judge Lynwood Smith to possibly serve for a criminal trial.

I am a former police reporter with *The Huntsville Times* whose brother is a Huntsville police officer; but to my surprise, I was selected to remain as a juror for this first-degree theft case involving a husband and wife who were co-defendants. I was among 14 jurors, including two alternates. We didn't know which of us were the alternates. We didn't hear any evidence the first day; Judge Smith told us not to respond to any questions about our case to family members, friends

or anyone else. He told us to acknowledge only that we had been selected for a jury — and not to even tell whether it was a criminal or civil case. "It's a small world," he said, emphasizing the fact that our acquaintances might know some of the parties involved and thereby inadvertently taint our decision by talking with us about the case or those parties.

We were told to return to the courtroom area by 9 a.m. Tuesday. We heard testimony Tuesday and Wednesday and heard closing arguments Wednesday afternoon. The judge announced the names of the two alternate jurors. They remained behind and the rest of us began our deliberations about 5 that afternoon in the closed jury room. We discussed the case for about an hour, then the judge dismissed us for the evening with his instructions to not talk about the case with anyone. We resumed deliberations at 9 a.m. Thursday. We deliberated for three hours until lunch then deliberated one more hour after lunch before reaching our verdicts. We voted unanimously to convict the wife and acquit the husband. We had deliberated for a total of five hours before reaching these verdicts which were unanimous as is required by law.

I'm not going to get into the evidence presented or why we voted the way we did. The point is we helped our judicial system do its job of protecting the rights of citizens by granting them a fair trial. If you're called to jury duty, and chances are you will be during your lifetime, don't try to get out of it by conjuring up an excuse. Serve and serve proudly. Our system, and our fellow citizens, are counting on you.

"The reason for that is that private enterprise isn't governed by law that requires them to sell a product at the price they paid for it; we are," Wainwright said.

Grocery chains can double a price, or half a price, when they so choose. Many stores sell a product as a "loss leader," or at a price they know will lose money. It's a common marketing technique intended to draw customers in for the purchase of that item, knowing that while they're there they'll do the rest of their shopping.

Baby food is a common item a grocery store will sell as a "loss leader" in an attempt to draw young families in as regular customers.

"I'll be the first one to tell my customers not to buy their Thanksgiving turkeys at the Commissary. The grocery stores in town always sell their turkeys below their cost to draw shoppers in," Wainwright said.

"What I will tell our Commissary customers is regular shopping here will result in a 25 to 26 percent savings over grocery stores downtown," Wainwright said.

"We not trying to make money off our customers. If we're higher on certain items I don't mind telling the customers that. I'll also be the first one to tell our customers to go to the chains and cherry-pick the specials. But if they want to save money overall, they can do that in the commissary," he said.

Commissary shoppers include active and retired military people and their family members.

# Severe Weather Week focuses on tornado preparedness

(The following information is provided by the Redstone Arsenal Support Activity, Support Operations Office, to highlight Severe Weather Awareness Week Feb. 8-12)

While tornadoes can occur at any place at any time, they are most common March through September and generally develop during the afternoon or evening hours.

The Redstone Arsenal complex lies within a geographical zone which experiences a relatively high frequency of tornadoes and other severe weather disturbances. Even though located in such an area, the chances of a tornado striking one's worksite are very slight, but it has happened. Consequently, installation

employees need to be familiar with action they should take in the event of a tornado watch, tornado warning or an actual tornado.

For reasons of impracticality, the installation has no overall formal tornado plan which provides for relocation of the work force. During an actual tornado, no set of rules would apply equally to all employees because of the diversity in types of buildings, widespread location and other factors. However, some general measures applicable to most situations are as follows:

- Remain indoors unless an established plan dictates other action or unless directed to evacuate for compelling reasons by appropriate authority.

- Seek shelter in the safest portion of the building (basements or windowless interior halls when available).

- In lightweight structures having no basement, seek shelter under heavy furniture (against inside walls if possible).

- Avoid auditoriums, gymnasiums and other structures with wide span roofs.

- If driving, travel in a direction 90 degrees to the oncoming path of the tornado. If not possible to travel in a 90 degree direction, or if caught outside in an open area, stop your vehicle and seek shelter in culvert ditch or depression.

# Tornado warning system to begin monthly testing

Redstone Arsenal will begin testing its tornado warning sirens on a monthly basis, beginning in February. The first test is set for Feb. 8 at 9 a.m., and will coincide with Severe Weather Awareness Week which runs Feb. 8-12.

Redstone's monthly testing will be done in conjunc-

tion with Huntsville/Madison County Emergency Management Agency's test schedule and will occur on the second Monday of each month at 9 a.m. except when threatening weather is present or the forecast indicates threatening weather.

A statewide tornado drill will be held Feb. 10, and

on that date, the Missile Command Plans and Operations Office will test the Emergency Telephone Warning Net (ETWN) and the Campus Area Network Emergency Warning System (CANEWS) between 10 a.m. and noon unless the weather is threatening.

# Theater missile defense flight test called successful

The Strategic Defense Initiative Organization and the Space and Strategic Defense Command announced Friday the successful completion of a flight test under the Theater Missile Defense Countermeasures Mitigation Program.

A two-stage TALOS/ARIES booster configuration was launched at 5 p.m. Thursday from Wake Island to the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll missile range in the mid-Pacific Ocean. The payload included a representative reentry vehicle as part of a test designed to collect data on potential countermeasures to planned Theater Missile Defense elements. These data will be used by both U.S. government agencies and contractors to develop computer simulations on the behavior of countermeasures and to develop and test computer algorithms designed to mitigate their effects.

Direct TMD element users are expected to include the Army/Raytheon Patriot, the Army/Lockheed Theater High Altitude Area Defense system, the Ar-

my/Loral Vought Extended Range Interceptor, the Army/Raytheon TMD Ground Based Radar, the Army Corps Surface-to-Air Missile system, the Air Force Brilliant Eyes, and the Navy AEGIS system.

During the test, both optical and radar data were collected on the missile and its payload as they reentered the atmosphere and broke up due to atmospheric forces. In addition to Kwajalein range radars, several sensors also were present during the mission. These included the HALO/IRIS aircraft, the SPY-1B Radar aboard AEGIS cruiser USS Chosin, a development model of the MPQ 53 Patriot Radar, and SDIO's Cobra Eye and SSDC's Airborne Surveillance Testbed aircraft. No intercept missiles were involved.

The next launch is scheduled for early February, also from Wake Island to the Kwajalein range. It will use a similar booster combination and reentry vehicle but will include several decoys along with an intentional fragmentation of the booster.

The test was managed and conducted for SDIO by SSDC in Huntsville. Support was provided by the Patriot Project Office, the U.S. Naval Ship Redstone, the Air Force Space and Missile Systems Center, Los Angeles AFB, Calif., and the Lincoln Laboratory of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Orbital Sciences Corporation was responsible for the integration of the entire vehicle.



# Residents can help themselves to home improvement items

Redstone families will have an easier time getting some home improvement items from the Self-Help Center as the result of a change in procedure.

Family housing occupants no longer have to request certain items by submitting a form through the Family Housing Office. They still must use DA Form 2701 to request some items which are considered accountable supplies and equipment.

The eight items which no longer require formal request include pine bark nuggets, fertilizer-weed and feed, black plastic lawn edging, pine bark mulch, bags of peat moss, landscaping timbers, bags of top soil, and plastic weed block. "These items can be obtained in limited quantities per fiscal year without approval from the Housing Office," said Ron Poteat, an engineer tech in the Family Housing Division at Directorate of Engineering and Housing. "They just go down there to the Self-Help Center, walk up to the window and say 'I want them'.

"However, some items still require a DA Form 2701, and they are: fences, privacy screens, paint, plants, patio cover kits, and landscaping materials above the authorized quantities," he said. Authorized quantities are listed in a Dec. 11 memorandum which was mailed to the family housing occupants.

Since the memorandum was distributed, some restrictions that apply to direct exchange items and some quantity limitations have been eliminated. New guidance will be provided to family housing residents.

The procedure change results from residents' concerns expressed through the Self-Help Center suggestion box, town hall meetings and the family symposium. "People felt like it was unnecessary for them to have to come up here (to the housing office) to see us on those items, you know. And of course we agreed with them. That's how these changes came about," Poteat said.

To request accountable self-help items, residents must go to the family housing office to submit a form 2701. Waiting time in filling their request varies according to the type of item desired.

The Self-Help Center, building 3500, has many other items on its shelves — such as air filters — that have never required a formal order. Materials are available for free to all occupants of the 1,165 sets of family housing quarters.

"The only thing that costs them is time — that's why they call it Self-Help. They do it themselves," Poteat said.

The center is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday.

Residents should submit a 2701 to Family Housing by Feb. 22 in order to request trees and shrubs in time for spring planting. A list of available plant materials was included in the Dec. 11 memorandum to residents. Additional tree and shrub types have been added to the list. The revised list is available in the Family Housing Office, Building 111. Bedding plants will be available in the April/May time frame.

# Tooth decay can start at infancy

New parents may not realize the importance of caring for their infant's primary teeth. However, the Redstone DENTAC cautions parents that serious tooth decay may develop by the child's first birthday. Even though the child's primary teeth will eventually be replaced with permanent ones, the primary teeth are critical for proper chewing, speaking and appearance. They also reserve space in the jaw for permanent teeth.

Baby bottle tooth decay is a condition that can destroy the primary teeth of an infant or young child. It can develop when a baby frequently receives a bottle of milk, formula, fruit juice or sweetened liquids as a pacifier or comforter. It may result when the child is allowed to fall asleep with a bottle during naps or at bedtime. Prolonged demand breastfeeding may also cause this condition. Although the teeth most likely to be damaged are the upper front teeth, other teeth may also be affected.

Bacteria are present in a thin film of plaque that constantly forms on the teeth. The bacteria use sugar as an energy source. In the process, the bacteria produce acids that attack tooth enamel. Frequent, lengthy exposure to sugary liquid can result in acids attacking the child's teeth for at least 20 minutes. After many such attacks, tooth decay can occur.

All types of sugars, including those found in bottle and breast milk, formula, fruit juices, and sweetened liquids can cause plaque bacteria to produce decay-

causing acids. How often a child receives a bottle containing these liquids and for how long a time the child's teeth are exposed to decay-causing acids are two important factors.

The Redstone DENTAC says parents can help protect their babies teeth by doing the following:

- After each feeding, wipe the child's teeth and gums with a damp washcloth or gauze pad, to remove plaque. Begin brushing your child's teeth as soon as the first tooth erupts (around six months). Continue cleaning and massaging gums in all other areas that remain toothless. Flossing should begin when all primary teeth have erupted, usually by age 2 or 2-and a half.

- Never allow your child to fall asleep with a bottle of milk, formula, fruit juices, or sweetened liquid.

- If your child needs a comforter between regular feedings, at night, or during naps, fill a nursing bottle with cool water or give the child a clean pacifier recommended by your dentist or pediatrician. Never give a child a pacifier dipped in any sweet liquid.

- Avoid filling a nursing bottle with liquids such as sugar water, sweetened gelatine or soft drinks.

- Make sure your child gets the fluoride needed for decay-resistant teeth. Ask your dentist about recommended methods for obtaining the proper amount of fluoride.

- Schedule regular checkups beginning by the child's first birthday.

# MLRS improvement increases efficiency, reduces costs

(The following was provided by the MLRS Project Office)

The battle proven Multiple Launch Rocket System Fire Control System is in the early stages of a technology upgrade that will provide future growth well into the 21st century. This product improvement effort, the Improved Fire Control System, will reduce costs, slow component obsolescence and accommodate present and future weapon systems using the M-270 launcher.

"The Improved Fire Control System is our key to the future," Col. William Taylor, MLRS Project Manager, said.

"It is one of the most significant improvements MLRS is undertaking to transition the system into the 21st century," Taylor added.

Loral Vought Systems (formerly the LTV Missile Division) was recently awarded a five-year, \$134 million contract to produce the IFCS. Loral Vought Systems will perform the majority of the work at its facility in Grand Prairie, Texas. The Harris Corporation in Melbourne, Fla., will design five of the seven IFCS line replaceable units: the fire control panel, mass storage device, main processor, interface unit and launcher interface unit.

The IFCS navigation equipment, including the global positioning station receiver, will be designed by Allied Signal (formerly Bendix) of Teterborough, N.J. Raytheon Missiles of Tewksbury, Mass., will design the meteorological (MET) sensor.

The current MLRS launcher evolved from a rocket launcher platform that fires two munitions. Today's weapons platform is capable of firing a family of munitions such as Army Tactical Missile System (ATACMS), Sense and Destroy Armor (SADARM) and the Tri-Service Standoff Attack Missile (TSSAM). The IFCS improvements will accommodate these present and future systems.

Originally designed using late 1970s technologies, the FCS is facing potential component obsolescence problems. An MLRS initiative to examine potential obsolescence revealed that at the present time approximately 10 percent of the micro-circuit components used in the system are obsolete, one-third are in the declining years of availability, and by the year 2003, nearly 100 percent of the components will no longer be available.

The IFCS will use state-of-the-art technology to increase system memory capacity and reduce computing times. This upgrade allows multiple munition programs to be stored within the system. A 32 bit pro-

cessor will enhance system operability and survival by reducing launcher time on firing sites. A dual redundant bus will significantly increase reliability.

Building upon lessons learned during Operation Desert Storm, the MLRS crew will use the GPS to pin-

point its location without resorting to survey control points.

The IFCS will also include a MET sensor to measure wind velocities and direction. Wind data collected just prior to rocket launch will be processed by the IFCS computer to compensate for aim point errors and wind influence on rocket trajectory. A significant increase in weapon effectiveness is projected for rockets when using MET sensor data. This translates into fewer rockets and missiles for any given mission.

The IFCS places a high priority on operation and sustainment cost reductions. Anticipated savings make retrofit of existing launchers very attractive. With continued production and retrofit of more than 600 MLRS launchers in the field, the IFCS is estimated to reduce life-cycle costs by millions, as well as increase war fighting capabilities.

# TOW worker has enjoyed work for 30 years

Not many people on Redstone Arsenal have spent their entire careers working on the same project. But Evelyn Hunter, a secretary in TOW Project Office's Technical Management Division, has called TOW her workplace the last 30 years.

Hunter said there has never been a reason to leave, to look for another job.

"I've never worked in a place or had a supervisor I didn't like. I love secretarial work; a lot of people don't but I do," Hunter said.

She first heard of the tube-launched, optically-tracked, wire-guided (TOW) missile program in 1962 when she was working in a research and development Special Projects office.

"I learned about a new missile system being developed out of that office. I was told to sign for all the secret documents belonging to that system, that I was being assigned on the TOW project. I didn't want to go because I liked my boss and the people I worked with in Special Projects," Hunter said.

In the beginning, December 1962, Hunter and three others, Bob Whitley, Bob Taylor and Ray Turner were the only people assigned to TOW, Hunter said. In October 1964 TOW became a project office.

"I've seen eleven different TOW project managers. Since my time in TOW we've moved from (buildings) 4505 to 5250; in 5250 from B wing to C wing and back to B wing; from second floor to third floor. I've seen the building (5250) full of windows, the windows stopped up, and the windows opened up again. I've seen buildings updated, carpets and modular furniture installed, new chairs. I had the same chair for 27 years and when they brought me a new chair about three years ago I held onto my old one for two weeks until I was sure I could get used to the new one," Hunter said.

"I hope to be here long enough to move into the new Sparkman building. I enjoy working. I still look forward to coming to work every day," Hunter said.

Hunter has worked in several different offices of the TOW Project, and once declined an offer to get out of the secretarial field into the contracting career field, she said.

Hunter commutes 50 miles one way from Albertville every day, she said. "But up until six years ago I lived in Boaz, which was an even longer drive," Hunter said.

A quick and approximate calculation shows that Hunter is approaching one million commute miles logged in her 30 plus years of employment here!

She said that in all those years, she has been late for work "no more than 10 times, mostly because of weather."

She wakes up at 3:30 a.m. and leaves home at 5:30 a.m. to arrive at work at 7 a.m.. "I don't like rushing around before I leave home every day. When I rush in the morning I feel bad all day. It's o.k. to rush when I get here, but not to get here," Hunter said.

When asked if arising at such an early hour was tough, Hunter replied: "No, not at all. If you're going to work, you've got to just get up and go. I don't go to

bed that early either, about 11 p.m. I'm a person who doesn't need a lot of sleep," Hunter said.

Like most others who must travel such a long distance to work, Hunter carools.

One of the highlights in all the years of working for TOW was a trip she made to the Hughes Aircraft facility in Tucson, Ariz. on the occasion of the 200,000 TOW missile coming off the assembly line, in September 1977.

"All those years I had typed TDY orders, made arrangements for so many trips, typed vouchers when they returned. But I had no idea what it was like to go on TDY. I never could understand why they couldn't arrive at one airport and make a plane change in 15 minutes."

Her husband, Tom Hunter, worked at Post Engineers until the late '70s when he left on a medical retirement, Hunter said.

Hunter's career at Redstone actually started even before she worked with TOW. She came here to work for Facilities Engineers (now Post Engineers) in 1956. It was there that she met her husband, and when they started their family she quit work for 16 months. Their son, Glenn, was born in 1960 and daughter, Jan, came along in 1962. Jan has provided the Hunters with two grandchildren, Tonia and Kandi.

Hunter lists her hobbies as reading, sewing, working jigsaw puzzles and gardening.

# Historical division gives post pictures of the past

When the Army Communities of Excellence Program came about several years ago and Redstone became an active participant, one of the first things many organizations did was improve the appearance of their work areas.

For many, that meant photo displays depicting Redstone's contributions to the nation's aerospace and missile defense programs. In order to create these dozens of displays, one office has worked behind the scenes to select, reproduce, and display photographs that meet the needs of each customer.

of it has been since been replaced with another display, but enough remains for people to enjoy.

"They did an outstanding job," she said. Gay Money of IMMC worked with the Historical Division on a photo display for Public Service Recognition Week.

"They couldn't have been more helpful. You know how customer service is emphasized with TQM — well, they gave us great service," she said.


Another project, although not quite as visible, has helped one organization provide better service to its customers.

"They have done a really good job, and found out some very interesting things. The history is now required reading for all my people when they come on board," said Lt. Col. James Kincaid, chief of the Directorate of Flight Operations.







# Redstone retiree sees invention commemorated on stamp

When the U.S. Postal Service recently unveiled its latest panel of commemorative stamps, it was a red-letter day in the life of one retired Redstone worker.

The stamps, depicting a panoramic "space fantasy" view, contain at least one item that is fact, not fantasy. The center stamp in the panel shows two people flying with jet vests, a concept developed and tested by engineer Thomas Moore in the late 1940s and early 1950s.

Moore was present during the first day of issue ceremony held at the U.S. Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville Jan. 25. He was recognized by center Director Ed Buckbee in his opening remarks at the ceremony.

"As a U.S. Army engineer, Thomas developed the jet vest and holds a patent on it. His development is probably one of the best kept secrets in Huntsville," Buckbee said.

The technology of the jet vest, later to be incorporated into the manned maneuvering units used by today's astronauts, was considered far-fetched by many of Moore's contemporaries when he was doing his work over 40 years ago.

But Moore, a man ahead of his time, knew the idea had merit, and was backed up by another visionary, Dr. Wernher von Braun.

Moore, a radar expert, was a member of a select group of scientists at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology when he was tapped to become part of von Braun's rocket team at the close of World War II.


He began working on idea for the jet vest around 1946 when he was working with von Braun at White Sands Missile Range. He came to Huntsville when the team relocated here in 1950 and first tested his jet vest in 1952. He and others donned the vest for tethered flight tests that proved his technology worked.

However, the Army at that time was more concerned with putting men on rockets than putting rockets on men, and Moore lost funding for his project. The only working model of the vest is long since lost, along with a film showing it in operation.

Moore went on to become at one time one of the highest-ranking civilians at Redstone, and eventually retired from the TMDE Support group several years ago.

## Separation incentives

*Editor's note: the following information for RIF contingency planning was provided by the Civilian Personnel Office.*

**Editor:**

In accordance with guidance recently received from the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense, a request for separation pay incentives was submitted through command channels for the U.S. Army Missile Command and for the U.S. Army Test, Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment Activity.

Other activities (to include other activities in MICOM's competitive area) are not included, because there was insufficient impact to justify the authority. If the request is approved, separation pay incentives would only be offered, as necessary, to employees in occupations where there is adverse impact. These occupations and the number of affected employees will not be known until late February.

The incentive is limited to the amount of severance pay to which the employee is entitled up to \$25,000. Severance pay is calculated based on one week of pay for every year of creditable service up to 10 years and two weeks pay for every year of service over 10, with a 10 percent adjustment for every year over age 40.

The incentive could be offered to employees who leave through optional retirement and resignation. If Voluntary Early Retirement Authority (VERA) is approved for MICOM, it could also be offered to these eligibles.

Approval of VERA and separation pay incentives and implementing instructions are not expected until Feb. 17. These instructions could change or further limit this authority. Further information will be provided as it is received.
