SSDC has early-out through Sept. 19

In an effort to balance current and future needs of the command with the desires of each assigned civilian employee, Voluntary Early Retirement Authority (VERA) and Voluntary Separation Incentive Pay (VSIP) have been authorized for Space and Strategic Defense Command elements located in Arlington, Va., and Huntsville.

The application period is from Sept. 1-19. Approved individuals must be off the rolls by Jan. 7.

While each and every individual application for VERA/VSIP will be carefully considered, the command's missions must not be adversely impacted as a result. Therefore, some management controls to ensure continuity may be necessary. Individuals applying for VERA/VSIP will be notified of a final decision as soon as practicable.

Lt. Gen. Jay Garner, SSDC's commander, assured the work force that SSDC continues to provide a vital role within the Department of Defense, despite an overall declining budget. He said that "our missions are key and essential to the Army and the nation and recent restructuring actions have tailored SSDC to meet the challenges of today and the future."

Command realignment, possible furlough on minds of MICOM civilian workers

The Civilian Personnel Office wants workers to know they've conducted mergers before— with the creation of LOGSA and the adoption of TMDE — and will do everything in their power to minimize impact on the employees. LeRoy Daniels, the civilian personnel officer, understands the workers' concern about the future.

The employees would also probably say they don't believe management would be above board and fair in making people choices," Daniels said.

Military personnel will be paid because their pay is considered an entitlement.
Other DoD officials have told the media that military and federal civilian retirees will continue to receive their checks.



Who to call...

Residents living on the Arsenal, as well as personnel working on the Arsenal should remember to call the Redstone Fire and Emergency Services in case of a fire, and not 911. Residents in military quarters should call 876-2117 and office personnel

should call 117. The Arsenal is not tied in with the 911 system and a delay is caused when 911 is called to report a fire on the Arsenal. Sticker telephone reminders were provided to residents and should also be available at the post fire department.

Corps of Engineers leads public meeting on realignment impact

Army representatives held a public meeting Aug. 29 as part of a federally-mandated process to prepare an environmental assessment of the impact of moving about 2,500 federal jobs from St. Louis to Redstone Arsenal.

The meeting in Farley school was led by the Mobile District of the Army Corps of Engineers, tasked to prepare the environmental assessment which is to be published in a few months.

The Army reps said that it would be necessary to build two new buildings at the Sparkman Center and modernize four other structures on the Arsenal— buildings 5681, 4488, 3465 and 3470 — to accommodate the new command to be formed by merging the Missile Command and Army aviation elements

moving from St. Louis. Much of the construction work will not be completed until 1997, Army representatives said and they projected that most of the personnel in St. Louis would not move here until the work was done.

Interested individuals from the area asked for additional information on impact on schools, traffic, housing and contracting opportunities. No one expressed concern or opposition to the move.

Shift of the aviation related jobs from St. Louis to Redstone was approved by the federal Base Closure and Realignment Commission and the president; and it is now being considered by Congress. Congress must vote to reject all the 1995 BRAC proposals by Oct. 1 or they become federal law.

Sam Fields

It was January 1980, a Democrat was in the White House, the 49ers had just won the Super Bowl, federal employees were wondering about their employment future and the security of their retirement plan. Sounds familiar, doesn't it? But wait—little did we know that events were taking place which would completely alter the course of our jobs and working conditions.

It was this same January that a tall, thirtiesh man with an infectious grin, wearing blue jeans and cowboy boots, first came to work at Redstone. His first job was as a civil engineer at the Facilities Engineering Division, RASA. Right away, we knew he was no stereotypical employee because this man had energy to burn and he would turn real job problems into humorous events. The tougher the job, the more fun he seemed to have. I especially recall that he would entertain us frequently with his descriptions of the problems he encountered with one of his first jobs—overseeing a contract for the removal of asbestos from building 5681. This man was Sam Fields.

Within a couple of years, Sam had moved to the Master Planning Office. Here, he was truly in his element. The jeans and boots gave way to three-piece designer suits and wing-tipped shoes. "Park Avenue Sam," everyone called him and he played the part to the hilt. Before long, others working with him came to work in three-piecers.

In his planning position, he could exercise his God-given talents—a perfect blend of used car salesman, backwoods revival minister, veteran politician, and visionary. He needed all of these talents and he used them daily. Using these talents the way he did, it was only natural that he would occasionally go off on a tangent, "bounce off the walls," we used to say. When this would happen, his supervisor would reel him back to reality, but he never changed his ways. As best as I could tell, the detours never dampened Sam's spirit or his enthusiasm.

Much has been said lately relative to Sam's role in the Sparkman Center; however, what hasn't been emphasized is the project which began as Pentagon South, was renamed CRASIM, and later became known as Sparkman, was clinically dead several times during the '80s. One man, Sam Fields, kept it on life support with his dogged persistence until it finally caught fire in the early '90s.

No one tried too make Sam's job easy. Not the people working around him nor those from AMC and DA. From the conception of the project, we all took good-natured shots at the Park Avenue Engineer. We jeered him about the monorail (which he really wanted), the four towers, the convenience shop, and the fitness center. In the end, he had rights to the last laugh, but Sam wasn't one to gloat.

Although the Sparkman Center was, without question, Sam's pet project, this isn't the only facility for which he's responsible. Not by a long shot. The next time you ride around the installation, look at the Officers Club, the Child Care Center, the Youth Center, the eight projects comprising the RDEC Lab Modernization, the Refuse-to-Steam Plant, and soon, the BRAC Projects. Then think about the utility infrastructure upgrades. Now, Sam would be the first to admit that he had a lot of help in pulling these off, but he was on the point far more than anyone during the conception, planning, programming, designing, and construction of all these. In fact, you'll find a little to a lot of Sam in each of these projects.

The act of developing criteria and justifications for these projects has become a rather redundant job, however, keeping these projects alive, especially during sessions with the AMC "Murderboard," was an art Sam had perfected. Sam always gave slick briefings—no tap-dances and no sidesteps—as time and again he defended our projects against the most intense scrutiny in the government. During these "Murderboard" sessions, he had to call on all of his talents or most likely, the project would

fizzle right there. This word, fizzle, was not in the vocabulary.

In these times of austere government budgets, I have always felt that, with all of its new facilities, Redstone has a big, almost unfair, advantage when the powers that be make decisions as to which installations will gain and which will lose as a result of BRAC actions. I credit Sam Fields with giving us this advantage, and I realize that, without his dedication and persistence, Redstone may well have been another Fort McClellan. I also realize that my family may well be living in Virginia, Pennsylvania, or some place other than Huntsville.

Given Sam's sense of humor, his boundless energy and the fact that he loved his work, I bet he's already talked with St. Peter about plans for the monorail he wasn't able to get for the Sparkman Center.

Travel office

Recently we've had several questions and comments about the MICOM OCONUS Travel Office and its commitment to our customers. F.C. Hind's letter to the editor in the Aug. 9 Redstone Rocket is just one example. I'd like to assure Mr. Hinds and all other employees of "Team Redstone" that indeed we recognize you as our customers and we count it a privilege and honor to serve you.

The policy to request OCONUS travel orders 60 days in advance is one that disturbs many of our customers. The lead-time requirement is mandated by the DoD Foreign Clearance Guide, Headquarters AMC, and the Secretary of Defense. Each individual country exercises its sovereign right to establish the time required to process clearances for visits to their country. Under normal circumstances, all official travelers must obtain special area, country, and/or theater clearances. In some cases, one or more clearances may be required before the MICOM Travel Office can issue travel orders. The traveler can help expedite this process by assuring that travel requests are complete and accurate. Travel orders will be issued when all clearances are received.

The MICOM Travel Office consists of two travel assistants that service the entire Team Redstone. They work tirelessly to assure that your travel requests are processed expeditiously. It is their responsibility to ensure that travel requests forwarded for approval are accurate and complete. This includes having proper and complete justifications and assuring conformance to applicable regulations such as the Joint Travel Regulation (JTR) and other mandated policies and procedures. They also must be sure that the traveler's itinerary reflects the actual TDY site instead of entrance/exit points or hotel locations.

The MICOM Travel Office, Transportation Office, Travel Pay, and Carlson-Wagonlit Commercial Travel Office are in constant communication to assure that each traveler is given the most accurate information and the best service possible. Toward this end, the Travel Office led a process action team to improve the process. OCONUS travel will be automated on or about Oct. 1 which will enable quicker processing.

In an effort to better serve and to keep our customers informed, the MICOM Travel Office has prepared and distributed an "OCONUS Travel Guide." The travel office also conducts training sessions on request and makes customer service visits. We are indeed here to serve you. 

TMDE program manager ready for fiscal hurdles


Managing available funds is the biggest hurdle facing any program manager these days; and Col. Roy D. Lewis is no different.

Lewis arrived Aug. 10 from Army Materiel Command headquarters in Alexandria, Va., to become the program manager for Test Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment (TMDE) Activity. He succeeded Col. Steve Dasher whose new assignment is heading the Force XXI office at headquarters AMC.

"I could not be happier," Lewis said. "It's an opportunity for me to continue my military career and do something good for the Army and for soldiers, in an area (TMDE) I'm particularly interested in."

His program manager office acquires test and calibration equipment for the Army. It supports the Army calibration mission with modern, up-to-date equipment. "We end up buying some calibration equipment for the Army and some test equipment for the Army. And a portion of that includes updating the equipment in the Primary Standards Lab," Lewis said.

Current activities include working with the other services in defining standard general purpose test equipment. This means trying to avoid a proliferation of special test equipment that only serves one weapon system. Lewis equates this to having a versatile computer to test all model cars as opposed to a special computer that only tests Cadillacs. "So we're talking general purpose equipment: one piece of equipment that can be used on several weapon systems to be able to test it, as opposed to several pieces of test equipment for each weapon system," he said. "And we're continually updating the IFTE (Integrated Family of Test Equipment). As industry updates their equipment, we're continually adding those updates into the IFTE

pieces of equipment."

The 48-year-old Texas native sees funding as his major challenge. "The biggest challenge, as (with) any program manager, is the adequacy of funding so that you'll be able to do everything you need to do. So we prioritize our needs to do what we absolutely need to do with the amount of money we've got. That's my biggest challenge," Lewis said.

His goals as program manager include ensuring "a stable work environment as it relates to people and money; that's one thing. And the second thing is to work with the other

services to ensure that IFTE remains in the family of general-purpose automatic test equipment."

He has two product managers working for him; and all of his office encompasses 29 people including four military. His boss is Robert DuBois, the director of TMDE Activity.

Lewis, a native of Wills Point, Texas, was a 1970 ROTC graduate of Texas A&M University where he received a bachelor's degree in industrial technology. An Ordnance officer, he later moved into the Acquisition Corps. He came to Redstone twice for school, in 1970 and 1978, but this is his first tour here. Lewis believes Redstone takes better care of people in temporary quarters, particularly those with pets, now than it did back in 1978. "I get the impression they're more service-oriented now than they used to be. Attitudes are better as compared to '78," he said.

He spent four tours in Germany. Before his present assignment, he spent three years at AMC headquarters as chief of the support systems division and director of combat service support.

Lewis and his wife, Susan, have three children: Catherine, 23, a 1994 college grad now working in Houston; John, 18, a student at West Texas A&M University in Canyon, Texas; and Stephen, 14, an eighth grader at Riverton Middle School. "I just closed on a house (Thursday in Huntsville), I'm broke like everyone else," Lewis said, laughing. His hobbies include gourmet cooking and racquetball.

"I'm looking forward to being here and the challenges associated with being a PM; and I think I've got some great people to work with over here. I'm looking forward to all of that," he said.





Volunteers needed for info help desk at Fox hospital

Fox Army Community Hospital has taken yet another step in meeting its patients' needs and has opened a new information desk.

The desk, which can be reached by calling 955-8888 extension 12, will be staffed by volunteers who will answer questions and direct patients, both over the phone and in person. "We receive quite a few telephone calls from patients who are either having a problem reaching a clinic or just aren't sure where they need to go," said Sgt. Charles Sale, who is currently filling in at the desk.

Sale said the patients who call the information desk are always relieved to hear a person's voice instead of a recording. "The callers always seem somewhat surprised when they hear my voice answer the phone. Once they realize there is a person on the other end of the phone they know they are going to receive individualized help," he said.

"We have quite a few calls where patients need to talk to the pharmacist or one of the labs. We can transfer them to the proper department and give them the phone number for future reference," Sale said.

Capt. Christopher Pate is pleased with the information

desk and said it was just one more way the hospital was meeting its goal of total customer satisfaction. "The information desk is a vital part of any hospital and we are very glad we are able to offer it," Pate said.

The desk is in the Red Cross office, in the front of the hospital, and will be staffed by volunteers. "We are in desperate need of volunteers to man the desk," said Yvonne Quantock, FACH Red Cross chairperson. "The desk is really quite easy to work and requires little experience. The only thing the volunteer really has to know is how to use a telephone and answer questions. We will train anyone who is interested in the position. We have both morning and afternoon shifts available, and the training is very easy."

The position might require some filing and miscellaneous office jobs. "There are some times when the phone is quiet and the volunteer can help out with some simple filing or other office work if they are interested. There is always something to do around here," Quantock said.

Scheduling of the volunteers is done in four-hour increments with the morning shift from 8 a.m.-noon. The afternoon shift is from noon

until 4 p.m. "We will work around the volunteers' schedule and if they would like to work it all day, that can be arranged. Currently we only have three volunteers who are staffing the desk and we desperately need at least 10 or 12," Quantock said.



Calhoun Community College provides associate degrees

Editor's note: This is the ninth in a series of articles on various schools and courses available at Redstone Arsenal.

Calhoun Community College, a two-year school, has an extension campus on the Arsenal and offers associate of arts degrees, associate of science degrees, and associate of applied science degrees, as well as certificates in various health careers, and different areas of business.

As with the other colleges on the Arsenal, active duty members, their dependents, and retirees and their dependents are given priority when registering for classes. DoD civilians and the general public can attend classes on the Arsenal as space permits.

Calhoun offers the basic core classes, such as English, Math, History, Social and Natural Sciences and Computer classes on the Arsenal with most of the other required courses being held at their campus located in The Mall and in Decatur.

"A student can obtain their entire associate degree at Calhoun, but due to space limitations, classes that require labs or are more specialized are held at the larger campuses," said director Glen Phares.

The school operates on a quarter-hour basis and the average degree requires 96 hours to complete. The residency rule for students attending the college is 24 quarter hours, and five quarter hours for students obtaining a Missile and Munitions Technology degree.

"We work very closely with the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School (OMMCS) and have a degree in the area where the majority of soldiers are working," Phares said. "This offers them an opportunity to obtain a degree in order to advance in their career, and it is in an area in which they are familiar."

The college also works closely with military students when it comes to accepting non-traditional courses they may have taken during their career. "We can accept a maximum of 45 quarter hours in courses that may have been taken in conjunction with their military careers. Courses from DANTE, CLEP, or SPACE," Phares added.

Tuition at the community college is within reach with the average 5 hour course costing \$135. Financial aid is available and, according to Phares, the counselors work closely with the students. "We don't have a financial aid counselor here

on the Arsenal, but they are as close as the phone. We do have a financial aid office on the main campus in Decatur and I believe we will also have a financial aid office here in Huntsville when we move to The Mall campus to the old Chrysler building," Phares said.

Classes on the Arsenal are held in two-day alignments, either Monday and Wednesday, or Tuesday and Thursday. "Classes are held during the day and in the evening with classes beginning at 8:30 a.m. and ending at 9:20 at night," Phares said.

The staff at the college is very "in-tune" to the needs of the students and "goes out of their way to meet the students' needs," he said. "The students who attend here are unique in some ways and have different pressures and

attitudes than students at a four-year university. We try to make getting a degree as easy as possible without compromising the quality of the education."

Phares also said the students attending Calhoun are dedicated to learning and feel they are there for a reason. "Most of our students are here because they need a degree for their job or want to better themselves. Because of that drive, they have a strong desire to succeed and it really shows," he said.

Registration for the fall term is currently under way with late registration and the adding and dropping of classes being held Sept. 12, 13 and 14. For more information about the college, call 876-7431.





"Soldiers are coming out of basic training with less





Force projection center demonstrates capabilities

The soldiers of ARSPACE's Army Theater Missile Defense Element got some opportunities to show off the Theater Missile Defense Force Projection Tactical Operations Center in Huntsville in August. The FPTOC was in town for work with the Missile Defense Battle Integration Center.

The BIC's "synthetic theater of war" can be combined with the FPTOC's capabilities to give commanders analysis, training, and mission planning and

rehearsal that will make our warfighters "virtual combat veterans" of a battlefield before they even set foot on it.

Sen. Howell Heflin of Alabama and Lt. Gen. Ronald Hite, military deputy to the assistant secretary of the Army (research, development and acquisition), were among visitors who got to see these capabilities in action. Other demonstrations will be seen in October at the national meeting of the Association of the U.S. Army in Washington, D.C.

Airborne surveillance testbed gets brand new paint job

The Space and Strategic Defense Command's Airborne Surveillance Testbed (AST) is sporting a different look these days with a brand new paint job.

The AST, which has thus far participated in 30 missions in support of the Department of Defense's ongoing ballistic missile defense efforts, received a completely new application of paint in July in preparation for a busy schedule in fiscal 1996. The previous paint began to show signs of deterioration. It had been applied when the aircraft, the first Boeing 767, rolled off the assembly line in 1981.

The new paint will ensure adequate corrosion protection in the harsh environments that the AST frequently operates in. The program anticipates several lengthy deployments to the Kwajalein in the Republic of the Marshall Islands next year in support of various theater missile defense pro-

grams.

The new AST look is quite different from the previous red, white and blue scheme which is standard for all Boeing first-in-the-fleet aircraft. With a white top over a gray bottom, the AST will present a more military appearance, emphasizing the plane's role as a critical national test asset for U.S. ballistic missile

defense. Also, the new paint scheme is consistent with that of other U.S. airborne surveillance aircraft operating today.

Developed by Boeing Defense and Space Group in Seattle, Wash., the AST is a modified Boeing 767 which carries a sophisticated long-wave infrared sensor, built by Hughes Aircraft Company, El Segundo,

Calif. The sensor is housed in a cupola atop the airplane fuselage and looks through an open port in the cupola during the aircraft's mission flights at altitudes of more than 45,000 feet.

Under the leadership of Henry A. Holmes Jr., the AST project is managed by SSDC for the Ballistic Missile Defense Organization.

Worker's spouse saves life at Guntersville Lake outing

Joe Cox, RSIC librarian assistant and National Guard soldier, is a very proud husband these days. His wife, Sheila, pulled a man from the waters of Guntersville Lake Aug. 26 and helped bring him back to life.


"We went to the lake to celebrate a family member's birthday," Sheila said. "It was a family gathering and everyone was going to cook out and swim in the lake."

Sheila said her grandmother had brought her boyfriend, 64-year-old Jack Bolden to the picnic. "Jack said he was going to go swimming and had been looking forward to it for a very long time," Sheila said. "He got in the water as we were still unpacking the cars and nobody was really paying attention to him; after all you don't check on an older person like you do with children."

"I was still unloading the car and was talking to my grandmother when she mentioned that Jack looked like he was bobbing in the water. I looked over and realized the back of his head was what was bobbing in the water," Sheila continued.

Sheila immediately started walking to the pier and to Bolden. When she got closer she realized he wasn't just floating in the water and took off in a run. "When I got to the end of the pier I jumped in and swam to him. I got underneath him, turned him over and started to drag him to shore," Sheila said. As she pulled the fallen swimmer to shore Sheila said she started calling for help and told those gathering the man was turning purple.

"It was pretty scary. His color was gone and he was a definite shade of purple. I knew he wasn't breathing and we had to save him,"

Sheila said.

With the help of an uncle, Kenneth Garrett, Sheila pulled Bolden to shore. "Uncle Kenneth knew CPR and showed me how to do the heart massage. Jack wasn't breathing and there wasn't any pulse and we had to do something," Sheila said.

In the meantime the rescue squad was called and by the time they arrived Bolden was breathing on his own. "His color was back and he was doing pretty good on his own," Sheila said. "It was pretty wild."

After the excitement died down, the family celebration continued and according to Sheila the incident was the topic of

discussion for the rest of the day. "I don't know why I checked on Jack when he was in the water. Someone said it was the mother in me and I tend to believe that," Sheila said. "I have two active children and I am always looking to see what they are doing."





Coman is assigned to HHC MICOM and is working in the PAC office as a training instructor. He has been in the Army for eight years.





Stranded kittens rescued from drain at Sparkman

Three Sparkman Center workers rescued two kittens Aug. 22 caught in a drain-pipe in the parking lot in front of building 5301.

"I went out to my car to go home when I heard a faint meow," said Karen Schmidt of the Integrated Materiel Management Center. "At first I thought it was under the hood of the truck that was sitting nearby. After listening and looking for it, I heard the meows again and discovered it was in the drain."

Schmidt said she initially thought there was only one kitten but after listening and doing some investigating she heard two different meows. "I was really surprised when I heard the second meow and it sounded so sad," she said. "People were starting to gather around at this point and the meows were sounding more desperate. To me they sounded like 'I need help' and I wasn't going to leave until we found the kittens and rescued them."

As more people gathered around the scene, David Daniels, Air Defense, and Jim Robertson, Emergency Operations, walked over to see what was going on. "I had just come from the gym and was headed home when I saw the crowd," Robertson said. "I walked over to see what was going on and discovered they were look-

ing for the kittens. At that point we knew the kittens were in the drain and we had to get them out."

Robertson and Daniels enlisted the aid of a crowbar to lift the manhole cover and Robertson climbed down into the pipe to find the kittens. "At first they were very scared and you could tell they were real hungry," Robertson said. "Karen gave me some leftover tacos she had in her car so we could try to lure the cats out. It worked and before I knew it I had one of the kittens in my hand."

Robertson climbed out and handed the kitten to Schmidt and went back to rescue the second kitten. After some additional coax-

ing, Robertson managed to pick up the kitten and climb back out. "Total it took about 40 minutes from the time we took the manhole cover off and I came out with the second cat," Robertson said.

Both Robertson and Schmidt feel the kittens were born in the drainpipe and either fell to their new home or their mother wandered off. "You could tell they were hungry and had never seen people before," Schmidt said.

After the rescue Schmidt took the kittens to a veterinarian who checked them out and gave them a clean bill of health. "As soon as I got them home I gave them some food," Schmidt said.

"They were so hungry they were growling as they were eating."

Schmidt is looking for a home for the kittens, a male and a female, and would like the cats to stay together. "After everything they have been through they deserve to stay together," Schmidt said. Anyone interested in adopting the two cats can call Schmidt at 881-3406.

Importance of fire drills stressed by firefighters

Recent instances of people failing to leave buildings during fire drills indicate a need to inform the work force about the purpose for these drills and the procedures, according to Redstone Fire and Emergency Services.

Redstone Arsenal is required to have annual Emergency Evacuation Drills in all occupied facilities; and an Emergency Action Plan is required for every building on Redstone. For the Emergency Action Plan to be effective, every drill must be responded to just as if it were a real emergency. The plan must include emergency escape procedures, emergency escape routes, a method of accountability for employees after evacuation from the building, and the preferred means of reporting a fire.

Employees need to know the emergency escape procedures, i.e. doors and windows closed, security cabinets locked, etc. Know where your normal emergency exit is and use it. Be aware of your surroundings; if you are in another portion of the building, locate the nearest exit so that in the event of an emergency, you will be prepared to leave the building quickly. It is important for evacuating personnel to go directly to their prescribed assembly points, so that supervisors can account for their people and notify the arriving firefighters if anyone is missing.

During a fire the No. 1 priority is rescue, according to the fire services. If you cannot be accounted for, firefighters will go into a search and rescue operation. It doesn't take long for someone to be overcome by smoke and lose consciousness. Remember, when firefighters are conducting search and rescue operations, they too are in danger. Members of the fire prevention office are available upon request to assist supervisors in determining an appropriate assembly site by calling 876-7005.

Top Defense, Army leaders oppose retirement proposal

WASHINGTON— A congressional proposal that changes retirement benefits Oct. 1 — for the first time without grandfathering present servicemembers — is drawing the ire of the secretaries of Defense and the Army.

The change in the computation of retirement benefits, dubbed "High-12 Month Averaging" is being considered by the Congressional Budget Committees. Instead of basing retirement pay on the final month of service, as is present law, new retirees' monthly pay computation would be averaged over their final 12 months of service. "High-12" would reduce retirement benefits for active and Reserve servicemembers who entered the military before Sept. 8, 1980. The proposal is designed to save the government money as Congress wrestles with spending reductions to achieve a balanced budget.

Secretary of Defense William J. Perry dispatched a letter Aug. 4 to the chairman of the House of Representatives Committee on Budget. His letter strongly voices the DoD position.

Perry wrote of his concern with the "negative effects" their proposal would have on the "morale so crucial to sustain the readiness of our forces in these uncertain times." He called the change "unprecedented."

"For the first time, the Congress is proposing to

break a retirement promise made to members of the career force at the time of enlistment," Perry wrote. "We are concerned that such an action will cause any potential or current servicemember to doubt any promise made to him about his long-term benefits."

Secretary of the Army Togo D. West Jr echoed Perry's concern. Perry's deputy, John P. White told military print reporters Aug. 4 that DoD leaders are going to "work hard to educate Congress in terms of making them understand how serious a matter this is. We would be happy to work with them on (budget) offsets that do not affect our people in this way."

A Pentagon source familiar with the legislative process said representatives serving on the Defense committees don't like the military retirement proposal, but are operating with a narrow band of possibilities. ("High-12" is projected to save \$649 million over seven years.)

"While other cabinets are being cut, the DoD account is being increased," he said. "If they take on retiree cost of living allowances, they will affect more people and cost more people money. The representatives aren't doing this because they are mean, but

they must meet a one-year savings target."

A letter from the joint chiefs of staff disputes the Congressional Budget Office finding of \$649 million in savings in military entitlement costs over the next seven years. The letter, signed by all service chiefs and the JCS chairman and vice chairman, is addressed to Rep. Floyd D. Spence, chairman of the House Committee on National Security. The JCS estimate that a servicemember in the pay grade of E-8 who retired with 26 years of service would experience an 8.4 percent reduction in retired pay, from \$1,914 monthly (65 percent times \$2,945) to \$1,753. The joint chiefs said to avoid such a reduction, the servicemember might delay retirement for another year, thus saving himself retirement pay while negating the expected savings from "High-12."

The Senate Armed Services Committee is not expected to report back their appraisal of the proposal to House-Senate conferees until the end of September. The budget committees must work out differences between the two legislative houses before a final budget conference, in October or November. (Arnews)

Role players portray refugees in peacekeeping exercise

FORT POLK, La.— They're homeless refugees in a war-torn land for 14 hours of the day. For the other 10 hours, they're ordinary United States citizens. Such is the life of the 220 civilian role players taking part in Cooperative Nugget '95, a month-long peacekeeping exercise being held at Fort Polk, La.

They're known as Civilians on the Battlefield, or COBs, and are hired by a civilian contractor for the Army.

Out on the Cooperative Nugget battlefield, they're distinguishable by their civilian clothes and Multiple Integrated Laser Engagement System. By wearing the MILES gear, which beeps when hit by a similar laser attached to weapons, the COBs can be "killed" or "wounded" just as easily as the soldiers taking part in the NATO exercise.

Whether the COBs are playing terrified refugees or hostile bandits bent on destruction, they add an important dimension to Cooperative Nugget's peacekeeping scenario.

"Our job is to get in the way," said Sundown Meyers, a construction worker from DeRidder, La., who is the mayor of Skidtown. "For the military, having civilians on the battlefield is one of the worst

things that can occur — especially if you don't know if they're friendly."

In the Cooperative Nugget scenario, Skidtown is a refugee camp set up nine months ago. Its inhabitants are people who were forced from their homes during the war between the Republics of Cortina and Acadia, the two warring countries that the peacekeeping exercise is based on.

Playing the part of a refugee, Meyers said he was forced from his home by gun-toting soldiers.

"They told me if I didn't leave, they would kill me," Meyers said, adding that as long as the soldiers left him and his village alone, he didn't care what they did. Unfortunately for Meyers, soldiers have to pass through Skidtown every day to reach an enemy minefield.

"If they can communicate with us and say the right things, we'll point them towards the minefield, and they can save a lot of time," said Meyers. "But, if they're killing civilians, so to speak, or blowing out tires, our commanding officers will tell us to act belligerent.

"We'll be irritated at them, and give them dirty looks," Meyers explained. "Or, we'll lie and give them bad information, and generally make their lives more

miserable."

Making soldiers miserable is achieved in a number of ways.

"We'll go to a checkpoint, and drive the soldiers crazy," Meyers said with a grin. "We'll ask for food and water from a gun battery. Some guys have gone out and walked right onto a flightline.

"Sometimes, we'll contract cholera, and the soldiers will have to take care of us. It really gets some lieutenants hot under the collar."

The role player's resume of battlefield activity doesn't end there. Groups of COBs will sit in front of Armored Personnel Carriers, forcing the crews to carry them off. Others will hurl fake grenades into a group of fellow COBs. When soldiers rush to help the 'wounded', the survivors blame them. One moment they're quiet farmers, and the next moment they're sniping at soldiers on patrol.

"Sometimes we're irritated at them," Meyers said. "Other times, we'll be major league neutral, and ignore them. If the word comes down from our COs that we're to be pro-government, then we go along with them. All we do is play the role."

When they're not harassing soldiers or reeking havoc, the COBs do a number of things to keep from being bored.

"We throw around a football, and talk a lot," said Leesville, La. native John Bolton, another Skidtown refugee. "Others read, or play Gameboy."

"We're not supposed to talk to the troops, so I usually talk to the officers in charge," Meyers said.

The point of all this mischievous behavior, is to teach the soldiers how to work with or around, and not against the native peoples. (Arnews)

Several issues are on the minds of the work force, including the possibility of an early-out retirement window to avert any involuntary layoffs. "What employees ask me most in terms of the immediate future is: Is MICOM going to have VERA (Voluntary Early Retirement Authority)/VSIP (Voluntary Separation Incentive Pay) this year? And the answer to that question is we have said to Army Materiel Command that we do not see the need for VERA/VSIP based upon the information available to us," Daniels said. "But like the weather, that's subject to change."

"We don't anticipate having a voluntary early retirement/voluntary separation pay based on information at our disposal; and of course if anything changes that, we will do whatever we have to do," he said.

Another question he hears frequently is on the status of MICOM's request for an exception to the Priority Placement Program. The command submitted its request to the regional coordinator for the Priority Placement Program; and that official felt that the zone coordinator—the next higher level—should act on the request. The command has not yet received a final response.

"And we are concerned that we will not be able to take all the actions that we have planned if we do not receive approval soon," Daniels said. "That Priority Placement Program would allow us to take some internal actions. We would be able to take some internal actions—such as promotions, some reassignments—without having to add to our current population. We have enough money to pay the number of

employees we have on board, but we may not have enough money to pay additional employees that we likely would have if we recruited without an exception.

"What that means is if we initiate a competitive promotion action, we would have to consider persons who are being affected by a reduction-in-force or realignment or persons overseas without return rights; and if we found a match for the job for which we would seek a competitive field, we would have to take the priority candidate and thereby add to MICOM's strength," Daniels explained.

Another issue adding to work force consternation these days is the very real possibility of a furlough. Workers have heard this before in recent years: the government not having enough money to operate in the absence of an approved budget. But this year the government seems closer to the edge of the cliff that would lead to unpaid vacations for the work force.

"I don't know how real it is," Daniels said when asked of the chances for a furlough, "but we have been placed on alert to the possibility. That is to say if Congress and the president can't agree on a budget and a continuing resolution is not enacted, the government will cease to operate because of lack of money. Now there are certain things that we must do to protect life, property, the environment; and it's possible that a small number of employees would not be furloughed. But all others are facing the possibility."

If this happens, the furlough would occur Oct. 1 and the Civilian Personnel Office would issue notices to all affected employees. Daniels believes this would include everyone other than those needed for protection of life or property, such as firefighters, and a few others who are consid-

ered critically essential. The CPO would issue the notice for an indefinite period.

A furlough basically means that the employee does not report to work until further notice, and that the employee would not be paid for this temporary layoff.

Daniels hasn't been furloughed in his nearly 30 years of government service, but he knows of others who have. "I understand that a few employees have been furloughed (in the past) and that furlough period lasted for four hours. And those employees eventually were paid for those four hours, but I don't think any employee can count on being paid if a furlough does occur."

The Missile Command is planning for the creation of a new command at Redstone resulting from the merger of MICOM and certain missions of Aviation and Troop Command in St. Louis.

"The two commands have agreed on a merger placement plan. This merger placement plan will be used in lieu of the strict processing of a transfer of function," Daniels said. "The merger placement plan provides for a process which will result in employees being placed at their current grade."

"We intend to keep all employees informed of placement processes involved in this merger; therefore we will conduct briefings on the merger placement plan on the 11th and 12th of September in the

Sparkman Auditorium. We will provide organizations information regarding scheduling," he said.

Beginning at 8 a.m. Sept. 11, five briefings are scheduled for that day and three briefings are slated Sept. 12. Daniels, who will conduct the sessions, expects them to last about an hour to 90 minutes each—depending on the number of questions. "I encourage all employees to come and hear for themselves. I think it's important that they know the process," he said.

How concerned should workers be in these uncertain times? "My message is that the commanders of MICOM and ATCOM are committed to minimizing personnel turbulence and preserving a work force to accomplish the mission," Daniels said.

"From the personnel office perspective, we are mindful that this merger action could produce anxiety and we're going to be very committed to taking actions which are fair and which can ease the tension. Now, employees also should understand that we have done this kind of thing before—with LOGSA and TMDE—and had planned a similar action for MICOM based upon Brac '91," he added, referring to the base realignment action of 1991 which would have brought Rock Island, Ill., workers here but was overturned.

The Missile Command has 5,738 civilian workers, according to the latest strength number.



Operations Center stands down as Felix heads east

WASHINGTON — During the third week of August residents of the U.S. eastern coast braced for the anticipated brunt of Hurricane Felix. Bracing with them was the Pentagon's Army Operations Center.

Fortunately, Felix never made landfall. But the Department of Defense was ready for the contingency with more than 200,000 meals-ready to eat and plane loads of medical supplies.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency asked the DoD to participate in a coordinated-federal response — if called upon. The Army is the lead DoD executive agent for military support to civil authorities.

The director of military support in the AOC was ready, having published a planning order earlier this year that anticipated severe weather during the June-September hurricane season.

The Directorate of Military Support established a multi-service crisis action team that was prepared for full staffing had Felix made landfall. U.S. Atlantic Command, at the direction of DOMS, also identified generators, water

purifiers, a 1,000 bed hospital facility and the support aircraft for FEMA urban search and rescue teams.

"Among all the things we as soldiers do, the thing we take closest to heart is protecting our home front," said Col. James E. Donald, chief, Military Support Division, Office of the

Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations and Plans.

"We stand ready to support the public in times of hardship that affect the livelihood of the citizens of the United States," Donald said. "While we had a response plan in place, we thank God it wasn't needed." (Arnews)
