Army testing hybrid electric vehicles for weapon systems

High Mobility Artillery Rocket System the first major potential customer

Electric powered engines have already sparked interest commercially. Now the Army is getting onboard.

New York City buses and new Hondas and Toyotas are among the users of hybrid electric propulsion. In this concept, the propulsion system is entirely electric. Gasoline powers a generator which starts the electric motor.

BAE Systems, out of Johnson City, N.Y., applied the technology to the New York City buses. It has also built two prototype FMTV (Family of Medium Tactical Vehicles) Hybrid Electric Vehicles under contract for the Tank-automotive and Armaments Command in Warren, Mich.

"And they're looking to us to build two more for extensive testing," Cliff Plummer, manager of military and government business development for BAE Systems, said.

Plummer and five others from BAE Systems demonstrated one of the Hybrid Elec-

tric Vehicles on July 10 at Redstone. The High Mobility Artillery Rocket System, a product of the Multiple Launch Rocket System Project Office, is a potential customer.

"What we're hoping will happen is we'll get some '02 funding to begin moving forward with this concept," Tony Adams, deputy product manager for HIMARS, said. "We're just trying to move forward with the Army's energy reduction objectives and also to reduce the logistics footprint that goes with having to provide all that fuel to the forward area."

HIMARS is in the 27th month of a 40-month maturation contract. Low-rate initial production of 36 systems is planned for fiscal 2003.

"We think it's a good thing," Adams said of the hybrid electric concept.

"This is great news for this community because we are the first major Army weapon system that is planning to incorporate hybrid electric into the weapon system," Lt. Col. Max Carroll, HIMARS product manager, said. "And beginning FY '02

Parents urged to get onboard with school bus registration

Community Town Hall meeting covers back to school issues

Opening day for Huntsville City Schools is Aug. 14. Are your children registered for bus service? Do you have a daycare plan in place? Are you ready?

Kimberly Pugh, contracting officer representative for the school bus program, was first up at the Community Town Hall July 10 to talk to Redstone parents about getting their children ready for school.

"The first day of school is Aug. 14 and it's only a half day," Pugh said. "I urge parents to have their daycare plan in place and get their children registered for bus service as soon as possible. It's critical for us to know how many children will be riding so we can map out routes."

Bus registration continues at the Challenger Club from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. today and Thursday. Active duty personnel must bring their badge; civilians using Arsenal before

and after school care must bring their badge and School Age Service application for bus service registration.

Rules for riding the bus are available at registration and are absolutely enforced, according to Pugh. Disciplinary action includes a telephonic warning for the first incident; a two-week suspension of bus privileges for the second incident and suspension of bus privileges for the remainder of the year for the third incident. Last year there were 46 warnings, 26 suspensions and 10 termination of services. The most frequent infractions were listed as failure to remain seated, refusing to listen to the driver and fighting.

Use of the Confederate flag during a Lynyrd Skynyrd and .38 Special concert scheduled at Redstone Aug. 25 was a topic of discussion at the meeting. Marian Caudle, employee with the Directorate of Community and Family Activities, issued a complaint about the use of the flag, saying that it is a symbol of oppression that promotes racism.

Darrell Brewer, civilian executive assistant for the Redstone Arsenal Support Activity, has been working the

"By Office of Personnel Management and Department of Defense regulations governing civilian incentive awards, an On-the-Spot cash award is a small Special Act or Service Award that may be given by a supervisor to a subordinate employee in order to recognize a meritorious personal effort, act, service, scientific or other achievement accomplished within or outside assigned job responsibilities as long as the act, service or achievement results in either tangible or intangible benefits or both to the government. The AER volunteers in question received cash awards for their participation in the 2001 AER campaign because their hard work enabled their organization to exceed its established AER goal by 60 percent and this is a noteworthy accomplishment. The money raised through these volunteers' endeavors will be used to benefit soldiers and family members throughout our community, thereby enhancing their quality of life. There is no guarantee that future AER volunteers will automatically be recognized in a similar manner since campaign successes cannot be predicted. Although the efforts of our CFC volunteers were deeply appreciated, they did not receive the same type of recognition for their service."

University extension here to serve

Fort Lee soldier fatally shot while on leave in Huntsville

Local man arrested on murder charge

A Fort Lee, Va., soldier was shot to death over the Fourth of July holiday while home on leave.

PFC Brisco L. Battle, 20, of P Company, 266th Quartermaster Battalion, was shot in the stomach in the early morning hours of July 5. Battle, a resident of Toney, came home to visit his parents.

"It happened on University Drive in Huntsville," Special Agent Janet Salas of the Redstone Arsenal Criminal Investigation Division said. "He died from his injury at 2:20 a.m. at Huntsville Hospital."

Initially the Huntsville Police Department responded to a 911 phone call that

reported fireworks were being shot directly at the victim's car, Investigator Frank Fitzgerald of HPD said. The circumstances surrounding the incident are still under investigation.

Zachariash Lightford, 22, of Huntsville, was arrested at the scene and was later charged with one count of murder, one count of attempted murder and one count of harassment. He was being held at Madison County Jail with bail set at \$50,000, \$30,000 and \$500 for each charge, respectively.

Battle is survived by his parents, Leroy and Gwendolyn Humphrey of Toney.

Battle was buried July 11 in Toney. Full military honors were performed by the Redstone Arsenal Military Honor Team.

Although Battle was stationed at Fort Lee, soldier safety is a primary concern for everyone on the Arsenal, Lt. Col.

Richard Walters, the Ordnance Missile and Munitions Center and School chief of staff, said.

"We conduct safety briefs, brigade safety runs and vehicle inspections before every long holiday," Walters said. Topics

covered include not drinking and driving, theft prevention, and safe travel habits. Safety Stand Down day is held every year before the beginning of the summer holiday season to reduce holiday related incidents and accidents.

Von Braun Complex groundbreaking among Armed Forces Week events

Next week's Armed Forces events will include two noteworthy accomplishments for Team Redstone personnel.

On Monday, July 23 at 9 a.m., Sen. Richard Shelby, R-AL, and Maj. Gen. Al Sullivan, AMCOM commander, will break ground at the northwest corner of the building 5250 parking lot for the Von Braun Complex. When complete, the complex will actually be located at the northeast corner of the Martin and Mills Road intersection. Soldier Show 2001 illustrates 'We Are One' concept musically

Huntsville among tour stops for Broadway-style revue

FORT BELVOIR, Va.— The United States Army Soldier Show has come a long way, baby, since 1918 when Irving Berlin conceived Yip Yip Yaphank on Broadway.

On May 17, the latest rendition of "entertainment for the soldier, by the soldier" was launched, set for another tour of 22 states, the District of Columbia, Guam and the Republic of Korea.

(Free tickets to the U.S. Army Soldier Show are available at the Chamber of Commerce. Performances will be at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. July 25, and 7 p.m. July 26 in the Von Braun Center Concert Hall. Tickets are required for the performances.)

Rather mind boggling that all this is the brainchild of Berlin, a Russian immigrant born Israel Beilin who became a U.S. Army sergeant before writing, directing and producing his way to worldwide acclaim.

The U.S. Army Soldier Show was reincarnated during World War II on Broadway under the title "This is the Army," again written, directed and produced by Berlin. Cast and crew all were members of the U.S. Army Special Services Com-

pany No. 1.

A film version made in 1943 featured a military cast starring former President Ronald Reagan, Gene Kelly and Joe Lewis. The modern version of the show originated in 1983 as an outgrowth of several soldier shows existing in various Army commands with soldier talent selected from worldwide competition.

Three years ago, the Army celebrated the 80th anniversary of the debut of the inaugural Army Soldier Show in 1918 and the 15th anniversary of the modern Army Soldier Show.

After rehearsing at Fort Belvoir for six weeks and staging their grand opening here, these troops will hit the road to work 14-hour days and seven-day weeks for the next six months.

Totally self-contained, the cast and crew unload, assemble, dismantle and load out more than 15 tons of equipment — including four miles of cable and 100 theatrical lights — at each and every stop. While on tour, they will handle more than a million pounds of electrical, sound, stage and lighting gear for their 80-minute, Broadway-style musical review.

Some have called it the toughest duty this side of combat.

Normandy vets due medal from French government

RELEASE FROM CONGRESSMAN'S OFFICE

U.S. Rep. Bud Cramer (D-Ala.) has announced that he has obtained medals minted by the French government to pay tribute to the men and women who fought in Normandy in World War II. The Medal of the Jubilee of Liberty was presented to veterans who went back to Normandy for the 50th anniversary of the D-Day landings, during various ceremonies throughout the region.

The governor of Normandy has authorized the Medal of Jubilee be presented to any Normandy veteran who was unable to attend the 50th anniversary ceremonies in France, but was part of the invasion between June 6, 1944 and Aug. 31, 1944. He has given Cramer the authority to present the medals in person in an appropriate ceremony.

"I want to make sure that those veterans who risked their lives during this turning point in World War II receive this medal," Cramer said. "I feel strongly that these heroes deserve every bit of recognition possible for their courage under fire. I am pleased I have the opportunity to help these veterans receive this medal for their efforts to preserve liberty and freedom and pass on medals of gratitude from the people they liberated."

To meet the eligibility requirements for this medal, veterans must complete an application through the congressman's office and attach a copy of their enlisted record and Report of Honorable Discharge. Veterans should write Cramer at 626 Clinton Ave. west, Huntsville, Ala., 35801 or call his office at 551-0190 to obtain an application or if they have any questions.

we should receive funding to expedite the development of a HIMARS hybrid electric system."

Plummer listed three potential advantages of a hybrid electric vehicle. "It will help in survivability because it moves faster and you can operate in the silent mode. It will save on fuel consumption; somewhere between 25 and 50 percent, depending on the mission. And thirdly, it has tremendous power generation so it can provide all the electrical needs for HIMARS," he said.

Brig. Gen. John Holly, program execu-

utive officer for tactical missiles, drove the vehicle during its one-day visit. Others who spent time riding the vehicle included Carroll; Wayne Burke, MLRS deputy project manager; Jim Alexander, hardware engineering group manager; and Billy Crosswhite, launcher division chief.

"Hybrid electric vehicles are here, they're operational," Plummer said. "We just need to apply them to the weapon system and work with the Army to do that."

"This is good stuff," Carroll said. "Fuel economy is greatly improved. This is where the Army's going. Industry's going to this technology. This is where the future is for us, hybrid electric, simply because of the fuel aspects of the vehicle."



More than 100 separation applicants await final approval

Decision letters set for August

Aug. 14 is a date circled on many calendars throughout the Aviation and Missile Command.

That's when more than 100 civilians will learn for sure whether they will receive a monetary bonus for ending their government careers at AMCOM. Of the 142 reshape applicants, 129 have tentatively received approval. The command has 182 surplus employees. That potentially leaves 53 unresolved surplus

employees but the command expects to cover this overage through promotions and attrition.

"The approval of VERA/VSIPs (Voluntary Early Retirement Authority/Voluntary Separation Incentive Pay) is tied to the number of surplus employees that need to be saved in this command," Don Dixon, chief of Customer Support B in the Civilian Personnel Advisory Center, said.

Dixon addressed more than 100 applicants during a question-and-answer session July 10 at building 5250. Approved employees can receive up to \$25,000, based on a severance pay formula.

"I'm just checking it out," a male applicant, who asked to remain anonymous,

said before the session. "I probably have some opportunities in other places. If it doesn't happen like I want it to, then I won't go."

Jim Flinn, deputy to the commanding general, told the applicants that "the chances of there being 140 approvals is very, very small." He said the final number won't be known until August.

As surplus employees are taken care of through promotions, attrition and other actions, the number of buyouts that can be approved will decrease. There must be a surplus employee within a targeted job series in order for a separation bonus to be

approved within that occupation. With the fluctuation in surplus employees, many VSIP applications that are currently within the zone for approval will be denied Aug. 14; and a few applications outside the zone may be approved that day.

"I plan on retiring," applicant Don Counts of the Readiness Directorate said. "I'll have 40 years (service), just go home with a little extra."

Joan Johnson of Security Assistance Management Directorate has already received tentative approval. "My plans are to continue working part time somewhere else," she said.

Army selects follow-on 'Transformation' brigades

WASHINGTON—Fort Richardson and Fort Wainwright, Alaska; Fort Polk, La.; Schofield Barracks, Hawaii; and the Pennsylvania Army National Guard will be the homes of the next units selected to transition into Interim Brigade Combat Teams.

"Land power remains an indispensable element in furthering America's enduring

interests and provides an essential component of global engagement," Secretary of the Army Thomas E. White said. "These interim brigades will help us move towards a force that is more strategically responsive and dominant across the spectrum of military operations. Their improved deployability and lethality will enhance deterrence and meet an operational requirement that does not currently exist."







Off-duty nursing assistant saves boy's life

Woman's CPR training proves crucial two days after taking re-certification class

What was supposed to be a relaxing summer day spent catching tadpoles at a creek near Elkton, Tenn., turned into a fight to save a life when calls for help echoed across the water.

Two brothers who had been on a dam were suddenly entangled under it. Karen Meloon, a nursing assistant at Fox Army Health Center, stayed on the shore with her 4-year-old grandson Joshua while her son J.R. joined the men trying to free them.

"They got one loose, then realized the other one was under there," Meloon said. "It was approximately 12-15 minutes before they got him out."

The boy wasn't breathing and had no pulse when the men dragged him up onto a small island across from the dam. Meloon had attended a CPR re-certification class at Fox two days before the incident.

"The lady standing next to me on the shore said her CPR had expired and I'd got mine renewed, so I couldn't just stand there. She agreed to watch my grandson while I went across the creek," Meloon said.

She ran as fast as she could, slipping and

falling in the water as she tried to reach the boy in time. She knew that every second mattered. She performed CPR for 5-6 minutes until the boy got a pulse back and was breathing. Then the emergency medical technicians arrived. Meloon never heard the boy's last name or what happened to him after the EMTs took him away.

"I just know his name is Brian. There were so many people there it was crazy and the EMTs were telling everyone to stay back. My grandson was kind of scared actually because the EMTs and police were there and people were screaming. He's only 4 but he knew what was going on because his daddy was trying to free (the boy) and all," she said.

The boy, Brian Edward Conley, a 14-year-old from Athens, was admitted to Huntsville Hospital June 17, treated and released June 20, according to hospital records.

Meloon never had to use CPR before the incident but she recommends the training for everyone, especially at this time of year. She said with people swimming and summertime sports, someone drowns almost every day.

Spec. Christopher Hudson, the CPR instructor who taught Meloon's course June 15, explained the importance of renewing your certification.

"You need to get re-certified to keep up on your skills. If you don't use (CPR)

every day, you won't keep up on your skills and some things change from year to year. For example, it used to be from person to person the ratio of compression to breaths was 15:2, now it's 5:1," he said. "They changed it because they found that

was more effective."

What if a person doesn't bother to get re-certified, then finds himself in a situation where he needs to perform CPR?

"They could actually do more harm than good," Hudson said.

Tetanus vaccine delayed until 2002

A shortage of the Tetanus vaccine for 2001 prompted the Center for Disease Control to recommend delaying routine Td boosters for adults and adolescents until early 2002. Delaying routine Td vaccinations until early 2002 ensures enough vaccine is available to take care of urgent health needs.

You may recognize this vaccine as the one sometimes given by your doctor when managing a cut or wound. The immunization clinic at Fox Army Health Center will continue to give Td when ordered by a health care provider for urgent health care needs. However, for routine vaccination, the immunization clinic will take your name and address and notify you when to return for vaccination.

Children under age 7 are not affected by this shortage. The vaccine used for the initial childhood series is available and vaccination should continue on schedule.

After completing the initial childhood series, a routine Td booster is given at age 15 and every 10 years after that. If you have a teen-ager in school who needs the vaccine, they will be able to get it in early 2002.

Actions have already been taken by the CDC and the vaccine manufacturer to prevent this shortage from happening in the future. For more information you can go to www.cdc.gov/nip/ or call Public Health and Education at Fox Army Health Center, 842-0196.

Sick call no longer refuge from work

Move to health center reduces waiting times

In the old days, going to sick call could be an all-day event for soldiers. But the long lines and delays are gone.

In May the Troop Medical Clinic closed and moved all its equipment and personnel to Fox Army Health Center. With the move came a better way to do business; now permanent party soldiers can make appointments for routine things such as prescription refills, followup appointments, and other non-urgent symptoms.

"Soldiers no longer have to sit and wait for routine things," Capt. Christine Ludwig, head nurse of primary care, said. In the past, permanent party soldiers had to go to sick call for everything. Sick call is now only used for urgent needs such as quarters for the day or other immediate injuries or sickness.

For an appointment, call 955-8888 and make the proper selection when prompted. "The phone line is also in the process of being revamped to provide better service, too," Ludwig said. Soldiers also have the option to talk with a triage nurse to determine if their symptoms warrant coming to sick call or making an appointment for later in the day. Also telephone consults are available.

"For example you really don't need to see a provider," Ludwig explained. "All you need is a prescription refilled or a

profile extended." That can now be done over the phone with the receptionist. The message is relayed to the proper provider, he or she reviews the patient's records, the required items are completed and then the soldier is notified to come get the prescription or pick up the new profile. "It's really easy and saves time," Ludwig said.

Sick call hours at Fox start at 6:30 a.m. with a sign-in process that lasts till 7:30. "It's practically guaranteed that you will be out of the clinic by 8:30 a.m.," Ludwig said.

At the old TMC there were only two providers available during sick call; now at Fox there are at least eight, and more if needed.

Ludwig said that soldiers in training still must go through their drill sergeant to get sick call slips. Once identified, their names go on a roster, which is faxed, to the health center.

"That way we can preplan for the amount of students that are coming to sick call," Ludwig said. With the student population larger than the permanent party population, this ensures that there is an adequate number of providers available for sick call. Ludwig said that the new system has cut down on malingering in the student population.

"All soldiers are in and out," she said. "Because it's quick, most students are out in time to still go to school."

The average wait at sick call is just more than an hour. "We definitely have seen positive results with the move," Ludwig said. "The waiting time for sick call has been cut in half."



in a worldwide environment. When making assignments, PERSCOM uses the following criteria as a minimum:

— The Primary Occupational Specialty for enlisted personnel and the Primary Specialty for officer personnel that is required for the gaining position.

— The grade of the servicemember required for the position.

— The period of time since the individual returned from overseas when an overseas assignment is being considered, or the time spent on current station when an assignment is made within the continental United States. (Normal time on station in the United States is 36 months, however it can be longer or shorter, depending on the needs of the Army.)

— Whether it is a restricted tour (no family members allowed), or an accompanied tour where family members can accompany the individual.

— The Exceptional Family Member

program, covered by Army Regulation 608-75, is a program instituted to ensure family members who accompany a soldier to a particular duty station are provided adequate medical care for a particular problem. Through this program, the Army ensures the family member's health is not placed in jeopardy. If the soldier is going on an accompanied tour, the Army ensures adequate medical services are available in the area, and if not available, will not send a particular soldier who has a family member that requires a particular medical service. Family members in the EFMP are required to be re-evaluated every three years or sooner if a change occurs.

“When PERSCOM fills positions at locations in CONUS and outside CONUS, they screen personnel in a particular field to determine who is next in line to move given the needed qualifications. A particular soldier's selection is based on the location of the assignment, the specialty involved, whether or not special medical considerations are required, and other considerations PERSCOM may consider pertinent for the assignment.”

School for children with learning disabilities has high goals

Engineer establishes academy to meet need in community

Janice Isbell saw an educational need in the local community and decided to do something about it.

Isbell, a test evaluation engineer assigned to the Apache Project Office, is starting a school for children with learning disabilities. The Janice Mitchell Isbell Academy is scheduled to open Aug. 14.

Its address is 5101 Mastin Lake Road, location of the New Shiloh Church Ministries where Kenneth Tate is senior pastor. Tate has graciously allowed the school

to be housed there.

"We must educate those students who have learning disabilities, and/or are performing below grade level," Isbell said of the academy. "We must not accept no as an answer. We must be diligent in our efforts to reach these students.

"We must set the bar of expectation high and believe the student will meet or exceed that bar," she added.

Isbell has a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering from Washington University in St. Louis. She has a master's in engineering management from the University of Missouri in Rolla. In 1982 she found herself unemployed due to cut-backs. She was unable to immediately find a job in her field of study, and served as a substitute teacher. She has served as a tutor — as a volunteer and in a paid capacity — for more than 25 years.

While employed in the school system, she recognized a need for some alternative

educational programs other than special education, resources classes or simply just passing students on to the next grade without having mastered the skills. This was her motivation to start the Janice Mitchell Isbell Academy, a non-profit, private institution of learning.

Her goal is to reach out to students needing remediation. These students are at risk of dropping out, flunking out, or getting put out. She believes in educating the "whole" student — intellectual, social, spiritual and physical. Her goal is to provide a premier institution of learning and train students to become leaders meeting the challenges of tomorrow. In order to achieve this goal, each student enrolled in the academy will be equipped with the knowledge, skills, abilities, and desire to succeed. The academy will provide educational services for all students in grades K-5, including at-risk students and those with learning disabilities.







issue, along with the Aviation and Missile Command's public affairs office. Caudle takes issue with the 20-by-40-foot rebel flag that is unfurled from the ceiling during two songs performed by Lynyrd Skynyrd — "Free Bird" and "Sweet Home Alabama."

Dan Ahern, director of DCFA, has suggested, through Army channels, that the band use an Alabama state flag instead of the rebel flag. A response from Lynyrd Skynyrd is expected by Friday. Redstone Arsenal is one of 14 installations selected for the Army's concert tour. No other installations have voiced a concern about the use of the Confederate flag. Last year the band performed a sold-out concert in Huntsville using the rebel flag with no problem.

Housing issues included a new satellite dish policy, allowing them to be placed in the housing area, with prior approval from the Housing Management Office. The digital dish satellite system must be on a stand-alone pole, with a maximum size of 18 inches.

A new product will be tested on several quarters to completely encase surfaces covered with lead-based paint. The product, LeadLock, is applied in two coats-primer-sealer neutralizer and a top coat

that seals lead-based paint in place with no evidence of leaching.

There was also talk of a new swimming pool, estimated cost \$460,000, built just off Skinner Road to replace the pool near building 111 if funding becomes available.

During open discussion, several members of the community addressed the problem of late fees for movie rentals at the Shoppette. According to the Kenny Barton, AAFES general manager, movies are due back at noon on the day of return. If they are late, a late fee of the rental price is charged. Customers have three days in which to pay the charge; if not a reminder letter is sent to the customer. If there is no response after 10 days, another letter is sent. If there is still no response, customer information is entered into the Army and Air Force Exchange Service check verification system and check cashing privileges are suspended.

"It's bad because what if a soldier has an emergency and has to write a check for some cash to get back home and he can't because of this late charge thing?" Evelyn Teats, mayor for Apollo Landing, said.

"We're taking a look at the issue to see what we can do to better serve our customers," Barton said. "I think part of the problem is in when movies are returned. If they're only a few minutes late, versus six or eight hours or a day late, we may be able to have a grace period, so they're not charged a late fee."

driving a black 44-passenger bus emblazoned with the Army Morale, Welfare and Recreation logo, a similarly decorated black 18-wheel tractor-trailer, and a 15-passenger van to transport personnel, staff, costumes and stage equipment across the continental U.S.

Ever hear "The Load Out and Stay" by Jackson Browne? These troops are the pop star and his roadies all wrapped into one — dancing, singing, packing and traveling

their days and nights away for the love of entertainment for the soldier, by the soldier. Talk about "Running on Empty."

For many, just making the final cut was the culmination of a dream. Forty applications were submitted for this year's show. Twenty-three finalists auditioned on April Fool's Day. Sixteen performers prevailed, along with six audio and lighting technicians.

As their dreams come to life, these troops will do whatever it takes to feel the bright lights of Broadway, be they in Fort Leavenworth, Kan., or Yongson, Korea.



CARPE DIEM— The theme for U.S. Army Soldier Show 2000, which came to Huntsville last year, was "Seize the Day." The cast and crew of traveling soldiers had something for everyone in their repertoire, from pop and rock to rhythm and blues, with a side of country, swing and opera. For their finale, the soldiers came out in uniform and reminded the audience to make the most of life and "seize the day."

They're on stage performing — a labor of love. And the beauty of it all is they represent fellow soldiers in the process.

They are living proof that Army pride and hard work can override shortcomings in talent, making their brand of entertainment even more appealing. No high-dollar prima donnas here. Contrary to popular belief, the Soldier Show is not funded with taxpayers' money. It flourishes off nonappropriated funds or "soldier dollars" generated from fees and charges in other MWR programs coupled with generous corporate sponsorships.

For the fifth consecutive year, the United Services Planning Association & Independent Research Agency for Life Insurance is the primary sponsor. And for the first time, the Army National Guard has climbed aboard to brand its "You Can" logo. Representing 350,000 soldiers in more than 3,000 communities, SSgt. Richar Hazzard, a bugler with the 249th Army Band, hails from Kimball, W. Va., to represent the Guard in this year's cast.

"Being a part of the Soldier Show is an incredible blessing," Hazzard said. "I welcome the chance to be able to give something back to the Army for allowing me the chance to grow daily."

Soldiers came together from around the globe for this year's show.

Sgt. Carolyn Washington, a personnel specialist, hails from Buffalo, N.Y., via Kaiserslautern, Germany, as does Sgt. Janice Burns, a medical laboratory supervisor from San Antonio, Texas. Sgt. Belin-

da Parraz, a motor transport specialist from Farmington, N.M., reported from Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, as did Sgt. Robert Anderson, a motor transport specialist from Merced, Calif.

Another duet came from duty stations in Germany: Spec. Debra Pruegert, a network systems technician from Oklahoma City, Okla., via Darmstadt, and Sgt. Lana Robinson, a network systems supervisor from Columbus, Neb., via Mannheim.

Building on the "Army of One" recruiting slogan, the theme of this year's Soldier Show is "We Are One."

"The idea behind the theme of 'One' is to highlight the concepts of 'though we are many, we are one,'" said Soldier Show producer Tim Higdon, an alumnus of the program. "Though we are different, we are one. One unit, one team."

"It is the artistic vision of the staff, who represent the team of one through music, dance and video to communicate this message using not only current industry music-video concepts, but also patriotic songs, and Broadway hits."

The strength and combined diversity equals greater ability. It is our individuality that makes our Army great, and that makes our country strong when combined with other 'ones.' For a common goal or mission, many will become one to accomplish that goal or mission: in this case, "entertainment for the soldier, by the soldier."



Army officials said they are coordinating with the contractor of the Interim Armored Vehicle to determine appropriate ways to accelerate IAV fielding for the two IBCTs at Fort Lewis. The Army plan is to complete fielding of the IAV for the other four brigades within three years after the Fort Lewis brigades are fielded. Once the new fielding dates are set, the Army will announce the planning dates for the other brigades.

Transformation to the IBCT design for the brigades is anticipated to take about one year for an active-component brigade, and about two years for an Army National Guard brigade, according to Army officials.

The latest brigade selections are conditional on results of an Army Program Environmental Impact Study currently

being conducted, officials said. That study is slated to wrap up in the fall.

The first brigades to transform — 3rd Brigade of the 2nd ID and 1st Brigade of the 25th ID, both stationed at Fort Lewis, Wash. — started the transition to IBCTs in 1999. They are scheduled to finish the process in fiscal year 2003 and 2004, respectively.

"The Interim Force is a bridge to the Objective Force. The capabilities of the IBCTs fulfill an immediate requirement by substantially improving the lethality, survivability and tactical mobility of light forces while retaining the strategic deployability advantages of those forces," Army Chief of Staff Gen. Eric Shinseki said. "We believe the IBCTs will significantly contribute to the joint warfight as maneuver forces until technology has advanced enough to provide the Army with a lighter, more lethal and survivable Objective Force capable of rapid deployment."


